- *Denoting something in an early stage of its development.*

<b>baby</b>	One's particular responsibility or concern. <i><b>Baby</b> rabbits.</i>
<b>budding</b>	Reproduction of some unicellular organisms (such as yeasts) by growth and specialization followed by the separation by constriction of a part of the parent.
<b>dawning</b>	The earliest period. <i>The <b>dawnings</b> of civilization.</i>
<b>developing</b>	Processing a photosensitive material in order to make an image visible.
<b>emergent</b>	An emergent tree or other plant. <i><b>Emergents</b> tower above the top canopy.</i>
<b>fledgling</b>	Any new participant in some activity. <i>The country s <b>fledgling</b> democracy.</i>

<b>growing</b>	The process of an individual organism growing organically a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level.
<b>little child</b>	A small amount or duration.
<b>little one</b>	A small amount or duration.
<b>newborn</b>	A recently born child or animal. <i>She s incapable of looking after a <b>newborn</b>.</i>
<b>up-and-coming</b>	Arrival that has been awaited (especially of something momentous).
<b>young child</b>	Young people collectively.

<b>embryo</b>	The part of a seed which develops into a plant consisting in the mature embryo of a higher plant of a plumule a radicle and one or two cotyledons. <i>A simple commodity economy is merely the <b>embryo</b> of a capitalist economy.</i>
<b>filly</b>	A young female horse, especially one less than four years old.
<b>foal</b>	Of a mare give birth to a foal. <i>The mare <b>foaled</b>.</i>
<b>gestation</b>	The period during which an embryo develops (about 266 days in humans). <i>A thorough and painstaking work which was a long time in <b>gestation</b>.</i>
<b>infantile</b>	Of or occurring among babies or very young children. <i><b>Infantile</b> games.</i>
<b>juvenile</b>	An actor playing a juvenile role. <i>The prey of <b>juvenile</b> owls.</i>
<b>kindergarten</b>	(in North America) a class or school that prepares children, usually five- or six-year-olds, for the first year of formal education.
<b>maternal</b>	Characteristic of a mother- Dorothy Sayers. <i>My <b>maternal</b> grandfather.</i>
<b>midwife</b>	A person who helps to create or develop something. <i>These women <b>midwifed</b> her.</i>
<b>miscarry</b>	Suffer a miscarriage. <i>Such a rash crime and one so very likely to <b>miscarry</b>.</i>
<b>mother</b>	A woman who has given birth to a child also used as a term of address to your mother. <i>She <b>mothered</b> her husband insisting he should take cod liver oil in the winter.</i>
<b>natal</b>	Of or relating to the buttocks. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his <b>natal</b> city.</i>
<b>neonatal</b>	Relating to newborn children (or other mammals). <i>Special attention is given to mortality in the <b>neonatal</b> period.</i>
<b>nursery</b>	A place where young children are cared for during the working day a nursery school. <i>A toy strewn <b>nursery</b>.</i>
<b>pregnancy</b>	The condition or period of being pregnant. <i>The first weeks of <b>pregnancy</b>.</i>
<b>pregnant</b>	Filled with or attended with. <i>She was six months <b>pregnant</b>.</i>
<b>prenatal</b>	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i>The <b>prenatal</b> period.</i>

<b>preschool</b>	Relating to the time before a child is old enough to go to school. <i>A <b>preschool</b> playgroup.</i>
<b>preschooler</b>	A child who is not old enough to go to school. <i>The show aimed at <b>preschoolers</b> emphasizes the importance of storytelling.</i>
<b>raising</b>	Increasing in quantity or value. <i>A cost <b>raising</b> increase in the basic wage rate.</i>
<b>scion</b>	A descendant of a notable family. <i>A <b>scion</b> of royal stock.</i>
<b>toddler</b>	A young child who is just beginning to walk.
<b>unborn</b>	Not yet brought into existence. <i>The sound of an <b>unborn</b> baby's heartbeat.</i>
<b>yearling</b>	A racehorse in the calendar year after its year of foaling. <i>The <b>yearling</b> market.</i>
<b>youngster</b>	A young person of either sex. <i>Tiddler is a British term for <b>youngster</b>.</i>
