<b>exorbitant</b>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i><b>Exorbitant</b> rent.</i>
<b>extreme</b>	Of the greatest possible degree or extent or intensity. <i><b>Extreme</b> sports like snowboarding.</i>

<b>needless</b>	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.</i>

<b><u>outrageous</u></b>	Very bold and unusual and rather shocking. <i>The <b>outrageous</b> claims made by the previous government.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.</i>
<b><u>unconscionable</u></b>	Not right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unconscionable</b> liar.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn't want to show <b>undue</b> excitement.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Not necessary. <i>Some people feel that holiday insurance is <b>unnecessary</b>.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Not guided by or based on good sense. <i><b>Unreasonable</b> demands.</i>
<b>unwarrantable</b>	Not able to be authorized or sanctioned; unjustifiable. <i>An <b>unwarrantable</b> intrusion into personal matters.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> jealousy.</i>

<b>exorbitant</b>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i><b>Exorbitant</b> rent.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. <i><b>Extravagant</b> gifts like computer games.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Your fears are quite <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> drinking.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved <b>impracticable</b> because of its fragility.</i>
<b><u>incoherent</u></b>	Without logical or meaningful connection. <i>A turgid <b>incoherent</b> presentation.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Not justifiable by argument. <i>The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>insupportable</b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>He had arrived at a wholly <b>insupportable</b> conclusion.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	(of weather or climate) not mild; subject to extremes. <i><b>Intemperate</b> rage.</i>
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i><b>Irrational</b> animals.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.</i>
<b>prodigal</b>	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i>The dessert was <b>prodigal</b> with whipped cream.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b><u>too</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>He has a Mercedes <b>too</b>.</i>

<b><u>undue</u></b>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn't want to show <b>undue</b> excitement.</i>
<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was <b>unfounded</b>.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b><u>unjustified</u></b>	(of printed text) not justified. <i><b>Unjustified</b> price increases.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Not reasonable; not showing good judgment. <i>An <b>unreasonable</b> request.</i>
<b><u>untenable</u></b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b><u>untrue</u></b>	Not in accordance with fact or reality; false or incorrect. <i>When lovers prove <b>untrue</b>.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Not justified or authorized. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.</i>
<b>weariness</b>	Temporary loss of strength and energy resulting from hard physical or mental work. <i>He began to feel <b>weariness</b>.</i>
<b>whimsy</b>	An odd or fanciful or capricious idea. <i>The film is an awkward blend of <b>whimsy</b> and moralizing.</i>
