- *Take (food, drink, or another substance) into the body by swallowing or absorbing it.*



## Synonyms of "Ingest" as a verb (37 Words)

### **absorb**

Take in or soak up (energy or a liquid or other substance) by chemical or physical action.

*She sat in an armchair **absorbed** in a book.*

<b>be absorbed in</b>	Happen, occur, take place.

<b>breakfast</b>	Provide breakfast for. <i>We <b>breakfast</b> at seven.</i>
<b>breakfast on</b>	Eat an early morning meal.
<b>consume</b>	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>People <b>consume</b> a good deal of sugar in drinks.</i>
<b><u>devour</u></b>	Be totally absorbed by a powerful feeling. <i>She spent her evenings <b>devouring</b> the classics.</i>
<b><u>digest</u></b>	Make more concise. <i>The computer <b>digested</b> your labours into a form understandable by a program.</i>
<b>dine</b>	Eat dinner. <i>We often <b>dine</b> with friends in this restaurant.</i>
<b>dine on</b>	Give dinner to; host for dinner.
<b>eat</b>	Eat a meal take a meal. <i>If we had to we could probably <b>eat</b> the cost.</i>
<b>feast on</b>	Partake in a feast or banquet.
<b>gobble</b>	(of a large organization) incorporate or take over (a smaller one). <i>He <b>gobbled</b> up the rest of his sandwich.</i>
<b>gobble down</b>	Make a gurgling sound, characteristic of turkeys.
<b>gulp</b>	Breathe or swallow with difficulty, typically in response to strong emotion. <i>She <b>gulped</b> back the tears.</i>
<b>gulp down</b>	Utter or make a noise, as when swallowing too quickly.
<b>have</b>	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. <i><b>Have</b> you got a job yet.</i>
<b>lunch</b>	Take someone out for lunch. <i>He told his wife he was <b>lunching</b> with a client.</i>
<b>lunch on</b>	Take the midday meal.

<b>munch</b>	Chew noisily. <i>Russell <b>munched</b> his breakfast toast.</i>
<b>munch on</b>	Chew noisily.
<b>partake of</b>	Have some of the qualities or attributes of something.
<b>pay close attention to</b>	Discharge or settle.
<b>scoff</b>	Treat with contemptuous disregard. <i>You a scientist he <b>scoffed</b>.</i>
<b>scoff down</b>	Treat with contemptuous disregard.
<b>swallow</b>	Enclose or envelop completely as if by swallowing. <i>The dark mist <b>swallowed</b> her up.</i>
<b>take</b>	Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs. <i>Let s <b>take</b> Napoleon for instance.</i>
<b>take in</b>	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.
<b>taste</b>	Have a distinctive or characteristic taste. <i>The spinach <b>tastes</b> delicious.</i>
<b>tuck in</b>	Fit snugly into.
<b>tuck into</b>	Make a tuck or several folds in.
<b>wolf</b>	Eat hastily. <i>The teenager <b>wolfed</b> down the pizza.</i>
<b>wolf down</b>	Eat hastily.

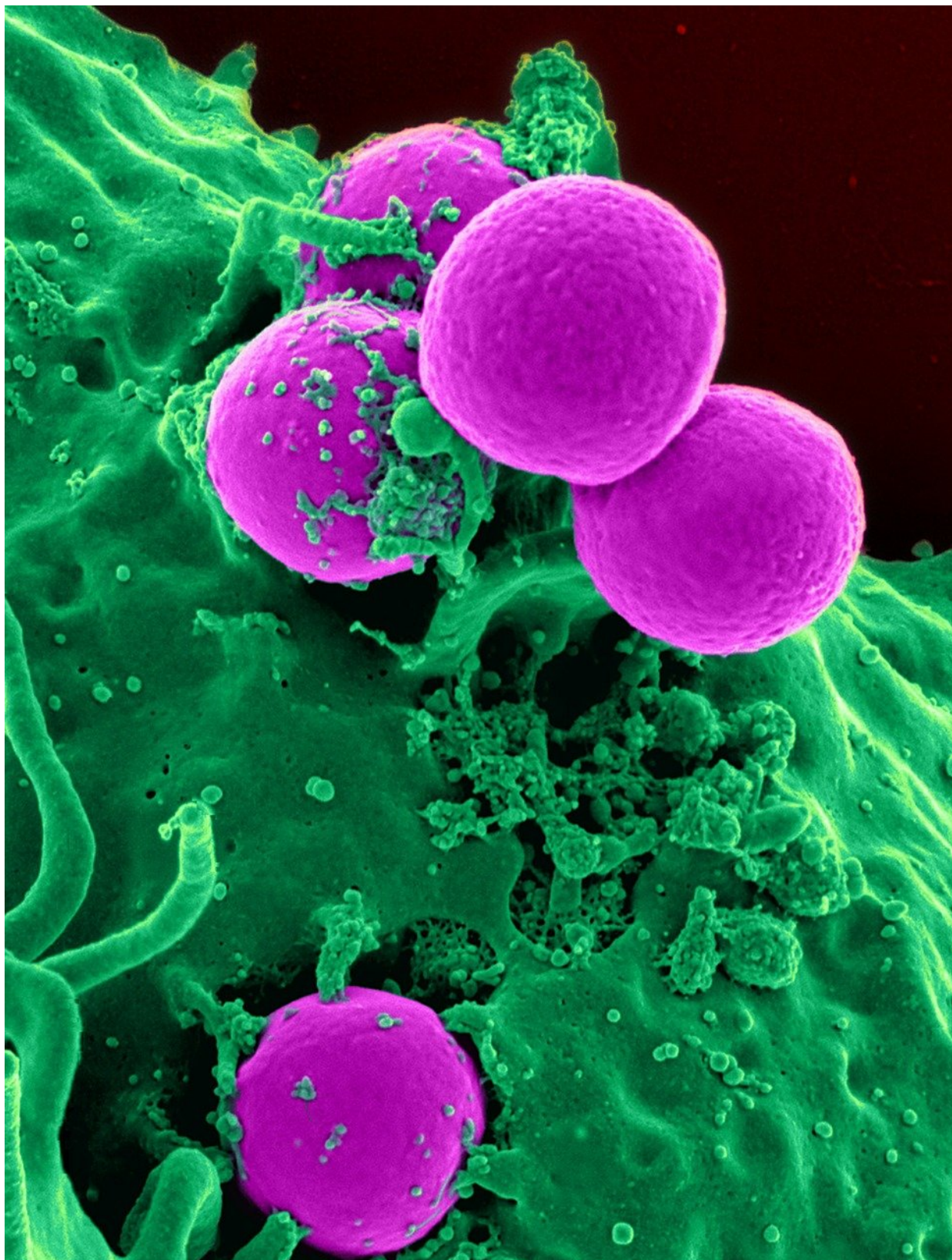




### Usage Examples of "Ingest" as a verb

- *Lead will poison anyone if enough is ingested.*





## Associations of "Ingest" (30 Words)

<b>absorb</b>	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i>The immigrants were quickly <b>absorbed</b> into society.</i>
<b>bite</b>	(of an acid) corrode a surface. <i>Percy's dog had given her a nasty <b>bite</b>.</i>
<b>champ</b>	Chew noisily. <i>He was already on the plane <b>champing</b> to get off to Lagos.</i>
<b>chew</b>	Something that is meant for chewing. <i>He <b>chewed</b> for a moment then swallowed.</i>
<b>chomp</b>	The act of gripping or chewing off with the teeth and jaws. <i>The boy <b>chomped</b> his sandwich.</i>
<b>consume</b>	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>Accounting provides measures of the economic goods and services <b>consumed</b>.</i>
<b>dietary</b>	Relating to or provided by diet. <i><b>Dietary</b> restrictions.</i>
<u><b>digest</b></u>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>A <b>digest</b> of cloned DNA.</i>
<u><b>dinner</b></u>	A party of people assembled to have dinner together. <i>On Sundays they had a large <b>dinner</b> when they returned from church.</i>
<b>eat</b>	Eat a meal take a meal. <i>What did you <b>eat</b> for dinner last night.</i>
<u><b>excrete</b></u>	(of a living organism or cell) separate and expel as waste (a substance, especially a product of metabolism). <i>Excess bicarbonate is <b>excreted</b> by the kidney.</i>
<b>feed</b>	Feed into supply. <i>The baby's morning <b>feed</b>.</i>
<u><b>flavor</b></u>	Lend flavor to.
<b>flavour</b>	A substance used to alter or enhance the taste of food or drink a flavouring. <i>The yoghurt comes in eight fruit <b>flavours</b>.</i>
<b>gastronome</b>	A gourmet. <i><b>Gastronomes</b> will be fascinated by this guide to French cooking.</i>
<b>glutton</b>	A person who is excessively fond of something. <i>He's a <b>glutton</b> for adventure.</i>
<b>gourmand</b>	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess.

<b>hungry</b>	Extremely desirous. <i><b>Hungry</b> for recognition.</i>
<b>ingestion</b>	The process of absorbing information. <i>The quiet <b>ingestion</b> of information.</i>
<b>inhalation</b>	The action of inhaling or breathing in. <i>The <b>inhalation</b> of airborne particles.</i>
<u><b>intake</b></u>	The process of taking food into the body through the mouth (as by eating). <i>She heard his sharp <b>intake</b> of breath.</i>
<b>masticate</b>	Grind and knead. <i>Try to <b>masticate</b> slowly.</i>
<u><b>meal</b></u>	The food eaten during a meal. <i>A bar serving light <b>meals</b>.</i>
<b>mouthful</b>	A long or complicated word or phrase that is difficult to say. <i>Poliomyelitis is a bit of a <b>mouthful</b>.</i>
<b>nip</b>	Sever or remove by pinching or snipping. <i>A keen <b>nip</b> in the air.</i>
<b>phagocytosis</b>	The ingestion of bacteria or other material by phagocytes and amoeboid protozoans.
<b>provender</b>	A stock or supply of foods. <i>There s no one to carry your <b>provender</b> in brown paper bags to the boot of your car.</i>
<u><b>quench</b></u>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <i>Firemen hauled on hoses in a desperate bid to <b>quench</b> the flames.</i>
<b>swallow</b>	The act of swallowing. <i>The dark mist <b>swallowed</b> her up.</i>
<b>thirst</b>	A feeling of needing or wanting to drink something. <i>He is oblivious to all the <b>thirst</b> around him.</i>
