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## Associations of "Inhabited" (30 Words)

<b>abidance</b>	The act of abiding (enduring without yielding).
<b>abide</b>	Dwell. <i>I said I would <b>abide</b> by their decision.</i>
<b>abode</b>	Any address at which you dwell more than temporarily. <i>Their right of <b>abode</b> in Britain.</i>
<b>addressee</b>	One to whom something is addressed. <i>The need to state clearly the <b>addressees</b> of reports.</i>
<b>bide</b>	Remain or stay somewhere. <i>How long must I <b>bide</b> here to wait for the answer.</i>
<b>citizen</b>	A native or naturalized member of a state or other political community. <i>The good <b>citizens</b> of Edinburgh.</i>
<b>colonial</b>	A house built in colonial style. <i>The house was a 1903 <b>colonial</b>.</i>
<b>county</b>	A sporting team playing for a county. <i>The <b>county</b> plans to build a new road.</i>
<b>denizen</b>	A person who inhabits a particular place. <i><b>Denizens</b> of the deep.</i>
<b>domicile</b>	Law the residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>His wife has a <b>domicile</b> of origin in Germany.</i>
<b>dwell</b>	Think moodily or anxiously about something. <i>Don t <b>dwell</b> on the past.</i>
<b>dweller</b>	A person who inhabits a particular place. <i>The majority of urban <b>dwellers</b> live in small apartments.</i>
<b>dwelling</b>	Housing that someone is living in. <i>He built a modest <b>dwelling</b> near the pond.</i>

<b>habitable</b>	Suitable or good enough to live in. <i>The house should be <b>habitable</b> by Christmas.</i>
<b>habitant</b>	An inhabitant. <i>The <b>habitant</b> farmhouses of old Quebec.</i>
<b>habitat</b>	The type of environment in which an organism or group normally lives or occurs. <i>A marine <b>habitat</b>.</i>
<b>habitation</b>	Housing that someone is living in. <i>He studied the creation and <b>inhabitation</b> and demise of the colony.</i>
<b>homestead</b>	Settle land given by the government and occupy it as a homestead.
<b>inhabitant</b>	A person who inhabits a particular place.
<b>lifelong</b>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>From <b>lifelong</b> habit.</i>
<b>live</b>	Lead a certain kind of life live in a certain style. <i>The volcano is very much <b>alive</b>.</i>
<b>living</b>	People who are still living. <i>Save your pity for the <b>living</b>.</i>
<b>mansion</b>	A terrace or mansion block. <i>Carlyle <b>Mansions</b>.</i>
<b>occupy</b>	Occupy the whole of. <i>The young prince will soon <b>occupy</b> the throne.</i>
<b>populate</b>	Form the population of (a place). <i>The island is <b>populated</b> by scarcely 40 000 people.</i>
<b>reside</b>	Be situated. <i>The meaning of an utterance does not wholly <b>reside</b> in the semantic meaning.</i>
<b>residence</b>	A large and imposing house. <i>She took up <b>residence</b> in Paris.</i>
<b>resident</b>	A physician (especially an intern) who lives in a hospital and cares for hospitalized patients under the supervision of the medical staff of the hospital. <i><b>Resident</b> mute swans and wintering Bewick s swans.</i>
<b>stay</b>	Fasten with stays. <i>Please <b>stay</b> the bloodshed.</i>
<b>township</b>	A new area being developed for residential or industrial use by speculators. <i><b>Township</b> theatre.</i>
