animate	Belonging to the class of nouns that denote living beings. <i>Gods in a wide variety of forms both animate and inanimate.</i>
catalyst	Something that causes an important event to happen. <i>Chlorine acts as a catalyst promoting the breakdown of ozone.</i>
catalyze	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
cheer	A brief phrase shouted in unison by a crowd typically led by cheerleaders in support of an athletic team. <i>The crowd cheered the demonstrating strikers.</i>
elate	Fill with high spirits; fill with optimism. <i>Their elate and animated faces.</i>
encourage	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>
enliven	Make lively. <i>The visit had clearly enlivened my mother.</i>
exhort	Strongly encourage or urge (someone) to do something. <i>I exhorted her to be a good child.</i>
hearten	Give encouragement to. <i>She was heartened to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
impregnate	Fill with a feeling or quality. <i>The egg was impregnated.</i>
inculcate	Teach (someone) an attitude, idea, or habit by persistent instruction. <i>They will try to inculcate you with a respect for culture.</i>
inflamm	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were inflamed with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>
insert	A shot inserted in a film or video. <i>Claudia inserted her key in the lock.</i>

inspire	Breathe in (air); inhale. <i>He inspired his students with a vision of freedom.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Bring about or initiate (an action or event). <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>instill</u>	Fill, as with a certain quality. <i>Instill medication into my eye.</i>
<u>invigorate</u>	Give strength or energy to. <i>The cold water invigorated him.</i>
<u>invoke</u>	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic. <i>She invoked an ancient law.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Request (something) and present facts and arguments in support of one's request. <i>It is the teacher's job to motivate the child at school.</i>
motivation	Desire or willingness to do something; enthusiasm. <i>The following proposal and motivation is submitted for consideration.</i>
pep	Energy and high spirits; liveliness. <i>He was an enthusiastic player full of pep.</i>
permeable	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i>A frog's skin is permeable to water.</i>
porous	Full of pores or vessels or holes. <i>Our unfenced and largely unpoliced border inevitably has been very porous.</i>
rousing	Capable of arousing enthusiasm or excitement. <i>A rousing speech.</i>
spur	Urge a horse forward by digging one's spurs into its sides. <i>She spurred her horse towards the hedge.</i>
stimulate	Raise levels of physiological or nervous activity in (the body or any biological system). <i>The reader could not fail to be stimulated by the ideas presented.</i>
stimulating	That stimulates. <i>A stimulating discussion.</i>
stimulation	The action of arousing interest, enthusiasm, or excitement. <i>Ovarian stimulation for in vitro fertilization.</i>
transfuse	Transfer (blood or its components) from one person or animal to another. <i>White cells in the transfused blood.</i>
urge	A strong restless desire. <i>Why this urge to travel.</i>
