## Inputs as a Noun

### Definitions of "Inputs" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “inputs” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A statement that expresses a personal opinion or belief or adds information.*
- *Any stimulating information or event; acts to arouse action.*
- *Signal going into an electronic system.*
- *A component of production; something that goes into the production of output.*



## Synonyms of "Inputs" as a noun (6 Words)

- comment** A written explanation or commentary.  
*She left a **comment** on his post that said So hot.*
- input signal** Signal going into an electronic system.



- remark** A written or spoken comment.  
*I decided to ignore his rude **remarks**.*
- stimulant** A substance that raises levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body.  
*A scalp **stimulant**.*
- stimulation** The raising of levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body or any biological system.  
*The child needs plenty of **stimulation** as bored hands can make mischief.*
- stimulus** Any stimulating information or event; acts to arouse action.  
*If the tax were abolished it would act as a **stimulus** to exports.*

## Associations of "Inputs" (30 Words)

<b>admonition</b>	A firm rebuke. <i>A letter of <b>admonition</b> about the dangers of immorality.</i>
<b>advice</b>	Guidance or recommendations offered with regard to prudent future action. <i>He took my <b>advice</b> and put his house up for sale.</i>
<b>advise</b>	Make a proposal, declare a plan for something. <i>Sleeping pills are not <b>advised</b>.</i>
<b>adviser</b>	A person who gives advice in a particular field. <i>The military <b>adviser</b> to the President.</i>
<b>albedo</b>	The ratio of reflected to incident light. <i>The lunar maria have a lower <b>albedo</b> than the surrounding terrain.</i>
<b>apprise</b>	Inform or tell (someone). <i>I thought it right to <b>apprise</b> Chris of what had happened.</i>



<b><u>counsel</u></b>	Give advice to. <i>The lawyer <b>counselled</b> me when I was accused of tax fraud.</i>
<b>counseling</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.
<b>counselor</b>	A lawyer who pleads cases in court.
<b><u>exhort</u></b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>I <b>exhorted</b> her to be a good child.</i>
<b>exhortation</b>	A communication intended to urge or persuade the recipients to take some action. <i>No amount of <b>exhortation</b> had any effect.</i>
<b>expostulation</b>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest.
<b>feedback</b>	Information about reactions to a product, a person's performance of a task, etc. which is used as a basis for improvement. <i>Punk Rock Girl opens the disc with plenty of guitar <b>feedback</b>.</i>
<b>guidance</b>	The act of setting and holding a course. <i>A laser <b>guidance</b> system.</i>
<b><u>maxim</u></b>	English inventor (born in the United States) who invented the Maxim gun that was used in World War I (1840-1916). <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>monition</b>	A summons issued after the filing of a libel or claim directing all parties concerned to show cause why the judgment asked for should not be granted. <i>A letter of <b>admonition</b> about the dangers of immorality.</i>
<b>oxygenation</b>	The process of providing or combining or treating with oxygen. <i>The <b>oxygenation</b> of the blood.</i>
<b>proposal</b>	The act of making a proposal. <i>The <b>proposal</b> of a flexible school leaving age.</i>
<b><u>proposition</u></b>	(logic) a statement that affirms or denies something and is either true or false. <i>She had been <b>propositioned</b> at the party by a subeditor with bad breath.</i>
<b><u>reciprocate</u></b>	Alternate the direction of motion of. <i>The engine <b>reciprocates</b> the propeller.</i>
<b>recommendation</b>	Any quality or characteristic that gains a person a favorable reception or acceptance or admission. <i>He selected his staff by personal <b>recommendation</b>.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Say something as a comment; mention. <i>He <b>remarked</b> that he had some work to finish.</i>

<b>response</b>	The way in which a mechanical or electrical device responds to a stimulus or stimuli. <i>We unwittingly induce Pavlovian type <b>responses</b> in dogs by establishing a rigid routine for feeding.</i>
<b>sage</b>	Of the grey green color of sage leaves.
<b>stimulation</b>	The effect of a stimulus (on nerves or organs etc). <i>Ovarian <b>stimulation</b> for in vitro fertilization.</i>
<b>suggestion</b>	An idea or belief accepted by a person as a result of suggestion. <i>It was a <b>suggestion</b> we couldn't refuse.</i>
<b><u>testimonial</u></b>	A public tribute to someone and to their achievements. <i>A <b>testimonial</b> match.</i>
<b>tip</b>	Give a tip or gratuity to in return for a service beyond the compensation agreed on. <i>The rubber <b>tip</b> of the walking stick.</i>
<b>urge</b>	Try earnestly or persistently to persuade (someone) to do something. <i>I <b>urged</b> him to finish his studies.</i>
<b>warning</b>	Notification of something, usually in advance. <i>She had only had four days <b>warning</b> before leaving Berlin.</i>
