Definitions of "Inputs" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “inputs” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A statement that expresses a personal opinion or belief or adds information.*
- *Any stimulating information or event; acts to arouse action.*
- *Signal going into an electronic system.*
- *A component of production; something that goes into the production of output.*



Synonyms of "Inputs" as a noun (6 Words)


- comment** A written explanation or commentary.
*She left a **comment** on his post that said So hot.*
- input signal** Signal going into an electronic system.

remark	A written or spoken comment. <i>I decided to ignore his rude remarks.</i>
stimulant	A substance that raises levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body. <i>A scalp stimulant.</i>
stimulation	The raising of levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body or any biological system. <i>The child needs plenty of stimulation as bored hands can make mischief.</i>
<u>stimulus</u>	Any stimulating information or event; acts to arouse action. <i>If the tax were abolished it would act as a stimulus to exports.</i>

Associations of "Inputs" (30 Words)

admonition	A firm rebuke. <i>A letter of admonition about the dangers of immorality.</i>
advice	Guidance or recommendations offered with regard to prudent future action. <i>He took my advice and put his house up for sale.</i>
advise	Make a proposal, declare a plan for something. <i>Sleeping pills are not advised.</i>
adviser	A person who gives advice in a particular field. <i>The military adviser to the President.</i>
albedo	The ratio of reflected to incident light. <i>The lunar maria have a lower albedo than the surrounding terrain.</i>
apprise	Inform or tell (someone). <i>I thought it right to apprise Chris of what had happened.</i>

<u>counsel</u>	Give advice to. <i>The lawyer counselled me when I was accused of tax fraud.</i>
counseling	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.
counselor	A lawyer who pleads cases in court.
<u>exhort</u>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>I exhorted her to be a good child.</i>
exhortation	A communication intended to urge or persuade the recipients to take some action. <i>No amount of exhortation had any effect.</i>
expostulation	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest.
feedback	Information about reactions to a product, a person's performance of a task, etc. which is used as a basis for improvement. <i>Punk Rock Girl opens the disc with plenty of guitar feedback.</i>
guidance	The act of setting and holding a course. <i>A laser guidance system.</i>
<u>maxim</u>	English inventor (born in the United States) who invented the Maxim gun that was used in World War I (1840-1916). <i>The maxim that actions speak louder than words.</i>
monition	A summons issued after the filing of a libel or claim directing all parties concerned to show cause why the judgment asked for should not be granted. <i>A letter of admonition about the dangers of immorality.</i>
oxygenation	The process of providing or combining or treating with oxygen. <i>The oxygenation of the blood.</i>
proposal	The act of making a proposal. <i>The proposal of a flexible school leaving age.</i>
<u>proposition</u>	(logic) a statement that affirms or denies something and is either true or false. <i>She had been propositioned at the party by a subeditor with bad breath.</i>
<u>reciprocate</u>	Alternate the direction of motion of. <i>The engine reciprocates the propeller.</i>
recommendation	Any quality or characteristic that gains a person a favorable reception or acceptance or admission. <i>He selected his staff by personal recommendation.</i>
remark	Say something as a comment; mention. <i>He remarked that he had some work to finish.</i>

response	The way in which a mechanical or electrical device responds to a stimulus or stimuli. <i>We unwittingly induce Pavlovian type responses in dogs by establishing a rigid routine for feeding.</i>
sage	Of the grey green color of sage leaves.
stimulation	The effect of a stimulus (on nerves or organs etc). <i>Ovarian stimulation for in vitro fertilization.</i>
suggestion	An idea or belief accepted by a person as a result of suggestion. <i>It was a suggestion we couldn't refuse.</i>
<u>testimonial</u>	A public tribute to someone and to their achievements. <i>A testimonial match.</i>
tip	Give a tip or gratuity to in return for a service beyond the compensation agreed on. <i>The rubber tip of the walking stick.</i>
urge	Try earnestly or persistently to persuade (someone) to do something. <i>I urged him to finish his studies.</i>
warning	Notification of something, usually in advance. <i>She had only had four days warning before leaving Berlin.</i>
