| affront | A deliberately offensive act or something producing the effect of deliberate disrespect. <i>The sackings were an affront to justice.</i> |
| aggressor | A confident assertive person who acts as instigator. |
| contumely | Insolent or insulting language or treatment. <i>The Church should not be exposed to gossip and contumely.</i> |
| defamation | The action of damaging the good reputation of someone; slander or libel. <i>She sued him for defamation.</i> |
| derision | The act of deriding or treating with contempt. <i>My stories were greeted with derision and disbelief.</i> |
| flout | Treat with contemptuous disregard. <i>The advertising code is being flouted.</i> |
| gibe | Be compatible, similar or consistent; coincide in their characteristics. <i>Some cynics in the media might gibe.</i> |
| goad | Goad or provoke as by constant criticism. <i>For him the visit was a goad to renewed effort.</i> |
| humiliation | An instance in which you are caused to lose your prestige or self-respect. <i>The conference decision was a humiliation for the union s executive.</i> |
| indignity | Treatment or circumstances that cause one to feel shame or to lose one’s dignity. <i>The indignity of needing financial help.</i> |
| jeer | Make rude and mocking remarks, typically in a loud voice. <i>Some of the younger men jeered at him.</i> |
| jibe | Make insulting or mocking remarks; jeer. <i>A jibe at his old rivals.</i> |

| lampoon | A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The magazine fired at God Royalty and politicians using cartoons and lampoons.</i> |
| mock | Mock examinations. <i>Jim threw up his hands in mock horror.</i> |
| mockery | A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way. <i>In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was mockery.</i> |
| obloquy | A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions. <i>Conduct to which no more obloquy could reasonably attach.</i> |
| parody | Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was parodying schoolgirl fiction.</i> |
| playfully | In a playful manner. <i>Lily laughed and playfully slapped him across the chest.</i> |
| rankle | Annoy or irritate (someone). <i>The casual manner of his dismissal still rankles.</i> |
| ridicule | Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>His theory was ridiculed and dismissed.</i> |
| rudeness | A manner that is rude and insulting. <i>What I will not tolerate is rudeness.</i> |
| satirize | Deride and criticize by means of satire. <i>The movie satirized the notion of national superiority.</i> |
| scoff | Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i>You a scientist he scoffed.</i> |
| scorn | A feeling and expression of contempt or disdain for someone or something. <i>I met with scoffs I met with scorns.</i> |
| slander | A false and malicious spoken statement. <i>He is suing the TV company for slander.</i> |
| sneer | A facial expression of contempt or scorn; the upper lip curls. <i>She sneered her contempt.</i> |
| taunt | A remark made in order to anger, wound, or provoke someone. <i>You once taunted me taunted me with cowardice because I dared not face the world and conquer it.</i> |
| tease | Ruffle (one's hair) by combing the ends towards the scalp, for a full effect. <i>She couldn't resist a gentle tease.</i> |

teasing Intended to provoke or make fun of someone in a playful way.
