<b><a href="#">countless</a></b>	Too numerous to be counted. <i>She d apologized <b>countless</b> times before.</i>
<b>incalculable</b>	Not able to be computed or enumerated. <i>Under the pressure of anxiety his temper became <b>incalculable</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">infinite</a></b>	Very great in amount or degree. <i>The <b>infinite</b> ingenuity of man.</i>
<b>innumeros</b>	Too many to be counted (often used hyperbolically). <i>The oft quoted statement has been repeated <b>innumeros</b> times.</i>
<b>manifold</b>	Many and various. <i>The appeal of the crusade was <b>manifold</b>.</i>

<b>multifarious</b>	Having many aspects. <i>A vast <b>multifarious</b> organization.</i>
<b>multitudinous</b>	Consisting of or containing many individuals or elements. <i><b>Multitudinous</b> rugs kept us warm.</i>
<b>myriad</b>	Countless or extremely great in number. <i>The <b>myriad</b> political scene.</i>
<b>numberless</b>	Too many to be counted; innumerable. <i>There are <b>numberless</b> questions to be asked.</i>
<b>numerous</b>	Consisting of many members. <i>The family was <b>numerous</b>.</i>
<b>uncounted</b>	Not counted. <i>The numbers could have included previously <b>uncounted</b> children.</i>
<b>unnumberable</b>	Too numerous to be counted.
<b>unnumbered</b>	Too numerous to be counted. <i>The exhibited items are <b>unnumbered</b>.</i>
<b>unnumerable</b>	Too numerous to be counted.
<b>untold</b>	Of an incalculable amount. <i><b>Untold</b> suffering.</i>
<b>very many</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other.

## Associations of "Innumerable" (30 Words)

<b>abundance</b>	(physics) the ratio of the number of atoms of a specific isotope of an element to the total number of isotopes present. <i>Vines and figs grew in <b>abundance</b>.</i>
<b>assorted</b>	Consisting of a haphazard assortment of different kinds. <i>Bowls in <b>assorted</b> colours.</i>
<b>bounty</b>	Payment or reward (especially from a government) for acts such as catching criminals or killing predatory animals or enlisting in the military. <i>They do not qualify for their <b>bounty</b> because they have spent insufficient time at summer camp.</i>

<b>countless</b>	Too numerous to be counted. <i>Countless hours.</i>
<b>dozen</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one. <i>She has <b>dozens</b> of admirers.</i>
<b>enormously</b>	Extremely. <i>He was <b>enormously</b> popular.</i>
<b>galore</b>	Existing in abundance. <i>Whiskey <b>galore</b>.</i>
<b>highly</b>	Favourably. <i>His colleagues think very <b>highly</b> of him.</i>
<b>immeasurable</b>	Too large, extensive, or extreme to measure. <i><b>Immeasurable</b> wealth.</i>
<b>immensely</b>	To a great extent; extremely. <i>Was <b>immensely</b> more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
<b>incalculable</b>	Too great to be calculated or estimated. <i><b>Incalculable</b> riches.</i>
<b>inestimable</b>	Too great to calculate. <i>Jewels of <b>inestimable</b> value.</i>
<b>infinite</b>	A space or quantity that is infinite. <i><b>Infinite</b> wealth.</i>
<b>infinity</b>	An infinite or very great number or amount. <i>The <b>infinity</b> of space.</i>
<b>manifold</b>	Combine or increase by multiplication. <i><b>Manifold</b> reasons.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as' or `too' or `so' or `that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>A good <b>many</b>.</i>
<b>measureless</b>	Without limits in extent or size or quantity. <i>Otto had <b>measureless</b> charm.</i>
<b>much</b>	(quantifier used with mass nouns) great in quantity or degree or extent. <i>Did it hurt <b>much</b>.</i>
<b>multiplicity</b>	A large number or variety. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a <b>multiplicity</b> of factors.</i>
<b>myriad</b>	The cardinal number that is the product of ten and one thousand. <i>He faced a <b>myriad</b> of details.</i>

<b>numberless</b>	Too many to be counted; innumerable. <i>There are <b>numberless</b> questions to be asked.</i>
<b>numerous</b>	Consisting of many members. <i>She had complained to the council on <b>numerous</b> occasions.</i>
<b>outnumber</b>	Be more numerous than. <i>Women <b>outnumbered</b> men by three to one.</i>
<b>plentiful</b>	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. <i>A <b>plentiful</b> year.</i>
<b><u>plethora</u></b>	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>A <b>plethora</b> of committees and subcommittees.</i>
<b><u>plurality</u></b>	The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>Some languages add an extra syllable to mark <b>plurality</b>.</i>
<b>surfeit</b>	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>A <b>surfeit</b> of food and drink.</i>
<b>twelve</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
<b>untold</b>	(of a story or event) not narrated or recounted. <i>Thieves caused <b>untold</b> damage.</i>
<b>variously</b>	In diverse ways. <i>His early successes can be <b>variously</b> accounted for.</i>
