- *Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness.*



Synonyms of "Infatuated" as an adjective (9 Words)

besotted

Intoxicated; drunk.

*He became **besotted** with a local barmaid.*

enamored

Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness.

*Narcissus was a beautiful Greek youth who became **enamored** of his own reflection.*

hopelessly in love

Certain to fail.

in love

Directed or bound inward.

obsessed

Influenced or controlled by a powerful force such as a strong emotion.

*Was absolutely **obsessed** with the girl.*

smitten

(used in combination) affected by something overwhelming.

*Conscience **smitten**.*

soft on

Soft and mild; not harsh or stern or severe.

taken

Be affected with an indisposition.
A smile **taken** as consent.



Usage Examples of "Infatuated" as an adjective

- *He was infatuated with her.*
- *An infatuated teenager.*
