- *Impart skills or knowledge to.*




## Synonyms of "Instructs" as a verb (4 Words)

**apprise** Inform or tell (someone).  
*I thought it right to **apprise** Chris of what had happened.*

**apprize** Increase the value of.  
*How highly your Highness **apprizeth** peace.*

**learn** Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort.  
*I d **learned** too many grim poems in school.*

**teach** Work as a teacher.  
*The philosophy **teaches** self control.*



## Usage Examples of "Instructs" as a verb

- *She instructed the students to work on their pronunciation.*
- *He instructed me in building a boat.*



## Associations of "Instructs" (30 Words)

- admonition** A firm rebuke.  
*He received numerous **admonitions** for his behaviour.*
- admonitory** Expressing reproof or reproach especially as a corrective.  
*The sergeant lifted an **admonitory** finger.*
- advise** Offer suggestions about the best course of action to someone.  
*He **advised** caution.*
- advisor** An expert who gives advice.  
*The United States sent military **advisors** to Guatemala.*
- apprise** Make aware of.  
*I thought it right to **apprise** Chris of what had happened.*
- consult** An act of consulting a professional a consultation.  
*The government must **consult** with interested bodies.*

<b>counsel</b>	Consultation, especially to seek or give advice. <i>The lawyer <b>counselled</b> me when I was accused of tax fraud.</i>
<b>educate</b>	Provide or pay for instruction for (one's child), especially at a school. <i>A plan to <b>educate</b> the young on the dangers of drugs.</i>
<b>education</b>	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>Colleges of <b>education</b>.</i>
<b>educational</b>	Relating to the provision of education. <i>An <b>educational</b> film.</i>
<b>educator</b>	A person who provides instruction or education; a teacher. <i>The perspective of a professional <b>educator</b>.</i>
<b>expostulate</b>	Express strong disapproval or disagreement. <i>He found Fox <b>expostulating</b> with a young man.</i>
<b>guidance</b>	Advice or information aimed at resolving a problem or difficulty, especially as given by someone in authority. <i>A laser <b>guidance</b> system.</i>
<b>hortative</b>	Giving strong encouragement.
<b>hortatory</b>	Giving strong encouragement. <i>A series of <b>hortatory</b> epistles.</i>
<b>instruction</b>	A direction or order. <i>He was acting on my <b>instructions</b>.</i>
<b>instructor</b>	A person whose occupation is teaching. <i>A driving <b>instructor</b>.</i>
<b>lecture</b>	Deliver a lecture or talk. <i>A <b>lecture</b> hall.</i>
<b>lesson</b>	A unit of instruction. <i>An advanced <b>lesson</b> in maths.</i>
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>The arms have been <b>matriculated</b> by the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Edinburgh.</i>
<b>mentor</b>	An experienced and trusted adviser. <i>Both trainees were expertly <b>mentored</b> by a site supervisor.</i>
<b>pedagogics</b>	The principles and methods of instruction.
<b>pedagogy</b>	The profession of a teacher. <i>The relationship between applied linguistics and language <b>pedagogy</b>.</i>

<b>reading</b>	The action or skill of reading. <i>A poetry <b>reading</b>.</i>
<b><u>schooling</u></b>	Education received at school. <i><b>Schooling</b> fences.</i>
<b>teach</b>	A teacher. <i>She came to say Hi to her old <b>teach</b>.</i>
<b><u>teacher</u></b>	A person whose occupation is teaching. <i>Books were his <b>teachers</b>.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Decide or determine correctly or with certainty. <i>I couldn't <b>tell</b> if he believed me.</i>
<b><u>tuition</u></b>	Teaching or instruction, especially of individual pupils or small groups. <i>Private <b>tuition</b> in French.</i>
<b><u>university</u></b>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>His daughter is at <b>university</b>.</i>
