avid

Having an eager desire for.
*The esurient eyes of an **avid** curiosity.*

compulsive

(of a person) acting as a result of an irresistible urge.
***Compulsive** eating.*

eager

Strongly wanting to do or have something.
*Young intellectuals **eager** for knowledge.*

gluttonous

Excessively greedy.
*A **gluttonous** debauch.*

greedy

Wanting to eat or drink more than one can reasonably consume.
*People driven from their land by **greedy** developers.*

hungry

Extremely desirous.
***Hungry** for recognition.*

insatiate

Never satisfied.
*An **insatiate** appetite.*

keen	(of a smell, light, or sound) penetrating; clear. <i>John was keen to help.</i>
omnivorous	Indiscriminate in taking in or using whatever is available. <i>An omnivorous reader.</i>
prodigious	Of momentous or ominous significance- Herman Melville. <i>The young Mozart s prodigious talents.</i>
rapacious	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>The rapacious wolf.</i>
ravening	Living by preying on other animals especially by catching living prey. <i>They turned on each other like ravening wolves.</i>
ravenous	Extremely hungry. <i>A ravenous appetite.</i>
unappeasable	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>Divine unappeasable justice.</i>
uncontrollable	Impossible to repress or control. <i>Uncontrollable children.</i>
uncontrolled	Not controlled. <i>Uncontrolled growth.</i>
unquenchable	Impossible to quench. <i>His enthusiasm was unquenchable.</i>
unsatiable	Impossible to satisfy. <i>His passion for work was unsatiable.</i>
voracious	Wanting or devouring great quantities of food. <i>Paying taxes to voracious governments.</i>
wolfish	Resembling or likened to a wolf, especially in being rapacious, voracious, or lascivious. <i>Wolfish rapacity.</i>

gluttonous	Excessively greedy. <i>A gluttonous appetite for food and praise and pleasure.</i>
gourmand	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess.
greedy	Having or showing an intense and selfish desire for wealth or power. <i>People driven from their land by greedy developers.</i>
hedonistic	Devoted to pleasure. <i>A hedonistic existence of booze drugs and parties.</i>
<u>hunger</u>	Feel or suffer hunger. <i>They died from cold and hunger.</i>
hungry	Feeling hunger; feeling a need or desire to eat food. <i>I always find art galleries hungry work.</i>
lupine	Any plant of the genus <i>Lupinus</i> ; bearing erect spikes of usually purplish-blue flowers.
porcine	Repellently fat. <i>A bald porcine old man.</i>

rapacious	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>The rapacious wolf.</i>
raptorial	(of a bird or other animal) predatory. <i>Raptorial birds.</i>
ravening	Living by preying on other animals especially by catching living prey. <i>Ravening wolves.</i>
<u>ravenous</u>	Extremely hungry. <i>I d been out all day and was ravenous.</i>
slake	Make less active or intense. <i>Slake your thirst with citron press.</i>
<u>starve</u>	Die of food deprivation. <i>She left her animals to starve.</i>
tantalize	Harass with persistent criticism or carping. <i>Such ambitious questions have long tantalized the world s best thinkers.</i>
thirst	Lack of the liquid needed to sustain life. <i>A thirst for knowledge.</i>
<u>unquenchable</u>	Not able to be quenched. <i>Unquenchable thirst.</i>
<u>unsatisfactory</u>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Her performance proved to be unsatisfactory.</i>
<u>unsatisfied</u>	Not having been satisfied. <i>The compromise left all sides unsatisfied.</i>
<u>voracious</u>	Engaging in an activity with great eagerness or enthusiasm. <i>Paying taxes to voracious governments.</i>
yearning	Involving or expressing yearning. <i>A yearning hope.</i>
