grandiloquent	Puffed up with vanity. A grandiloquent and boastful manner.
grandiose	Conceived on a very grand or ambitious scale. <i>The court s grandiose facade.</i>
greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him greatly</i> .
<u>highly</u>	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>His colleagues think very highly of him.</i>
immensely	To an exceedingly great extent or degree. <i>Was immensely</i> more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.
increase	The amount by which something increases. The increase is scheduled for next month.
magniloquent	Using high-flown or bombastic language.
overblown	Past the stage of full bloom. An overblown rose.
<u>plenty</u>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>I ve had plenty thanks.</i>
pompous	Characterized by pomp and ceremony and stately display. <i>Processions and other</i> pompous <i>shows</i> .
portentous	Of momentous or ominous significance- Herman Melville. <i>The author s portentous moralizings.</i>
poseur	A person who behaves affectedly in order to impress others.
pretentious	Attempting to impress by affecting greater importance or merit than is actually possessed. <i>A pretentious</i> scholarly edition.



price	Determine the price of. Large cars are dropping in price .
prohibitively	In a way that forbids or prevents something. Most of the products are priced prohibitively .
skyrocket	(of a price, rate, or amount) increase very steeply or rapidly. <i>Prices skyrocketed</i> .
<u>snobbish</u>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>The writer takes a rather</i> snobbish <i>tone</i> .
stagflation	Persistent high inflation combined with high unemployment and stagnant demand in a country's economy.
very	Emphasizing an extreme point in time or space. The very God of Heaven.
