- *A very young child or baby.*
- *Denoting something in an early stage of its development.*

babe	An innocent or helpless person. <i>He s been pumping up his pecs to impress the babes.</i>
baby	One's particular responsibility or concern. <i>Baby rabbits.</i>
budding	Reproduction of some unicellular organisms (such as yeasts) by growth and specialization followed by the separation by constriction of a part of the parent.
dawning	The earliest period. <i>The dawnings of civilization.</i>
developing	Processing a photosensitive material in order to make an image visible.
emergent	An emergent tree or other plant. <i>Emergents tower above the top canopy.</i>
fledgling	Any new participant in some activity. <i>The country s fledgling democracy.</i>

growing	The process of an individual organism growing organically a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level.
little child	A small amount or duration.
little one	A small amount or duration.
newborn	A recently born child or animal. <i>She s incapable of looking after a newborn.</i>
up-and-coming	Arrival that has been awaited (especially of something momentous).
young child	Young people collectively.

embryo	The part of a seed which develops into a plant consisting in the mature embryo of a higher plant of a plumule a radicle and one or two cotyledons. <i>A simple commodity economy is merely the embryo of a capitalist economy.</i>
filly	A young female horse, especially one less than four years old.
foal	Of a mare give birth to a foal. <i>The mare foaled.</i>
gestation	The period during which an embryo develops (about 266 days in humans). <i>A thorough and painstaking work which was a long time in gestation.</i>
infantile	Of or occurring among babies or very young children. <i>Infantile games.</i>
<u>juvenile</u>	An actor playing a juvenile role. <i>The prey of juvenile owls.</i>
kindergarten	(in North America) a class or school that prepares children, usually five- or six-year-olds, for the first year of formal education.
maternal	Characteristic of a mother- Dorothy Sayers. <i>My maternal grandfather.</i>
midwife	A person who helps to create or develop something. <i>These women midwifed her.</i>
miscarry	Suffer a miscarriage. <i>Such a rash crime and one so very likely to miscarry.</i>
<u>mother</u>	A woman who has given birth to a child also used as a term of address to your mother. <i>She mothered her husband insisting he should take cod liver oil in the winter.</i>
natal	Of or relating to the buttocks. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his natal city.</i>
neonatal	Relating to newborn children (or other mammals). <i>Special attention is given to mortality in the neonatal period.</i>
nursery	A place where young children are cared for during the working day a nursery school. <i>A toy strewn nursery.</i>
pregnancy	The condition or period of being pregnant. <i>The first weeks of pregnancy.</i>
pregnant	Filled with or attended with. <i>She was six months pregnant.</i>
prenatal	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i>The prenatal period.</i>

preschool	Relating to the time before a child is old enough to go to school. <i>A preschool playgroup.</i>
preschooler	A child who is not old enough to go to school. <i>The show aimed at preschoolers emphasizes the importance of storytelling.</i>
raising	Increasing in quantity or value. <i>A cost raising increase in the basic wage rate.</i>
scion	A descendant of a notable family. <i>A scion of royal stock.</i>
toddler	A young child who is just beginning to walk.
unborn	Not yet brought into existence. <i>The sound of an unborn baby's heartbeat.</i>
yearling	A racehorse in the calendar year after its year of foaling. <i>The yearling market.</i>
youngster	A young person of either sex. <i>Tiddler is a British term for youngster.</i>
