moment in time	An indefinitely short time.
no time	A negative.
no time at all	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions; 7 isotopes are known.
point in time	A very small circular shape.
<u>second</u>	The fielding position of the player on a baseball team who is stationed near the second of the bases in the infield. <i>He had to shift down into second to make the hill.</i>
short time	The fielding position of the player on a baseball team who is stationed between second and third base.
split second	Division of a group into opposing factions.
time	A reading of a point in time as given by a clock. <i>The time is 9 30.</i>
trice	A very short time (as the time it takes the eye to blink or the heart to beat.
<u>twinkling</u>	A very short time (as the time it takes the eye to blink or the heart to beat.
twinkling of an eye	A very short time (as the time it takes the eye to blink or the heart to beat.
<u>wink</u>	An act of winking. <i>Barney gave him a knowing wink.</i>

existing	Existing in something specified. <i>Depletion of the oxygen existing in the bloodstream.</i>
expeditious	Marked by speed and efficiency. <i>An expeditious investigation.</i>
express	Not tacit or implied. <i>An express shipment.</i>
<u>extant</u>	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i>An extant letter.</i>
fast	Performing or able to perform a particular action quickly. <i>They remained fast friends.</i>
immediate	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>The immediate result.</i>
<u>insistent</u>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>She was very insistent that I call her.</i>
inst	In or of the present month. <i>Your letter of the 10th inst.</i>
instantaneous	Occurring with no delay. <i>Her reaction was almost instantaneous.</i>
<u>lightning</u>	Very quick. <i>A lightning cure for his hangover.</i>
<u>precipitate</u>	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>A precipitate decline in Labour fortunes.</i>
present	Existing or occurring in a place or thing. <i>The murderer is present in this room.</i>
prompt	According to schedule or without delay; on time. <i>She is always prompt to help her friends.</i>

quick	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>A quick inspection.</i>
quick to make	Performed with little or no delay.
quick to prepare	Moving quickly and lightly.
rapid	Done or occurring in a brief period of time. <i>The country's rapid economic decline.</i>
ready mixed	Immediately available.
ready prepared	Apprehending and responding with speed and sensitivity.
speedy	Done or occurring quickly. <i>A speedy errand boy.</i>
sudden	Occurring or done quickly and unexpectedly or without warning. <i>A sudden decision.</i>
swift	Moving or capable of moving at high speed. <i>Swift flight of an arrow.</i>

<u>compose</u>	Phrase (a letter or piece of writing) with great care and thought. <i>Compose and draw a still life.</i>
<u>emergency</u>	Arising from or used in an emergency. <i>Survival packs were carried in case of emergency.</i>
exigency	An urgent need or demand. <i>He put financial exigency before personal sentiment.</i>
<u>exigent</u>	Demanding attention. <i>The exigent demands of her contemporaries music took a toll on her voice.</i>

imminent	Close in time; about to occur. <i>In imminent danger.</i>
<u>impending</u>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>My impending departure.</i>
<u>imperative</u>	Relating to verbs in the imperative mood. <i>Free movement of labour was an economic imperative.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	An extemporaneous speech or remark. <i>An impromptu press conference.</i>

<u>improvise</u>	Perform without preparation. <i>After the hurricane destroyed our house we had to improvise for weeks.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>An improvised short speech.</i>
impulsion	A strong urge to do something. <i>The impulsion of the singers to govern the pace.</i>
<u>instantly</u>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>She fell asleep almost instantly.</i>
minute	The distance covered in a minute by someone driving or walking. <i>A minute inspection of the grounds.</i>
moment	The n th moment of a distribution is the expected value of the n th power of the deviations from a fixed value. <i>Virtue is of more moment than security.</i>
now	Indicates a change of subject or activity. <i>Run along now.</i>
offhand	Ungraciously or offensively nonchalant or cool in manner. <i>She had made these remarks offhandedly.</i>
pressing	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>Pure grade olive oil is the product of the second or third pressings.</i>
<u>prioritize</u>	Designate or treat (something) as being very or most important. <i>The department has failed to prioritize safety within the oil industry.</i>
<u>promptly</u>	At once (usually modifies an undesirable occurrence). <i>He promptly forgot the address.</i>
spontaneously	As a result of a sudden impulse and without premeditation. <i>A surprising number of early pregnancies spontaneously abort.</i>
<u>twinkling</u>	Shining with a gleam that changes from bright to faint. <i>Twinkling harbour lights.</i>
urgent	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>Bridges in urgent need of repair.</i>
