## Associations of "Insulted" (30 Words)

<b>affront</b>	A deliberately offensive act or something producing the effect of deliberate disrespect. <i>The sackings were an <b>affront</b> to justice.</i>
<b>aggressor</b>	A confident assertive person who acts as instigator.
<b>contumely</b>	Insolent or insulting language or treatment. <i>The Church should not be exposed to gossip and <b>contumely</b>.</i>
<b>defamation</b>	The action of damaging the good reputation of someone; slander or libel. <i>She sued him for <b>defamation</b>.</i>
<b>derision</b>	The act of deriding or treating with contempt. <i>My stories were greeted with <b>derision</b> and disbelief.</i>
<b>flout</b>	Treat with contemptuous disregard. <i>The advertising code is being <b>flouted</b>.</i>
<b>gibe</b>	Be compatible, similar or consistent; coincide in their characteristics. <i>Some cynics in the media might <b>gibe</b>.</i>
<b>goad</b>	Goad or provoke as by constant criticism. <i>For him the visit was a <b>goad</b> to renewed effort.</i>
<b>humiliation</b>	An instance in which you are caused to lose your prestige or self-respect. <i>The conference decision was a <b>humiliation</b> for the union s executive.</i>
<b>indignity</b>	Treatment or circumstances that cause one to feel shame or to lose one’s dignity. <i>The <b>indignity</b> of needing financial help.</i>
<b>jeer</b>	Make rude and mocking remarks, typically in a loud voice. <i>Some of the younger men <b>jeered</b> at him.</i>
<b>jibe</b>	Make insulting or mocking remarks; jeer. <i>A <b>jibe</b> at his old rivals.</i>

<b>lampoon</b>	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The magazine fired at God Royalty and politicians using cartoons and <b>lampoons</b>.</i>
<b>mock</b>	Mock examinations. <i>Jim threw up his hands in <b>mock</b> horror.</i>
<b>mockery</b>	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way. <i>In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was <b>mockery</b>.</i>
<b>obloquy</b>	A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions. <i>Conduct to which no more <b>obloquy</b> could reasonably attach.</i>
<b>parody</b>	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was <b>parodying</b> schoolgirl fiction.</i>
<b>playfully</b>	In a playful manner. <i>Lily laughed and <b>playfully</b> slapped him across the chest.</i>
<b>rankle</b>	Annoy or irritate (someone). <i>The casual manner of his dismissal still <b>rankles</b>.</i>
<b>ridicule</b>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>His theory was <b>ridiculed</b> and dismissed.</i>
<b>rudeness</b>	A manner that is rude and insulting. <i>What I will not tolerate is <b>rudeness</b>.</i>
<b>satirize</b>	Deride and criticize by means of satire. <i>The movie <b>satirized</b> the notion of national superiority.</i>
<b>scoff</b>	Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i>You a scientist he <b>scoffed</b>.</i>
<b>scorn</b>	A feeling and expression of contempt or disdain for someone or something. <i>I met with scoffs I met with <b>scorns</b>.</i>
<b>slander</b>	A false and malicious spoken statement. <i>He is suing the TV company for <b>slander</b>.</i>
<b>sneer</b>	A facial expression of contempt or scorn; the upper lip curls. <i>She <b>sneered</b> her contempt.</i>
<b>taunt</b>	A remark made in order to anger, wound, or provoke someone. <i>You once <b>taunted</b> me <b>taunted</b> me with cowardice because I dared not face the world and conquer it.</i>
<b>tease</b>	Ruffle (one's hair) by combing the ends towards the scalp, for a full effect. <i>She couldn't resist a gentle <b>tease</b>.</i>

**teasing** Intended to provoke or make fun of someone in a playful way.  
*Teasing* comments.

**vilification** Slandorous defamation.  
*The widespread **vilification** of politicians.*
