
Infiltrate as a Verb

Definitions of "Infiltrate" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "infiltrate" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- (of a tumour, cells, etc.) spread into or invade (a tissue or organ.
- Cause (a liquid) to enter by penetrating the interstices.
- Enter or gain access to (an organization, place, etc.) surreptitiously and gradually, especially in order to acquire secret information.
- Cause (a liquid) to permeate something by filtration.
- (of a liquid) permeate (something) by filtration.
- Pass through an enemy line; in a military conflict.
- Pass into or through by filtering or permeating.
- Gradually permeate or become a part of.
- Enter a group or organization in order to spy on the members.
