## Intake as a Noun

### Definitions of "Intake" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “intake” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An act of taking people into an organization.*
- *The act of inhaling; the drawing in of air (or other gases) as in breathing.*
- *The people taken into an organization at a particular time.*
- *An amount of food, air, or another substance taken into the body.*
- *A place or structure through which something is taken in, e.g. water into a channel or pipe from a river, fuel or air into an engine, etc.*
- *An opening through which fluid is admitted to a tube or container.*
- *The process of taking food into the body through the mouth (as by eating).*
- *Land reclaimed from a moor or common.*
- *The action of taking something in.*
- *An act of taking something into the body.*

<b>consumption</b>	The act of consuming something. <i>The <b>consumption</b> of energy has increased steadily.</i>
<b>ingestion</b>	The process of taking food, drink, or another substance into the body by swallowing or absorbing it. <i>The effect of caffeine <b>ingestion</b> on exercise performance.</i>
<b>inhalation</b>	The inhaling of medicines or anaesthetics in the form of a gas or vapour. <i>With every <b>inhalation</b> air passes over the vocal cords.</i>
<b>inlet</b>	A small arm of the sea, a lake, or a river. <i>An air <b>inlet</b>.</i>
<b>inspiration</b>	Arousal of the mind to special unusual activity or creativity. <i>He is an <b>inspiration</b> to everyone.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>An inefficient <b>lot</b> our Council.</i>
<b>selection</b>	A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>The restaurant offers a wide <b>selection</b> of hot and cold dishes.</i>
<b>supply</b>	The activity of supplying or providing something. <i>The demand for tickets greatly exceeds the <b>supply</b>.</i>
<b>uptake</b>	The process of taking food into the body through the mouth (as by eating). <i>The <b>uptake</b> of glucose into the muscles.</i>

<b>alimentary</b>	Of or providing nourishment.
<b>caloric</b>	Relating to heat; calorific. <i>A <b>caloric</b> value of 7 calories per gram.</i>
<b>calorie</b>	The energy needed to raise the temperature of 1 kilogram of water through 1 C equal to one thousand small calories and often used to measure the energy value of foods.
<b>chlorophyll</b>	A green pigment, present in all green plants and in cyanobacteria, which is responsible for the absorption of light to provide energy for photosynthesis.
<b>commissariat</b>	A department for the supply of food and equipment.
<b>diet</b>	Put a person or animal on a special diet. <i><b>Diet</b> soft drinks.</i>

<b>dietary</b>	A regulated or restricted diet. <i><b>Dietary</b> restrictions.</i>
<b>digest</b>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>A <b>digest</b> of cloned DNA.</i>
<b>eutrophication</b>	Excessive nutrients in a lake or other body of water, usually caused by runoff of nutrients (animal waste, fertilizers, sewage) from the land, which causes a dense growth of plant life; the decomposition of the plants depletes the suppl. <i>He argued that the controlling factor in <b>eutrophication</b> is not nitrate but phosphate.</i>
<b>feed</b>	Feed into supply. <i>The Missouri <b>feeds</b> into the Mississippi.</i>
<b>healthy</b>	Indicating or promoting good health. <i><b>Healthy</b> competition.</i>
<b>ingestion</b>	The process of taking food into the body through the mouth (as by eating). <i>The quiet <b>ingestion</b> of information.</i>
<b>nourish</b>	Give nourishment to. <i>A clay base <b>nourished</b> with plant detritus.</i>
<b>nourishing</b>	Of or providing nourishment. <i>A simple but <b>nourishing</b> meal.</i>
<b>nourishment</b>	The act of nourishing. <i>The <b>nourishment</b> of our bodies and of our minds.</i>
<b>nutrient</b>	Of or providing nourishment. <i>Fish is a source of many important <b>nutrients</b> including protein vitamins and minerals.</i>
<b>nutriment</b>	Nourishment; sustenance. <i>He took the Bible for spiritual <b>nutriment</b>.</i>
<b>nutrition</b>	The branch of science that deals with nutrients and nutrition particularly in humans. <i>A guide to good <b>nutrition</b>.</i>
<b>nutritional</b>	Of or relating to or providing nutrition. <i>Genetic engineering can alter the <b>nutritional</b> value of food.</i>
<b>nutritious</b>	Of or providing nourishment. <i>Home cooked burgers make a <b>nutritious</b> meal.</i>
<b>nutritive</b>	Relating to nutrition. <i>The food was low in <b>nutritive</b> value.</i>
<b>phytoplankton</b>	Plankton consisting of microscopic plants.

<b>provender</b>	Animal fodder. <i>There s no one to carry your <b>provender</b> in brown paper bags to the boot of your car.</i>
<b>regimen</b>	A system of government. <i>A <b>regimen</b> of one or two injections per day.</i>
<b>supplement</b>	A supplementary component that improves capability. <i>I looked for a part time job to <b>supplement</b> my income.</i>
<b>sustenance</b>	The maintaining of someone or something in life or existence. <i>Poor rural economies turned to potatoes for <b>sustenance</b>.</i>
<b>victuals</b>	A stock or supply of foods.
<b>vitamin</b>	A pill containing a specified amount of a particular vitamin or vitamins taken as a dietary supplement. <i>Most people can get all the <b>vitamins</b> they need from a healthy diet.</i>
<b>wholesome</b>	Conducive to or suggestive of good health and physical well-being. <i><b>Wholesome</b> appearance.</i>
<b>wholesomeness</b>	The quality of being beneficial and generally good for you.
