### **Definitions of "Influx" as a noun**

- *An arrival or entry of large numbers of people or things.*
- *An inflow of water into a river, lake, or the sea.*



## Synonyms of "Influx" as a noun (8 Words)

<b>flood</b>	The act of flooding filling to overflowing. A <b>flood</b> barrier.
<b>incursion</b>	The mistake of incurring liability or blame. <b>Incursions</b> into enemy territory.
<b>inflow</b>	The movement of liquid or air into a place. Enormous <b>inflows</b> of foreign investment.
<b>ingress</b>	The action or fact of going in or entering; the capacity or right of entrance.
<b>inrush</b>	The sudden arrival or entry of something. A great <b>inrush</b> of water occurred.
<b>inundation</b>	The rising of a body of water and its overflowing onto normally dry land. Plains fertilized by annual <b>inundations</b> .
<b>rush</b>	A sudden forceful flow. Users experience a <b>rush</b> .
<u><a href="#">stream</a></u>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. The raft floated down <b>stream</b> on the current.





## Usage Examples of "Influx" as a noun

- *A massive influx of tourists.*
- *The lakes are fed by influxes of meltwater.*



## Associations of "Influx" (30 Words)

- arrival** Someone who arrives (or has arrived).  
*Ruth's **arrival** in New York.*
- asylum** A shelter from danger or hardship.  
*His **asylum** application was refused.*
- depose** Force to leave (an office).  
*He had been **deposed** by a military coup.*
- depredation** An act of attacking or plundering.  
*Protecting grain from the **depredations** of rats and mice.*
- elude** Escape from or avoid (a danger, enemy, or pursuer), typically in a skilful or cunning way.  
*The logic of this **eluded** most people.*



<b>emigration</b>	The act of leaving one's own country to settle permanently in another; moving abroad. <i>Mass <b>emigration</b> from Ireland to the United States.</i>
<b>escape</b>	Be incomprehensible to escape understanding by. <i>Romantic novels should present an <b>escape</b> from the dreary realities of life.</i>
<b>escaped</b>	Having escaped especially from confinement. <i>Searching for two <b>escaped</b> prisoners.</i>
<b>evade</b>	Practice evasion. <i>Sleep still <b>evaded</b> her.</i>
<b>exile</b>	The act of expelling a person from their native land. <i>The return of political <b>exiles</b>.</i>
<b>exodus</b>	The second book of the Old Testament: tells of the departure of the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt led by Moses; God gave them the Ten Commandments and the rest of Mosaic law on Mount Sinai during the Exodus. <i>The annual <b>exodus</b> of sun seeking Canadians to Florida.</i>
<b>flee</b>	Run away from (someone or something). <i>He was forced to <b>flee</b> the country.</i>
<b>flood</b>	Of a flood force someone to leave their home. <i>His column provoked a <b>flood</b> of complaints.</i>
<b>flow</b>	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>Water <b>flowed</b> into the cave.</i>
<b>foray</b>	Make or go on a foray. <i>My first <b>foray</b> into journalism.</i>
<b>harry</b>	Make a pillaging or destructive raid on (a place), as in wartimes. <i>He is known to <b>harry</b> his staff when he is overworked.</i>
<b>haven</b>	A sheltered port where ships can take on or discharge cargo. <i>A <b>haven</b> for wildlife.</i>
<b>invasion</b>	Any entry into an area not previously occupied. <i>An <b>invasion</b> of locusts.</i>
<b>irruption</b>	A sudden sharp increase in the relative numbers of a population. <i>The recent <b>irruption</b> of bad manners.</i>
<b>migrant</b>	An animal that migrates. <i>Appalled by the social conditions of <b>migrant</b> life.</i>
<b>outburst</b>	A sudden emission of energy or particles. <i>An angry <b>outburst</b> from the prime minister.</i>
<b>overflow</b>	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>The river <b>overflowed</b> its banks.</i>

<b>overrun</b>	Invade in great numbers. <i>The Mediterranean has been <b>overrun</b> by tourists.</i>
<b>recourse</b>	Act of turning to for assistance. <i>All three countries had <b>recourse</b> to the IMF for standby loans.</i>
<b>refuge</b>	An institution providing safe accommodation for women who have suffered violence from a spouse or partner. <i>He was forced to take <b>refuge</b> in the French embassy.</i>
<b>refugee</b>	A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster. <i>A <b>refugee</b> camp.</i>
<b>run</b>	A race run on foot. <i>Varnish should be applied with care to avoid <b>runs</b> and an uneven surface.</i>
<b>sanctuary</b>	The inmost recess or holiest part of a temple. <i>His sons took <b>sanctuary</b> in the church.</i>
<b>sudden</b>	Suddenly. <i>A <b>sudden</b> storm.</i>
<b>war</b>	Engage in a war. <i>Conflicting emotions <b>warred</b> within her.</i>
