Definitions of "Influx" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “influx” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The process of flowing in.*
- *An arrival or entry of large numbers of people or things.*
- *An inflow of water into a river, lake, or the sea.*



Synonyms of "Influx" as a noun (8 Words)

flood	The act of flooding filling to overflowing. <i>A flood barrier.</i>
incursion	The mistake of incurring liability or blame. <i>Incursions into enemy territory.</i>
inflow	The movement of liquid or air into a place. <i>Enormous inflows of foreign investment.</i>
ingress	The action or fact of going in or entering; the capacity or right of entrance.
inrush	The sudden arrival or entry of something. <i>A great inrush of water occurred.</i>
inundation	The rising of a body of water and its overflowing onto normally dry land. <i>Plains fertilized by annual inundations.</i>
rush	A sudden forceful flow. <i>Users experience a rush.</i>
<u>stream</u>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>The raft floated downstream on the current.</i>



Usage Examples of "Influx" as a noun

- *A massive influx of tourists.*
- *The lakes are fed by influxes of meltwater.*



Associations of "Influx" (30 Words)

- arrival** Someone who arrives (or has arrived).
*Ruth's **arrival** in New York.*
- asylum** A shelter from danger or hardship.
*His **asylum** application was refused.*
- depose** Force to leave (an office).
*He had been **deposed** by a military coup.*
- depredation** An act of attacking or plundering.
*Protecting grain from the **depredations** of rats and mice.*
- elude** Escape from or avoid (a danger, enemy, or pursuer), typically in a skilful or cunning way.
*The logic of this **eluded** most people.*

emigration	The act of leaving one's own country to settle permanently in another; moving abroad. <i>Mass emigration from Ireland to the United States.</i>
escape	Be incomprehensible to escape understanding by. <i>Romantic novels should present an escape from the dreary realities of life.</i>
escaped	Having escaped especially from confinement. <i>Searching for two escaped prisoners.</i>
evade	Practice evasion. <i>Sleep still evaded her.</i>
exile	The act of expelling a person from their native land. <i>The return of political exiles.</i>
exodus	The second book of the Old Testament: tells of the departure of the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt led by Moses; God gave them the Ten Commandments and the rest of Mosaic law on Mount Sinai during the Exodus. <i>The annual exodus of sun seeking Canadians to Florida.</i>
flee	Run away from (someone or something). <i>He was forced to flee the country.</i>
flood	Of a flood force someone to leave their home. <i>His column provoked a flood of complaints.</i>
flow	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>Water flowed into the cave.</i>
foray	Make or go on a foray. <i>My first foray into journalism.</i>
harry	Make a pillaging or destructive raid on (a place), as in wartimes. <i>He is known to harry his staff when he is overworked.</i>
haven	A sheltered port where ships can take on or discharge cargo. <i>A haven for wildlife.</i>
invasion	Any entry into an area not previously occupied. <i>An invasion of locusts.</i>
irruption	A sudden sharp increase in the relative numbers of a population. <i>The recent irruption of bad manners.</i>
migrant	An animal that migrates. <i>Appalled by the social conditions of migrant life.</i>
outburst	A sudden emission of energy or particles. <i>An angry outburst from the prime minister.</i>
overflow	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>The river overflowed its banks.</i>

overrun	Invade in great numbers. <i>The Mediterranean has been overrun by tourists.</i>
<u>recourse</u>	Act of turning to for assistance. <i>All three countries had recourse to the IMF for standby loans.</i>
refuge	An institution providing safe accommodation for women who have suffered violence from a spouse or partner. <i>He was forced to take refuge in the French embassy.</i>
refugee	A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster. <i>A refugee camp.</i>
run	A race run on foot. <i>Varnish should be applied with care to avoid runs and an uneven surface.</i>
<u>sanctuary</u>	The inmost recess or holiest part of a temple. <i>His sons took sanctuary in the church.</i>
sudden	Suddenly. <i>A sudden storm.</i>
<u>war</u>	Engage in a war. <i>Conflicting emotions warred within her.</i>
