According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “inordinate” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Beyond normal limits.*
- *Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive.*
- *(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour.*

Synonyms of "Inordinate" as an adjective (15 Words)

disproportionate	Not proportionate. <i>Persistent offenders were given sentences that were disproportionate to the offences they had committed.</i>
excessive	Beyond normal limits. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>
exorbitant	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Exorbitant rent.</i>
extreme	Of the greatest possible degree or extent or intensity. <i>Extreme sports like snowboarding.</i>

needless	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>I deplore needless waste.</i>
out of all proportion	Being out or having grown cold.
<u>outrageous</u>	Very bold and unusual and rather shocking. <i>The outrageous claims made by the previous government.</i>
preposterous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
<u>unconscionable</u>	Not right or reasonable. <i>An unconscionable liar.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn't want to show undue excitement.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An unjustifiable restriction on their freedom.</i>
unnecessary	Not necessary. <i>Some people feel that holiday insurance is unnecessary.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Not guided by or based on good sense. <i>Unreasonable demands.</i>
unwarrantable	Not able to be authorized or sanctioned; unjustifiable. <i>An unwarrantable intrusion into personal matters.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>Unwarranted jealousy.</i>

Usage Examples of "Inordinate" as an adjective

- *The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.*
- *A book of inordinate length.*

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The incidents that followed bordered on the absurd.</i>
exaggerated	Regarded or represented as larger, better, or worse than in reality. <i>Thick lenses exaggerated the size of her eyes.</i>
excessive	Beyond normal limits. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>

excessively	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i>Excessively high taxes.</i>
exorbitant	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Exorbitant rent.</i>
extravagant	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. <i>Extravagant gifts like computer games.</i>
groundless	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Your fears are quite groundless.</i>
illogical	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate drinking.</i>
impracticable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved impracticable because of its fragility.</i>
<u>incoherent</u>	Without logical or meaningful connection. <i>A turgid incoherent presentation.</i>
indefensible	Not justifiable by argument. <i>The towns were tactically indefensible.</i>
insupportable	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>He had arrived at a wholly insupportable conclusion.</i>
intemperate	(of weather or climate) not mild; subject to extremes. <i>Intemperate rage.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i>Irrational animals.</i>
<u>overly</u>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
preposterous	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
prodigal	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i>The dessert was prodigal with whipped cream.</i>
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<u>too</u>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>He has a Mercedes too.</i>

<u>undue</u>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn't want to show undue excitement.</i>
<u>unfounded</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was unfounded.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An unjustifiable restriction on their freedom.</i>
<u>unjustified</u>	(of printed text) not justified. <i>Unjustified price increases.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Not reasonable; not showing good judgment. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>
<u>untenable</u>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>
<u>untrue</u>	Not in accordance with fact or reality; false or incorrect. <i>When lovers prove untrue.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Not justified or authorized. <i>Unwarranted limitations of personal freedom.</i>
weariness	Temporary loss of strength and energy resulting from hard physical or mental work. <i>He began to feel weariness.</i>
whimsy	An odd or fanciful or capricious idea. <i>The film is an awkward blend of whimsy and moralizing.</i>
