- The state of being subject to danger or injury.






Synonyms of "Insecurity" as a noun (25 Words)

| hesitancy | A certain degree of unwillingness. Jackson took advantage of some hesitancy in the defence to rifle in a shot. |
| humbleness | A disposition to be humble; a lack of false pride. |
| humility | The quality of having a modest or low view of one's importance. <i>He needs the humility to accept that their way may be better.</i> |
| inhibition | An order or writ of prohibition, especially against dealing with a specified piece of land or property. She showed an enthusiasm for sex and a lack of inhibition which was entirely alien to him. |



| lack of confidence | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable. |

| lack of protection | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable. |
| lack of self-confidence | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable. |
| loose | Loose play. He was in powerful form in the loose . |
| meekness | The fact or condition of being meek; submissiveness. All his best friends make fun of him for his meekness . |
| nervousness | A sensitive or highly strung temperament. There was a trace of nervousness in his voice. |
| peril | Serious and immediate danger. You could well place us both in peril . |
| perilousness | The state of being dangerous. |
| riskiness | A state of danger involving risk. |
| self-consciousness | Self-awareness plus the additional realization that others are similarly aware of you. |
| self-doubt | Lack of self-confidence. |
| timidity | Fearfulness in venturing into new and unknown places or activities. She believes everyone can overcome their timidity . |
| timidness | Fear of the unknown or unfamiliar or fear of making decisions. |
| timorousness | Fear of the unknown or unfamiliar or fear of making decisions. |
| unassertiveness | Diffidence about self promotion. |
| <u>uncertainty</u> | The state of being uncertain. The uncertainty of the outcome. |
| vulnerability | The state of being vulnerable or exposed. Conservation authorities have realized the vulnerability of the local population. |
| wobbly | A member of the Industrial Workers of the World. My daughter threw a wobbly when I wouldn t let her play. |





| <u>afraid</u> | Worried that something undesirable will occur or be done. <i>Afraid</i> of hard work. |

| <u>anguish</u> | Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. Philip gave a cry of anguish . |
| anguished | Experiencing intense pain especially mental pain. An anguished conscience. |
| anxiety | A vague unpleasant emotion that is experienced in anticipation of some (usually ill-defined) misfortune. <i>He felt a surge of anxiety</i> . |
| anxious | Very eager or concerned to do something or for something to happen. <i>Cast anxious glances behind her.</i> |
| apprehension | The action of arresting someone. <i>He felt sick with apprehension</i> . |



| apprehensive | Relating to perception or understanding. <i>Apprehensive</i> about her job. |

| <u>awkwardness</u> | The quality of an embarrassing situation. The awkwardness of youth. |
| concerned | Culpably involved. The villagers are concerned about burglaries. |
| disquiet | The trait of seeming ill at ease. Public disquiet about animal testing. |
| distressed | Suffering severe physical strain or distress. The distressed relatives of his victims. |
| fear | Be afraid or feel anxious or apprehensive about a possible or probable situation or event. I cowered in fear as bullets whizzed past. |
| fraught | Causing or affected by anxiety or stress. An incident fraught with danger. |
| harried | Feeling strained as a result of having demands persistently made on one; harassed. A harried expression. |
| hesitation | The action of pausing before saying or doing something. I have no hesitation in recommending him. |
| <u>insecure</u> | (of a job or situation) liable to change for the worse; not permanent or settled. An insecure computer system. |
| misgiving | Doubt about someone's honesty. We have misgiving s about the way the campaign is being run. |
| neurosis | (in non-technical use) excessive and irrational anxiety or obsession. Too much neurosis about a child s progress is unproductive. |
| neurotically | In a neurotic manner. |
| phobic | A person with an extreme or irrational fear of or aversion to something. <i>A snake phobic</i> . |
| <u>precarious</u> | Not secure; beset with difficulties. A precarious ladder. |
| solicitude | A feeling of excessive concern. I was touched by his solicitude . |
| stressed | Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>Stressed</i> workers reported smoking more. |
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| <u>troubled</u> | Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. Troubled areas. |

| <u>uncertain</u> | Not consistent or dependable. Changes of great if uncertain consequences. |
| <u>uncertainty</u> | Being unsettled or in doubt or dependent on chance. <i>The uncertainty of the outcome.</i> |
| uneasiness | A feeling of anxiety or discomfort. The media often express a general uneasiness with animal research. |
| <u>uneasy</u> | Causing or feeling anxiety; troubled or uncomfortable. Farmers were uneasy until rain finally came. |
| upset | The act of upsetting something. The foreign team upset the local team. |
| worried | Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. There was a worried frown on his face. |
