<b>irrelevant</b>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>Theory can sometimes be hastily dismissed as <b>irrelevant</b> to the classroom.</i>
<b>meagre</b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>They were forced to supplement their <b>meagre</b> earnings.</i>
<b>negligible</b>	Not worth considering. <i>He said that the risks were <b>negligible</b>.</i>
<b>not worth mentioning</b>	Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically).
<b>not worth speaking of</b>	Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically).
<b>nugatory</b>	Useless or futile. <i>A <b>nugatory</b> law.</i>
<b>of little consequence</b>	Small and of little importance.

<b><u>pointless</u></b>	Having little or no sense, use, or purpose. <i>It s <b>pointless</b> to plan too far ahead.</i>
<b>scanty</b>	Lacking in magnitude or quantity. <i>Her dress was <b>scanty</b> and revealing.</i>
<b>trifling</b>	Unimportant or trivial. <i>A <b>trifling</b> sum.</i>
<b><u>trivial</u></b>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>A <b>trivial</b> mind.</i>
<b><u>unimportant</u></b>	Devoid of importance, meaning, or force. <i>Trivial and <b>unimportant</b> details.</i>

<b>frivolous</b>	Not serious in content or attitude or behavior. <i>Rules to stop <b>frivolous</b> lawsuits.</i>
<b><u>inconsequential</u></b>	Not important or significant. <i>His work seems trivial and <b>inconsequential</b>.</i>
<b>inconsiderable</b>	Too small or unimportant to merit attention. <i>A not <b>inconsiderable</b> artist.</i>
<b>least</b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e g least shrew. <i>He has the <b>least</b> talent of anyone.</i>
<b><u>marginal</u></b>	Relating to water adjacent to the land's edge or coast. <i><b>Marginal</b> writing ability.</i>
<b>meanness</b>	Aggressive character; viciousness. <i>He is also callous with a streak of <b>meanness</b>.</i>
<b><u>mere</u></b>	Used to emphasize that the fact of something being present in a situation is enough to influence that situation. <i>Shocked by the <b>mere</b> idea.</i>
<b>mini</b>	Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A bouquet of <b>mini</b> carnations.</i>
<b>miniature</b>	Very small of its kind. <i>She saw her own reflection <b>miniatured</b>.</i>
<b><u>minimal</u></b>	Characterized by the use of simple forms or structures, especially geometric or massive ones. <i><b>Minimal</b> simple evening dresses in luxurious fabrics.</i>
<b><u>minimum</u></b>	The least possible. <i>Keep costs to a <b>minimum</b>.</i>
<b><u>minor</u></b>	Of a premise containing the minor term in a categorical syllogism. <i>A <b>minor</b> share of the profits.</i>
<b><u>negligible</u></b>	So small or unimportant as to be not worth considering; insignificant. <i>The effect was <b>negligible</b>.</i>
<b>nominal</b>	Expressed in terms of current prices or figures, without making allowance for changes over time. <i>A <b>nominal</b> group.</i>
<b>peccadillo</b>	A relatively minor fault or sin. <i>The sexual <b>peccadilloes</b> of celebrities aren't necessarily news.</i>

<b>pettiness</b>	Undue concern with trivial matters, especially of a small-minded or spiteful nature. <i>These awesome moments lift us above the <b>pettiness</b> of the world.</i>
<b>petty</b>	Of little importance; trivial. <i>A <b>petty</b> official.</i>
<b>picayune</b>	A small coin of little value, especially a 5-cent piece. <i>Giving a police officer a free meal may be against the law but it seems to be a <b>picayune</b> infraction.</i>
<b>piddling</b>	Pathetically trivial; trifling. <i><b>Piddling</b> little questions.</i>
<b><u>secondary</u></b>	A secondary school. <i>The lead acid accumulator used in cars consists of <b>secondary</b> cells.</i>
<b>slight</b>	Pay no attention to, disrespect. <i>A Council determined whether the Fort should be kept or <b>slighted</b>.</i>
<b><u>tenuous</u></b>	Very weak or slight. <i>A <b>tenuous</b> argument.</i>
<b>trifling</b>	The deliberate act of delaying and playing instead of working. <i>A <b>trifling</b> sum.</i>
<b><u>trivial</u></b>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>A <b>trivial</b> young woman.</i>
<b>undersized</b>	Smaller than normal for its kind. <i>The <b>undersized</b> cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
<b>undistinguished</b>	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>An <b>undistinguished</b> career.</i>
<b><u>unimportant</u></b>	Lacking in importance or significance. <i>Trivial and <b>unimportant</b> details.</i>
<b>unreported</b>	Not reported. <i>Many human rights abuses went <b>unreported</b>.</i>
