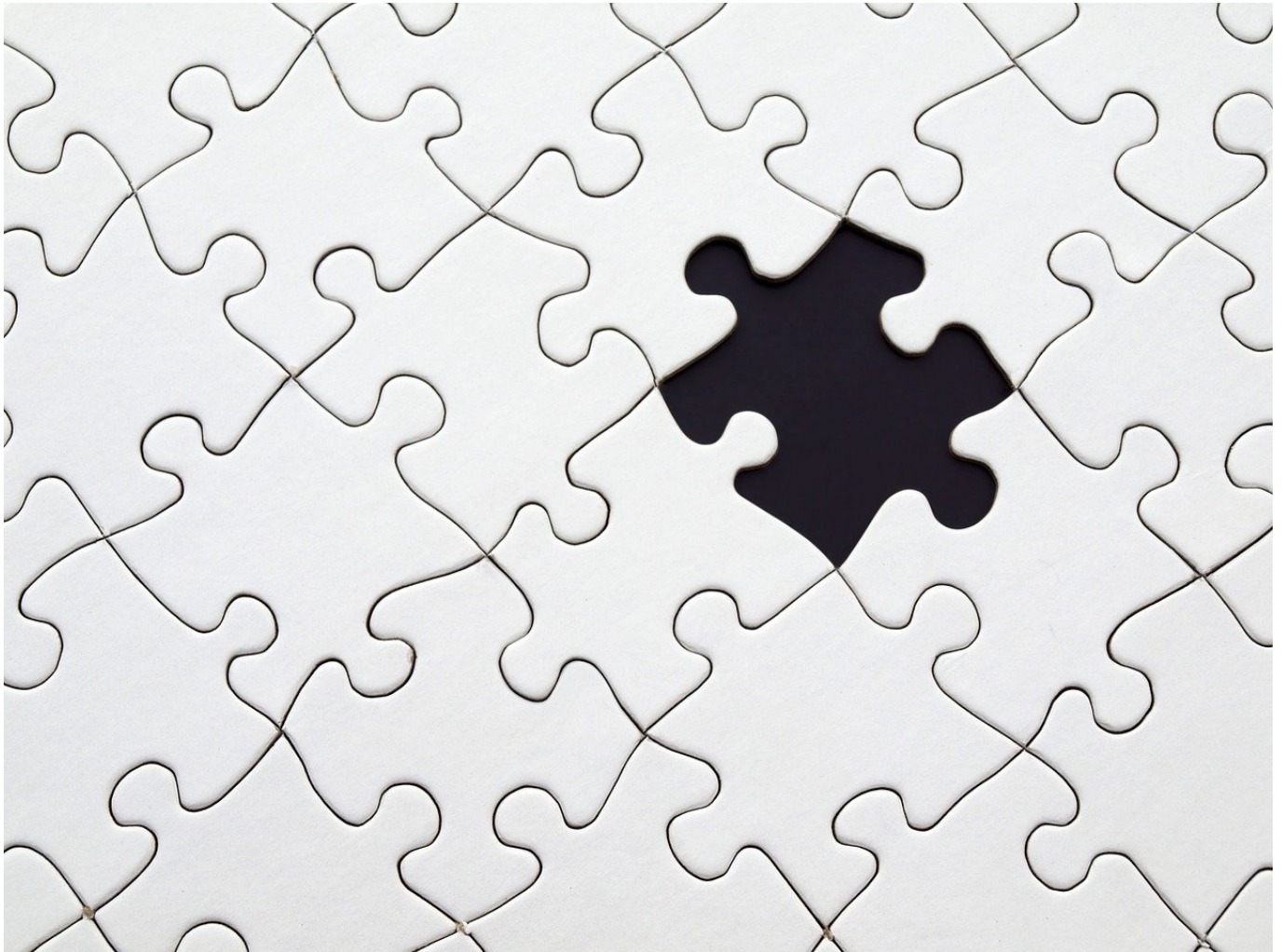

### Definitions of "Insert" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “insert” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A folded section placed between the leaves of another publication.*
- *(film) a still picture that is introduced and that interrupts the action of a film.*
- *A loose page or section in a magazine or other publication, typically one carrying an advertisement.*
- *A shot inserted in a film or video.*
- *A printed card supplied with a CD or DVD and giving information about it.*
- *(broadcasting) a local announcement inserted into a network program.*
- *A still picture that is introduced and that interrupts the action of a film.*
- *An artifact that is inserted or is to be inserted.*
- *A local announcement inserted into a network program.*
- *An ornamental section of cloth or needlework inserted into a garment.*

<b>enclosure</b>	The process or policy of fencing in wasteland or common land so as to make it private property, as pursued in much of Britain in the 18th and early 19th centuries. <i>The cemetery lay within a high walled <b>enclosure</b>.</i>
<b>inlay</b>	A material or substance that is used as an inlay. <i>Ivory <b>inlays</b> that decorated wooden furnishings.</i>
<b>insertion</b>	An amendment or addition inserted in a text. <i>Close to the point of leaf <b>insertion</b>.</i>

## Insert as a Verb

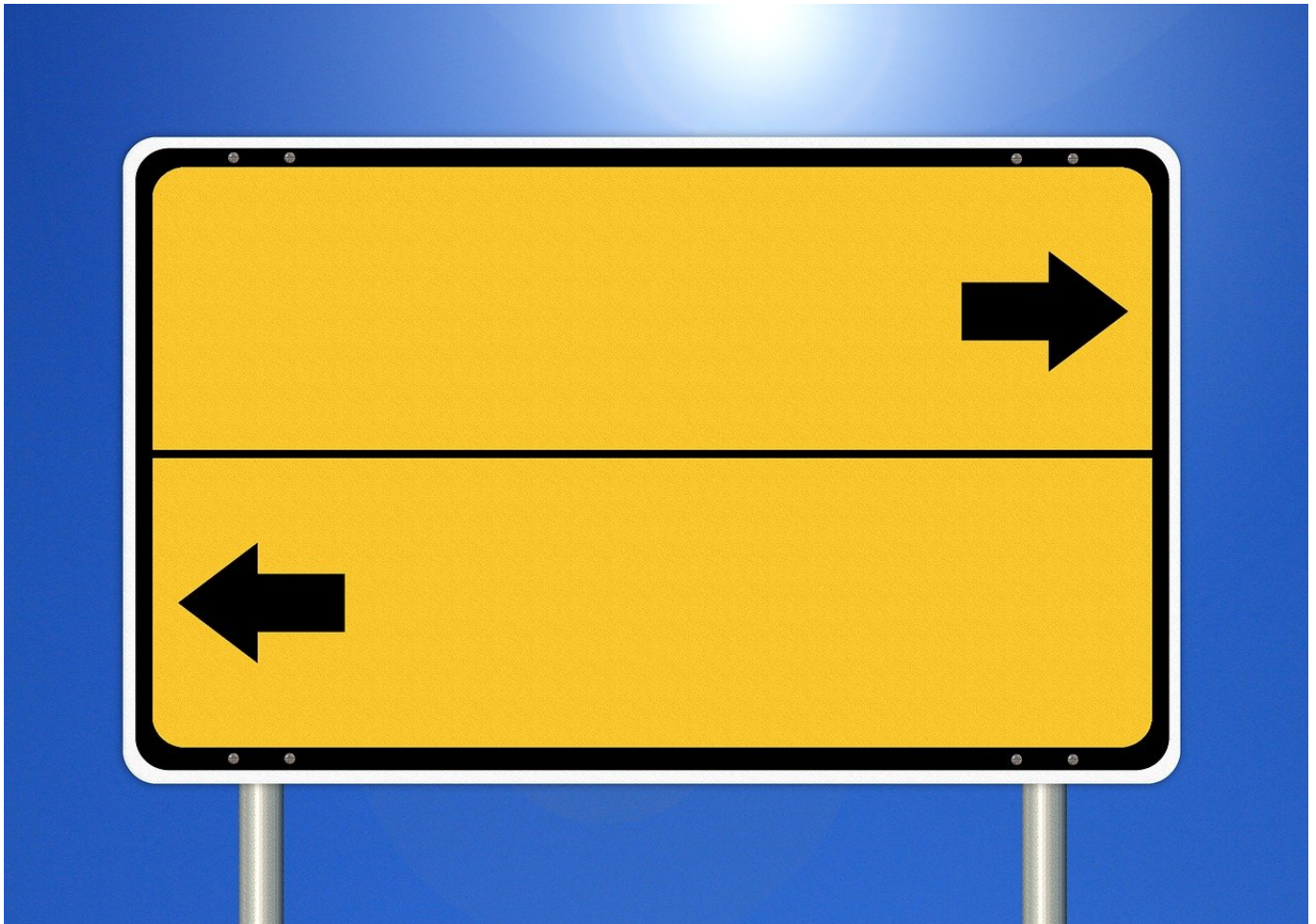
### Definitions of "Insert" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "insert" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Incorporate (a piece of genetic material) into a chromosome.*
- *Introduce.*
- *(of a muscle or other organ) be attached to a part, especially that which is moved.*
- *Place (a spacecraft or satellite) into an orbit or trajectory.*



- *Fit snugly into.*
- *Include (text) in a piece of writing.*
- *Put or introduce into something.*
- *Place, fit, or push (something) into something else.*
- *Place, fit, or thrust (something) into another thing.*
- *Insert casually.*

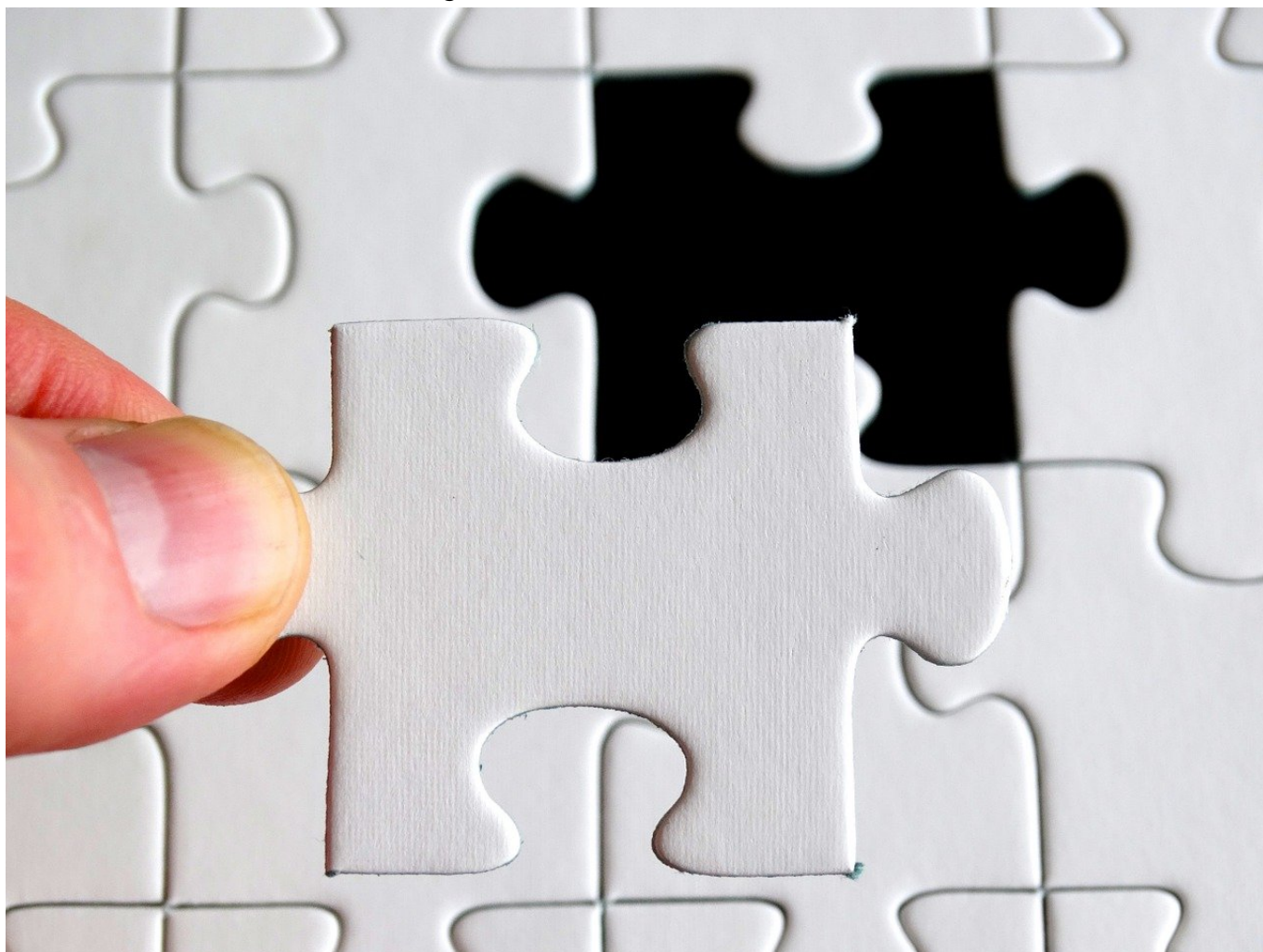


## Synonyms of "Insert" as a verb (29 Words)

<b>build</b>	Build or establish something abstract. <b>Build</b> detergents.
<b>enclose</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>I <b>enclose</b> a copy of the job description.</i>
<b>enter</b>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <b>Enter</b> a drug treatment program.

<b>fit</b>	Be the right size or shape fit correctly or as desired. <i>An MSc <b>fits</b> the student for a professional career.</i>
<b>inclose</b>	Place, fit, or thrust (something) into another thing.
<b>incorporate</b>	Include or contain; have as a component. <i>Add the cheeses and butter and process briefly to <b>incorporate</b> them.</i>
<b>infix</b>	Attach a morpheme into a stem word. <i>The particles of mercury will <b>infix</b> themselves in the structure of the other metal.</i>
<b>inset</b>	Decorate with an inset. <i>Washbasins are usually <b>inset</b> into a toilet table to form a vanity unit.</i>
<b><u>install</u></b>	Place. <i>He was <b>installed</b> as Prime Minister in 1966.</i>
<b>interject</b>	To insert between other elements. <i>Christina felt bound to <b>interject</b> before there was open warfare.</i>
<b>interpolate</b>	Insert (words) in a book or other text, especially in order to give a false impression as to its date. <i>Illustrations were <b>interpolated</b> in the text.</i>
<b>interpose</b>	Get involved, so as to alter or hinder an action, or through force or threat of force. <i>If I might <b>interpose</b> a personal remark here.</i>
<b>introduce</b>	Put or introduce into something. <i>A longer more lyrical opening which <b>introduces</b> a courting song.</i>
<b>load</b>	Place a load or large quantity of something on or in a vehicle ship container etc. <i><b>Load</b> the cassette into the camcorder.</i>
<b>lodge</b>	Be a lodger stay temporarily. <i>The money is <b>lodged</b> in a bank.</i>
<b>place</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>They <b>placed</b> a contract for three boats.</i>
<b>position</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>She <b>positioned</b> herself on a bench.</i>
<b>press</b>	Create by pressing. <i>Rose did not <b>press</b> the point.</i>
<b><u>push</u></b>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>Competition in the retail sector will <b>push</b> down prices.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>To <b>put</b> it bluntly he was not really divorced.</i>

<b>put in</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>slide</b>	Move obliquely or sideways, usually in an uncontrolled manner. <i>The country faces the prospect of sliding from recession into slump.</i>
<b>slip</b>	Move obliquely or sideways, usually in an uncontrolled manner. <i>A beautiful woman s address was never likely to <b>slip</b> his mind.</i>
<b>slip in</b>	Pass out of one's memory.
<b>slot</b>	Place an object into a slot typically one specifically designed to receive it. <i>I can <b>slot</b> you in at 3 15 if that works for you.</i>
<b>sneak in</b>	Make off with belongings of others.
<b>stick in</b>	Stick to firmly.
<b>tuck</b>	Make a tuck or several folds in. <i>She <b>tucked</b> her legs under her.</i>

A person who adapts a text to make it suitable for filming, broadcasting, or the stage.

*A tube fixed to the cleaner by means of an **adapter**.*

<b>addition</b>	The action or process of adding something to something else. <i>He was a new <b>addition</b> to the staff.</i>
<b>conversation</b>	A talk, especially an informal one, between two or more people, in which news and ideas are exchanged. <i>The two men were deep in <b>conversation</b>.</i>
<b>dental</b>	A dental consonant. <i><b>Dental</b> health.</i>
<b>dose</b>	Administer a dose to a person or animal. <i>He took a <b>dose</b> of cough mixture.</i>
<b>embed</b>	A journalist who is attached to a military unit during a conflict. <i>The Victorian values <b>embedded</b> in Tennyson s poetry.</i>
<b>enter</b>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>They won every race they <b>entered</b>.</i>
<b>implant</b>	Provide someone or something with something by implantation. <i>The egg fertilized in vitro <b>implanted</b> in the uterus of the birth mother with no further complications.</i>
<b><u>imprint</u></b>	Impress or stamp (a mark or outline) on a surface. <i>The bird thought I was its mother and <b>imprinted</b> on me.</i>
<b>infix</b>	Implant or insert firmly in something. <i>It is a habit of thought deeply <b>infix</b>ed in modern readers.</i>
<b>infuse</b>	Instil (a quality) in someone or something. <i>Some physiologists <b>infuses</b> sugar solutions into the veins of animals.</i>
<b>infusion</b>	The process of preparing an infusion. <i>An <b>infusion</b> of youthful talent.</i>
<b>injection</b>	Any solution that is injected (as into the skin). <i>An <b>injection</b> of capital was needed.</i>
<b><u>instill</u></b>	Produce or try to produce a vivid impression of. <i>Her presence <b>instilled</b> faith into the children.</i>
<b>interfere</b>	Cause interference to a broadcast radio signal. <i>A holiday job would <b>interfere</b> with his studies.</i>
<b>interpolation</b>	The insertion of something of a different nature into something else. <i>The <b>interpolation</b> formula.</i>
<b>interpose</b>	Introduce. <i>God <b>interposed</b> death.</i>
<b>interposition</b>	The action of interposing someone or something. <i>The <b>interposition</b> of members between tiers of management.</i>



<b><u>intervene</u></b>	Occur between other event or between certain points of time. <i>The war <b>intervened</b> between the birth of her two children.</i>
<b>intravenous</b>	Within or by means of a vein. <i>An <b>intravenous</b> inflammation.</i>
<b>meddle</b>	Touch or handle (something) without permission. <i>Don't <b>meddle</b> in my affairs.</i>
<b>plasma</b>	A fourth state of matter distinct from solid or liquid or gas and present in stars and fusion reactors a gas becomes a plasma when it is heated until the atoms lose all their electrons leaving a highly electrified. <i><b>Plasma</b> physics.</i>
<b><u>plug</u></b>	A circular piece of metal rubber or plastic used to stop the plughole of a bath or basin and keep the water in it. <i><b>Plug</b> the hole.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>To <b>put</b> it bluntly he was not really divorced.</i>
<b>socket</b>	Place in or fit with a socket. <i>The eye <b>socket</b>.</i>
<b><u>stitch</u></b>	Make mend or join something with stitches. <i>Hand <b>stitched</b> dresses.</i>
<b>transfuse</b>	Transfer (blood or its components) from one person or animal to another. <i>It is usual to <b>transfuse</b> blood screened for cytomegalovirus.</i>
<b>transfusion</b>	The action of pouring a liquid from one vessel to another. <i>Major bleeding necessitating <b>transfusions</b>.</i>
<b>tuck</b>	Make a tuck or several folds in. <i>She <b>tucked</b> her arm into his.</i>
<b>venous</b>	Of or contained in or performing the function of the veins.
