- *Distended through being filled with air or gas.*
- *Enlarged beyond truth or reasonableness.*



Synonyms of "Inflated" as an adjective (16 Words)

aerated	Supplied with carbon dioxide. <i>Don t get so aerated.</i>
exaggerated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>Thick lenses exaggerated the size of her eyes.</i>
filled	Of purchase orders that have been filled. <i>A large hall filled with rows of desks.</i>
high-flown	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
high-sounding	Pretentious (especially with regard to language or ideals.
hyperbolic	(of language) deliberately exaggerated. <i>A hyperbolic style.</i>
immoderate	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i>Immoderate drinking.</i>
increased	Made greater in size or amount or degree.
<u>magnified</u>	Enlarged to an abnormal degree.
overblown	Past the stage of full bloom. <i>His most rhetorically overblown screenplay.</i>
overripe	Too ripe and beginning to turn soft. <i>Overripe tomatoes.</i>
overstated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable.
puffed out	Gathered for protruding fullness.
puffed up	Gathered for protruding fullness.
raised	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>Raised eyebrows.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>Unwarranted jealousy.</i>

arty	Making a strong, affected, or pretentious display of being artistic or interested in the arts. <i>A very arty film.</i>
<u>bloat</u>	Make bloated or swollen. <i>Hunger bloated the child s belly.</i>
blowhard	A boastful or pompous person. <i>Blowhard politicians.</i>
bombastic	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>Bombastic rhetoric.</i>
braggart	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>Braggart men.</i>
distend	Become wider. <i>The distended bellies of the starving cows.</i>

dramatically	In a dramatic manner. <i>His dramatically shaped canvases attracted critical acclaim.</i>
enormously	Extremely. <i>She has been enormously successful.</i>
exaggerated	Regarded or represented as larger, better, or worse than in reality. <i>An exaggerated opinion of oneself.</i>
expand	Expand the influence of. <i>His business expanded rapidly.</i>
expanded	Denoting sheet metal slit and stretched into a mesh, used to reinforce concrete and other brittle materials. <i>Expanded polystyrene.</i>
grandiloquent	Puffed up with vanity. <i>A grandiloquent and boastful manner.</i>
grandiose	Conceived on a very grand or ambitious scale. <i>The court s grandiose facade.</i>
greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him greatly.</i>
highly	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>His colleagues think very highly of him.</i>
immensely	To an exceedingly great extent or degree. <i>Was immensely more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
increase	The amount by which something increases. <i>The increase is scheduled for next month.</i>
magniloquent	Using high-flown or bombastic language.
overblown	Past the stage of full bloom. <i>An overblown rose.</i>
plenty	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>I ve had plenty thanks.</i>
pompous	Characterized by pomp and ceremony and stately display. <i>Processions and other pompous shows.</i>
portentous	Of momentous or ominous significance- Herman Melville. <i>The author s portentous moralizings.</i>
poseur	A person who behaves affectedly in order to impress others.
pretentious	Attempting to impress by affecting greater importance or merit than is actually possessed. <i>A pretentious scholarly edition.</i>

price	Determine the price of. <i>Large cars are dropping in price.</i>
prohibitively	In a way that forbids or prevents something. <i>Most of the products are priced prohibitively.</i>
skyrocket	(of a price, rate, or amount) increase very steeply or rapidly. <i>Prices skyrocketed.</i>
<u>snobbish</u>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>The writer takes a rather snobbish tone.</i>
stagflation	Persistent high inflation combined with high unemployment and stagnant demand in a country's economy.
very	Emphasizing an extreme point in time or space. <i>The very God of Heaven.</i>
