Definitions of "Institutionalized" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “institutionalized” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Given the character of an institution or incorporated into a structured and usually well-established system.*
- *Established in practice or custom.*
- *Officially placed in or committed to a specialized institution.*
- *Established as part of an official organization.*
- *(of a person) apathetic and dependent after a long period in an institution.*

institutionalised Officially placed in or committed to a specialized institution.

antitoxin	An antibody that can neutralize a specific toxin.
arthritis	A disease causing painful inflammation and stiffness of the joints.
chemotherapy	The use of chemical agents to treat or control disease (or mental illness).
chiroprapist	A specialist in care for the feet. <i>She decided to train as a chiroprapist.</i>
commit	Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee. <i>We are committed to the fundamental principles of democracy.</i>
detection	The detection that a signal is being received. <i>Modern technology is essential to crime detection.</i>
diathermy	A medical and surgical technique involving the production of heat in a part of the body by high-frequency electric currents, to stimulate the circulation, relieve pain, destroy unhealthy tissue, or cause bleeding vessels to clot.
facility	A service that an organization or a piece of equipment offers you. <i>An overdraft facility.</i>
hypochondriac	A person who is abnormally anxious about their health.
infection	(medicine) the invasion of the body by pathogenic microorganisms and their multiplication which can lead to tissue damage and disease. <i>A reddening of the skin at the site of infection.</i>
inferno	A place or situation that is too hot, chaotic, or noisy. <i>The inferno of the Friday evening rush hour.</i>
medical	An examination to assess a person's state of physical health or fitness. <i>He was transferred for further treatment to a medical ward.</i>
medicate	Treat (a condition) using a drug. <i>The born worrier medicates the common cold as though it were a terminal condition.</i>
mentally	In a manner relating to the mind. <i>Soldiers become physically and mentally exhausted.</i>
oncologist	A medical practitioner qualified to diagnose and treat tumours.
orphanage	A residential institution for the care and education of orphans. <i>His early orphanage shaped his character as an adult.</i>

patient	Enduring trying circumstances with even temper or characterized by such endurance. <i>Be patient your time will come.</i>
pediatrics	The branch of medicine concerned with the treatment of infants and children.
podiatrist	A person who treats the feet and their ailments; a chiropodist. <i>If a toe has a discharge it is likely infected and needs to be treated by a podiatrist.</i>
preoperative	Happening or done before and in preparation for a surgical operation.
prevention	The action of stopping something from happening or arising. <i>Crime prevention.</i>
psychiatric	Relating to or used in or engaged in the practice of psychiatry. <i>Psychiatric hospital.</i>
recovery	The action or process of regaining possession or control of something stolen or lost. <i>It is hoped that Lawrence can make a full recovery.</i>
sanatorium	A room or building for sick children in a boarding school.
standardize	Adopt (something) as one's standard. <i>We could standardize on US equipment.</i>
suicide	A person who commits suicide. <i>He committed suicide at the age of forty.</i>
surgical	Relating to or used in surgery. <i>A surgical appendix.</i>
treatment	The presentation or discussion of a subject. <i>The directive required equal treatment for men and women in social security schemes.</i>
tuberculosis	An infectious bacterial disease characterized by the growth of nodules (tubercles) in the tissues, especially the lungs.
