affront	An action or remark that causes outrage or offence. <i>The sackings were an affront to justice.</i>
atrocities	The quality of being shockingly cruel and inhumane. <i>A textbook which detailed war atrocities.</i>
corruption	Dishonest or fraudulent conduct by those in power, typically involving bribery. <i>The journalist who wants to expose corruption in high places.</i>
crime	An act punishable by law; usually considered an evil act. <i>Crimes of the heart.</i>
disgrace	A state of dishonor. <i>He left the army in disgrace.</i>
evil	That which causes harm or destruction or misfortune- Shakespeare. <i>The evil that men do lives after them the good is oft interred with their bones.</i>
grievance	A complaint about a (real or imaginary) wrong that causes resentment and is grounds for action. <i>A website which enabled staff to air their grievances.</i>
inequity	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial inequity.</i>
iniquity	Morally objectionable behavior. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>
injury	Damage to a person's feelings. <i>She suffered an injury to her back.</i>
misdeed	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior. <i>His past misdeeds were forgiven.</i>
monstrosity	A thing, especially a building, which is very large and unsightly. <i>Had my tone of reason in the face of monstrosity finally registered.</i>
offence	A thing that constitutes a violation of what is judged to be right or natural. <i>Reductions in strategic offence arsenals.</i>
outrage	An action or event causing outrage. <i>The decision was an outrage.</i>
scandal	The outrage or anger caused by a scandalous action or event. <i>It s a scandal that many older patients are dismissed as untreatable.</i>
shabbiness	An unjust act.

sin	An immoral act considered to be a transgression against divine law. <i>He committed the unforgivable sin of refusing to give interviews.</i>
unfairness	Partiality that is not fair or equitable. <i>The multiple unfairnesses the elderly face.</i>
unjustness	The practice of being unjust or unfair.
villainy	The quality of evil by virtue of villainous behavior. <i>The villainy of professional racketeers.</i>
wrong	Any harm or injury resulting from a violation of a legal right. <i>I was trying to teach my children right from wrong.</i>

bias	Cause to be biased. <i>A bias fold.</i>
biased	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. <i>We will not tolerate this biased media coverage.</i>
bigot	A person who is obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, especially one who is prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>A racist bigot.</i>
bigoted	Blindly and obstinately attached to some creed or opinion and intolerant toward others. <i>A bigoted group of reactionaries.</i>
countryman	A man who lives in the country and has country ways. <i>They trust a fellow countryman.</i>
discriminate	Distinguish. <i>Existing employment policies discriminate against women.</i>
discriminatory	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. <i>Discriminatory attitudes and practices.</i>
dispossession	Freeing from evil spirits. <i>The global impact of poverty and dispossession.</i>
eviction	The action of expelling someone from a property; expulsion. <i>The forced eviction of residents.</i>
fractional	Small or tiny in amount. <i>There was a fractional hesitation before he said yes.</i>
fragmentary	Consisting of small disconnected or incomplete parts. <i>Fragmentary remains.</i>
grievance	An official statement of a complaint over something believed to be wrong or unfair. <i>Three pilots have filed grievances against the company.</i>
illiberal	Not generous; mean. <i>Illiberal and anti democratic policies.</i>
inequality	A symbolic expression of the fact that two quantities are not equal. <i>The inequality of the ground hindered their footing.</i>
iniquity	An unjust act. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>

<u>intolerance</u>	Impatience with annoyances. <i>He may have a food intolerance to dairy products.</i>
<u>intolerant</u>	Unable to be given (a medicine or other treatment) or to eat (a food) without adverse effects. <i>He s recently been diagnosed as gluten intolerant.</i>
invidious	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. <i>Invidious comparisons.</i>
<u>partial</u>	Having a liking for. <i>A partial monopoly.</i>
partiality	Unfair bias in favour of one person or thing; favouritism. <i>An attack on the partiality of judges.</i>
prejudice	Give rise to prejudice in someone make biased. <i>Prejudice resulting from delay in the institution of the proceedings.</i>
prejudiced	Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand. <i>A prejudiced judge.</i>
prepossess	Possess beforehand. <i>The idea of his failure prepossesses him.</i>
racism	Prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism by an individual, community, or institution against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular racial or ethnic group, typically one that is a minority or marginalized. <i>A programme to combat racism.</i>
<u>sexist</u>	A person with sexist views. <i>Sexists have no place in our modern political campaigns.</i>
<u>subjective</u>	The subjective case. <i>There is always the danger of making a subjective judgement.</i>
unfair	Not following the rules of a game or sport. <i>It was an unfair trial.</i>
<u>unfavorable</u>	Not encouraging or approving or pleasing. <i>An unfavorable comparison.</i>
wreckage	The remaining parts of something that has been wrecked. <i>Firemen had to cut him free from the wreckage of the car.</i>
<u>wrongly</u>	In an inaccurate manner. <i>Henry wrongly claimed 39 000 of taxpayers money.</i>
