Inflamed as an Adjective

Definitions of "Inflamed" as an adjective

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "inflamed" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Adorned with tongues of flame.
- Lighted with red light as if with flames.
- (of a part of the body) red or swollen as a result of inflammation.
- (of strong feelings) provoked or intensified.
- Resulting from inflammation; hot and swollen and reddened.





Synonyms of "Inflamed" as an adjective (4 Words)

ablazeKeenly excited (especially sexually) or indicating excitement.

His eyes were **ablaze** with excitement.

puffed up Gathered for protruding fullness.
