gratis	Without charge; free. <i>A monthly programme was issued gratis.</i>
haggle	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining). <i>Let s not haggle over a few dollars.</i>
meagerly	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>These voices are meagerly represented at the conference.</i>
miser	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical miser he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
parsimony	Extreme stinginess. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government parsimony.</i>
rebate	Pay back a sum of money as a rebate. <i>The scheme eases the move to the council tax by giving rebates in the first year.</i>
redemptive	Acting to save someone from error or evil. <i>Redemptive or redeeming love.</i>
rescue	Denoting or relating to a domestic animal that has been removed from a situation of abuse or neglect by a welfare organization. <i>Firemen rescued a man trapped in the river.</i>
save	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i>The statement was made to save the government some embarrassment.</i>
saving	An economy of or reduction in money, time, or another resource. <i>Innovative money saving ideas for students.</i>
schlock	Merchandise that is shoddy or inferior. <i>Mass produced schlock.</i>
scrimp	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>Scratch and scrimp.</i>
shoddy	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. <i>Shoddy business practices.</i>
skimp	Limit in quality or quantity. <i>She wore a yellow skimp.</i>

sparing	Avoiding waste. <i>Sparing in their use of heat and light.</i>
<u>sparingly</u>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used sparingly.</i>
<u>tacky</u>	(of a glutinous liquid such as paint) not completely dried and slightly sticky to the touch. <i>The paint was still tacky.</i>
thrift	The quality of using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully. <i>The values of thrift and self reliance.</i>
<u>thrifty</u>	Prosperous. <i>He had been brought up to be thrifty and careful.</i>
tightwad	A mean or miserly person. <i>He is a notorious tightwad.</i>
