- bad mannered** Feeling physical discomfort or pain (‘tough’ is occasionally used colloquially for ‘bad’).
- bald-faced** Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times.
- barefaced** With no effort to conceal.
*His years of working **barefaced** breathing down dust.*
- bodacious** Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times.
*A **bodacious** gossip.*
- brassy** Resembling brass in colour.
*Audience members are tapping their feet to the **brassy** music of the band.*

<u>brazen</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>The music s brazen chords.</i>
brazen-faced	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times.
cheeky	(of something pleasurable) consumed or done in an unplanned, rather self-indulgent way. <i>A cheeky pint.</i>
<u>contemptuous</u>	Expressing extreme contempt. <i>She was intolerant and contemptuous of the majority of the human race.</i>
<u>discourteous</u>	Showing rudeness and a lack of consideration for other people. <i>It would be unkind and discourteous to decline a visit.</i>
disrespectful	Neither feeling nor showing respect. <i>A deeply disrespectful attitude towards women.</i>
<u>flip</u>	Glib or flippant. <i>He couldn t get away with flip funny conversation.</i>
ill-mannered	Socially incorrect in behavior.
<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to the matter under consideration. <i>An impertinent question.</i>
impolite	Not polite. <i>It would have been impolite to refuse.</i>
impudent	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>The student was kept in for impudent behavior.</i>
insubordinate	Defiant of authority; disobedient to orders. <i>A history of insubordinate behavior.</i>
lacking civility	Nonexistent.
<u>presumptuous</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. <i>The duchess would not put up with presumptuous servants.</i>
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>Graham giggled at every rude joke.</i>
snotty-nosed	Marked by casual disrespect.
uncivil	Lacking civility or good manners. <i>He d been short and uncivil with her.</i>
unmannerly	Not having or showing good manners. <i>Uncouth unmannerly fellows.</i>

<u>arrogant</u>	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities. <i>He s arrogant and opinionated.</i>
barefaced	Shameless and undisguised. <i>A barefaced lie.</i>
<u>brat</u>	A small pork sausage. <i>She s been acting like a spoiled brat all evening.</i>
<u>brazen</u>	Made of or resembling brass (as in color or hardness). <i>There was nothing to do but brazen it out.</i>
<u>contemptuous</u>	Showing contempt; scornful. <i>She was intolerant and contemptuous of the majority of the human race.</i>
<u>discourteous</u>	Lacking social graces. <i>It would be unkind and discourteous to decline a visit.</i>
disrespectful	Neither feeling nor showing respect. <i>A deeply disrespectful attitude towards women.</i>
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
flippant	Not showing a serious or respectful attitude. <i>A flippant remark.</i>
frivolity	Something of little value or significance. <i>A night of fun and frivolity.</i>
frivolous	Not serious in content or attitude or behavior. <i>Frivolous ribbons and lacy frills.</i>
<u>gall</u>	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>Accept life s gall without blaming somebody else.</i>
ignorant	Lacking knowledge or awareness in general; uneducated or unsophisticated. <i>She could be very ignorant and he had no intention of getting involved in an argument just now.</i>
immodest	Lacking humility or decency. <i>Brash immodest boasting.</i>
impenitent	Not feeling shame or regret about one's actions or attitudes. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>

<u>impertinent</u>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>Mentioned several impertinent facts before finally coming to the point.</i>
impolite	Not having or showing good manners; rude. <i>It would have been impolite to refuse.</i>
impudent	Not showing due respect for another person; impertinent. <i>He could have strangled this impudent upstart.</i>
insolence	An offensive disrespectful impudent act. <i>She was sacked for insolence.</i>
<u>irreverent</u>	Not revering god. <i>Noisy irreverent tourists.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>She had a pert nose and deep blue eyes.</i>
<u>presumptuous</u>	Excessively forward. <i>I hope I won't be considered presumptuous if I offer some advice.</i>
pretentious	Intended to attract notice and impress others. <i>A pretentious country house.</i>
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The new religion was first promulgated by rude men.</i>
shameless	Feeling no shame. <i>His shameless hypocrisy.</i>
<u>sinner</u>	A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts. <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
<u>unashamed</u>	Used of persons or their behavior; feeling no shame. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i>
uncivil	Lacking civility or good manners- Willa Cather. <i>Want nothing from you but to get away from your uncivil tongue.</i>
unrepentant	Showing no regret for one's wrongdoings. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
upstart	A series of movements on the parallel or asymmetric bars, by which a gymnast swings to a position in which their body is supported by their arms above the bar, especially at the start of a routine. <i>The upstarts who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.</i>
