- *Act so as to limit or undermine (something); encroach on.*
- *Advance beyond the usual limit.*
- *Go against, as of rules and laws.*

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| breach | Make an opening or gap in. <i>We saw whales breaching in the distance.</i> |
| break | Become fractured break or crack on the surface only. <i>The company has attempted to break the strike using non union labour.</i> |
| commit a breach of | Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. |

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| <u>compromise</u> | Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>Yo yo dieting can compromise your immune system.</i> |
| conflict | Be in conflict. <i>The two proposals conflict.</i> |
| contravene | Offend against the prohibition or order of (a law, treaty, or code of conduct). <i>The Privy Council held that the prosecution contravened the rights of the individual.</i> |
| damage | Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>The snow damaged the roof.</i> |
| defy | Challenge (someone) to fight. <i>His actions defy belief.</i> |
| diminish | Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The new law is expected to diminish the government's chances.</i> |
| <u>disobey</u> | Refuse to go along with; refuse to follow; be disobedient. <i>Around 1 000 soldiers had disobeyed orders and surrendered.</i> |
| <u>encroach</u> | Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The sea has encroached all round the coast.</i> |
| encroach on | Impinge or infringe upon. |
| enter | Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>Enter a race.</i> |
| erode | Become ground down or deteriorate. <i>The cliffs on this coast have been eroded by the sea.</i> |
| flout | Openly disregard (a rule, law, or convention). <i>The women pointed and flouted at her.</i> |
| fly in the face of | Travel in an airplane. |
| <u>impair</u> | Weaken or damage (something, especially a faculty or function). <i>A noisy job could permanently impair their hearing.</i> |
| impinge | Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The proposed fencing would impinge on a public bridleway.</i> |
| impinge on | Advance beyond the usual limit. |
| intrude on | Enter unlawfully on someone's property. |
| <u>invade</u> | Enter (a place, situation, or sphere of activity) in large numbers, especially with intrusive effect. <i>This new colleague invades my territory.</i> |
| kick against | Strike with the foot. |
| ride roughshod over | Copulate with. |

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| run afoul | Pursue for food or sport (as of wild animals). |
| transgress | Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises. <i>She had transgressed an unwritten social law.</i> |
| trespass on | Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). |
| undermine | Dig or excavate beneath (a building or fortification) so as to make it collapse. <i>The demolition engineers did eventually undermine two of the tower's six sides.</i> |
| violate | Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>They denied that human rights were being violated.</i> |
| weaken | Reduce the level or intensity or size or scope of. <i>The fever weakened his body.</i> |

- *Making an unauthorized copy would infringe copyright.*
- *Such widespread surveillance could infringe personal liberties.*
- *I wouldn't infringe on his privacy.*

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| actionable | Affording grounds for legal action. <i>Insightful and actionable information on the effect advertising is having on your brand.</i> |
| breach | An opening (especially a gap in a dike or fortification). <i>A widening breach between government and Church.</i> |
| contravene | Offend against the prohibition or order of (a law, treaty, or code of conduct). <i>He contravened the Official Secrets Act.</i> |
| contravention | An action which offends against a law, treaty, or other ruling. <i>There were repeated raids by one side upon the other in contravention of treaty terms.</i> |
| encroach | Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The sea has encroached all round the coast.</i> |
| encroachment | Any entry into an area not previously occupied. <i>Minor encroachments on our individual liberties.</i> |
| impinge | Impinge or infringe upon. <i>This impinges on my rights as an individual.</i> |

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| incursion | The act of entering some territory or domain (often in large numbers). <i>The incursion of television into the American living room.</i> |
| infraction | A violation or infringement of a law or agreement. |
| infringement | The action of breaking the terms of a law, agreement, etc.; violation. <i>The infringement of the right to privacy.</i> |
| interloper | Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>Japanese consumers have in the past been unreceptive to foreign interlopers in the cell phone market.</i> |
| intruder | A person who intrudes, especially into a building with criminal intent. <i>The intruder had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i> |
| intrusion | The action of intruding. <i>Unacceptable intrusions of privacy.</i> |
| invasion | (pathology) the spread of pathogenic microorganisms or malignant cells to new sites in the body. <i>Napoleon's disastrous invasion of Russia in 1812.</i> |
| litigate | Engage in legal proceedings. <i>Even a claim which is litigated and defended successfully involves high legal costs.</i> |
| misdemeanor | A crime less serious than a felony. |
| offence | An act punishable by law; usually considered an evil act. <i>The new offence of obtaining property by deception.</i> |
| oppressor | A person or group that oppresses people. <i>They overthrew their colonial oppressors.</i> |
| piracy | A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Software piracy.</i> |
| plaintiff | A person who brings a case against another in a court of law. <i>The plaintiff commenced an action for damages.</i> |
| ravish | Seize and carry off (someone) by force. <i>Ravished by a sunny afternoon she had agreed without even thinking.</i> |
| tortious | Constituting a tort; wrongful. <i>This does not make the act tortious.</i> |
| transgress | Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>Each continent has been transgressed by continental seas.</i> |
| transgression | The act of transgressing; the violation of a law or a duty or moral principle. <i>Her transgression of genteel etiquette.</i> |

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| trespass | Break the law. <i>A mass trespass on the moor.</i> |
| usurpation | Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i> |
| violate | Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>They violated the terms of a ceasefire.</i> |
| <u>violation</u> | Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>He claimed a violation of his rights under the Fifth Amendment.</i> |
| violator | Someone who violates the law. <i>A major crackdown on violators of immigration regulations.</i> |
