- Vested in someone as a right or privilege.
- In the nature of something though not readily apparent.
- Existing as an essential constituent or characteristic.
- Existing in something as a permanent, essential, or characteristic attribute.
- (of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses.

built-in	Existing as an essential constituent or characteristic.
<u>constitutional</u>	Constitutional in the structure of something especially your physical makeup. A <b>constitutional</b> amendment.
deep-rooted	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.
immanent	Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind. We think of God as <b>immanent</b> in nature.
implicit in	Being without doubt or reserve.
inborn	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. People think doctors have <b>inborn</b> compassion.
inbuilt	Existing as an essential constituent or characteristic. The body s <b>inbuilt</b> ability to heal itself.
ingrained	(of dirt or a stain) deeply embedded and thus difficult to remove. The <b>ingrained</b> dirt on the flaking paintwork.



innate	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.
<u>integral</u>	Included as part of a whole rather than supplied separately. A local motion keepeth bodies <b>integral</b> .
<u>intrinsic</u>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature. Access to the arts is <b>intrinsic</b> to a high quality of life.
<u>underlying</u>	Being or involving basic facts or principles. <b>Underlying</b> problems need to be addressed.

antenatal	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i>Antenatal care.</i>
<u>born</u>	British nuclear physicist born in Germany honored for his contributions to quantum mechanics 1882 1970. The sound bite was <b>born</b> in the TV newsroom.
<u>congenital</u>	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. A <b>congenital</b> liar.
distaff	A stick or spindle on to which wool or flax is wound for spinning. Marriage is still the passport to <b>distaff</b> power.
feminine	A feminine word or form. The association of the arts with the <b>feminine</b> .
genetically	In a way that relates to genes or genetics. A <b>genetically</b> inherited condition.
immanent	Of qualities that are spread throughout something. The protection of liberties is <b>immanent</b> in constitutional arrangements.
inborn	Natural to a person or animal. An <b>inborn</b> defect in the formation of collagen.
inherence	The state of inhering; the state of being a fixed characteristic. The <b>inherence</b> of polysemy in human language.



inherited	(of a quality, characteristic, or predisposition) derived genetically from one's parents or ancestors. An <b>inherited</b> disease.
innate	Being talented through inherited qualities. <i>Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.</i>
<u>instinct</u>	Inborn pattern of behavior often responsive to specific stimuli. <b>Instinct</b> told her not to ask the question.
<u>intrinsic</u>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature- John Dewey. Form was treated as something <b>intrinsic</b> as the very essence of the thing.
intuition	A thing that one knows or considers likely from instinctive feeling rather than conscious reasoning. <i>He had an intuition that something had gone wrong.</i>
maternal	(of feelings) typical of a caring mother; motherly. <i>Maternal</i> care.
matriarch	A female head of a family or tribe. A domineering <b>matriarch</b> .
<u>mutual</u>	A mutual building society or insurance company. They cooperated as potentially <b>mutual</b> beneficiaries of the settlement.
<u>nascent</u>	(chiefly of hydrogen) freshly generated in a reactive form. A <b>nascent</b> insurgency.
natal	A port city in northeastern Brazil. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his <b>natal</b> city.</i>
<u>native</u>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e g native bee. The art of the <b>native</b> s of the northwest coast.
<u>parent</u>	Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>His adoptive <b>parent</b>s.</i>
parental	A person's parents. <b>Parental</b> responsibility.
paternal	Of or appropriate to a father. My elders in the newsroom kept a <b>paternal</b> eye on me.
paternity	The act of initiating a new idea or theory or writing. <i>He refused to admit <b>paternity</b> of the child.</i>
predisposition	An inclination beforehand to interpret statements in a particular way. Factors including genetic <b>predisposition</b> .
pregnancy	The condition or period of being pregnant. A straightforward <b>pregnancy</b> .



uncle	A source of help and advice and encouragement. <i>He played <b>uncle</b> to lonely students.</i>
<u>visceral</u>	Relating to deep inward feelings rather than to the intellect. <i>The voters</i> <b>visceral</b> <i>fear of change.</i>
within	Internally or inwardly. Beauty coming from <b>within</b> .
