<b>constitutive</b>	Having the power to establish or give organized existence to something. Poverty is a <b>constitutive</b> element of a particular form of economic growth.
<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. An <b>entire</b> town devastated by an earthquake.
<b>essential</b>	(of an amino acid or fatty acid) required for normal growth but not synthesized in the body and therefore necessary in the diet. <b>Essential</b> hypertension.
<b>fitted</b>	Of a room equipped with matching units of fitted furniture. A <b>fitted</b> wardrobe.
<b>full</b>	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. A <b>full</b> stomach.
<b>fundamental</b>	Being or involving basic facts or principles. A <b>fundamental</b> incompatibility between them.
<b>gross</b>	General or large-scale; not detailed. The <b>gross</b> details of the structure appear reasonable.
<b>inbuilt</b>	Existing as an original or essential part of something or someone. The body's <b>inbuilt</b> ability to heal itself.
<b>incorporated</b>	Introduced into as a part of the whole. The ideas <b>incorporated</b> in his revised manuscript.
<b>inherent</b>	Vested in someone as a right or privilege. The president's <b>inherent</b> foreign affairs power.
<b>innate</b>	Not established by conditioning or learning. An <b>innate</b> talent.
<b>intact</b>	Not damaged or impaired in any way; complete. Fought to keep the union <b>intact</b> .
<b>integrated</b>	With various parts or aspects linked or coordinated. An <b>integrated</b> public transport system.

<b><u>intrinsic</u></b>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature- John Dewey. <b><i>Intrinsic</i></b> muscles.
<b>organic</b>	Relating to or denoting compounds containing carbon (other than simple binary compounds and salts) and chiefly or ultimately of biological origin. <b><i>Organic</i></b> vegetables.
<b><u>overall</u></b>	Including everything. The <b><i>overall</i></b> pattern of his life.
<b>structural</b>	Relating to or having or characterized by structure. The blast left ten buildings with major <b><i>structural</i></b> damage.
<b><u>total</u></b>	Complete; absolute. It is a matter of <b><i>total</i></b> indifference to me.
<b><u>undivided</u></b>	Not separated into parts or shares constituting an undivided unit. An <b><i>undivided</i></b> estate can be passed on to succeeding generations.
<b><u>unified</u></b>	Formed or united into a whole. A <b><i>unified</i></b> system of national education.
<b><u>whole</u></b>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. He spent the <b><i>whole</i></b> day walking.

<b>required</b>	Required by rule. <i>The corset the garment that ensured the <b>required</b> female shape.</i>
<b>requisite</b>	Made necessary by particular circumstances or regulations. <i>She believed privacy to be a <b>requisite</b> for a peaceful life.</i>
<b><u>staple</u></b>	Attach or secure with a staple or staples. <b>Staple</b> the papers together.
<b><u>substantial</u></b>	Of considerable importance, size, or worth. <i>The first meal of the day should be <b>substantial</b>.</i>
