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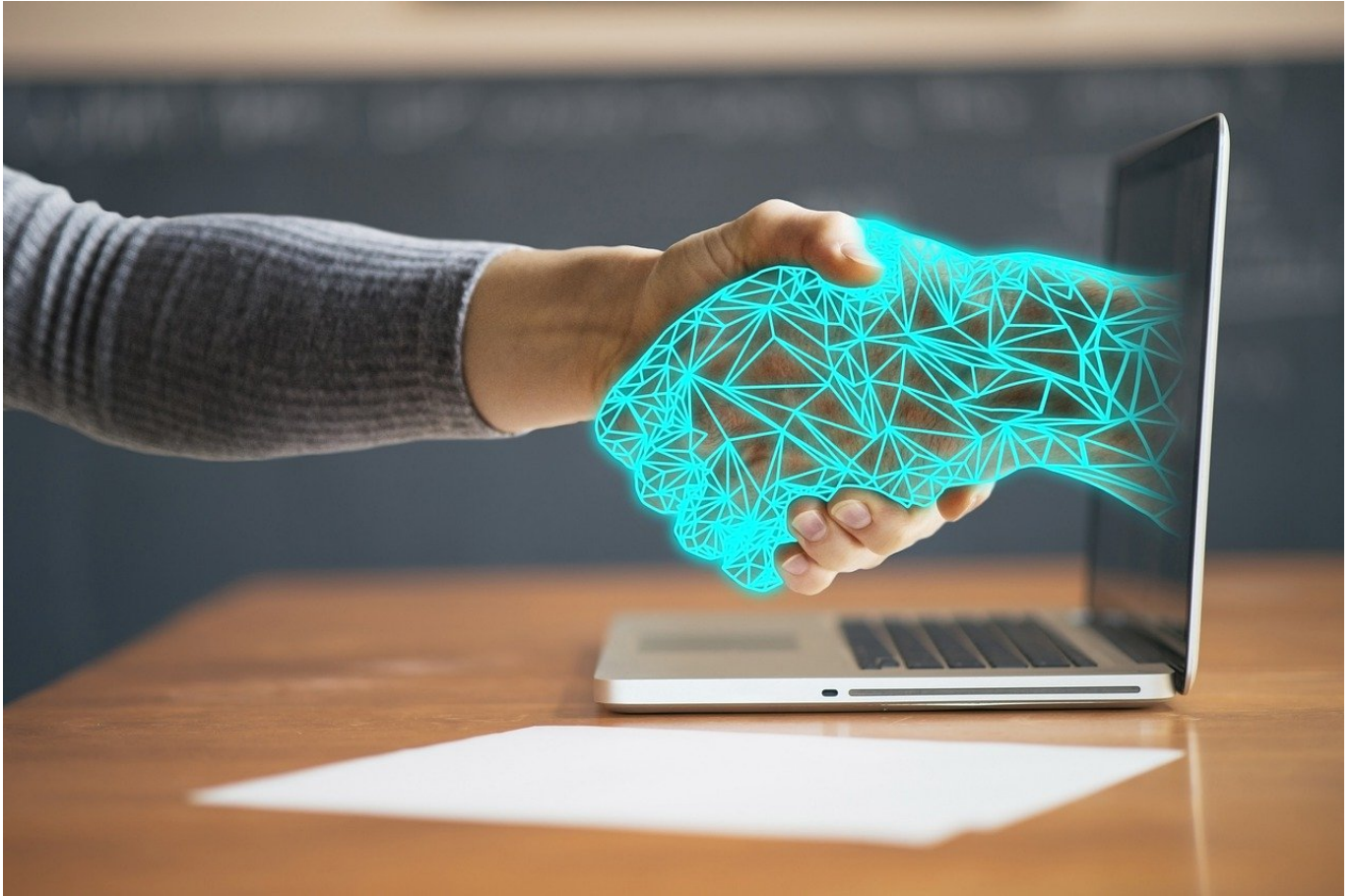

- *Constituting the undiminished entirety; lacking nothing essential especially not damaged- Bacon.*
- *Of or denoted by an integer.*
- *Involving only integers, especially as coefficients of a function.*
- *Of or denoted by an integer.*

built-in	Existing as an essential constituent or characteristic.
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A complete coward.</i>
component	Constituting part of a larger whole; constituent. <i>The component elements of the armed forces.</i>
<u>composite</u>	Made up of several parts or elements. <i>Modern composite materials.</i>

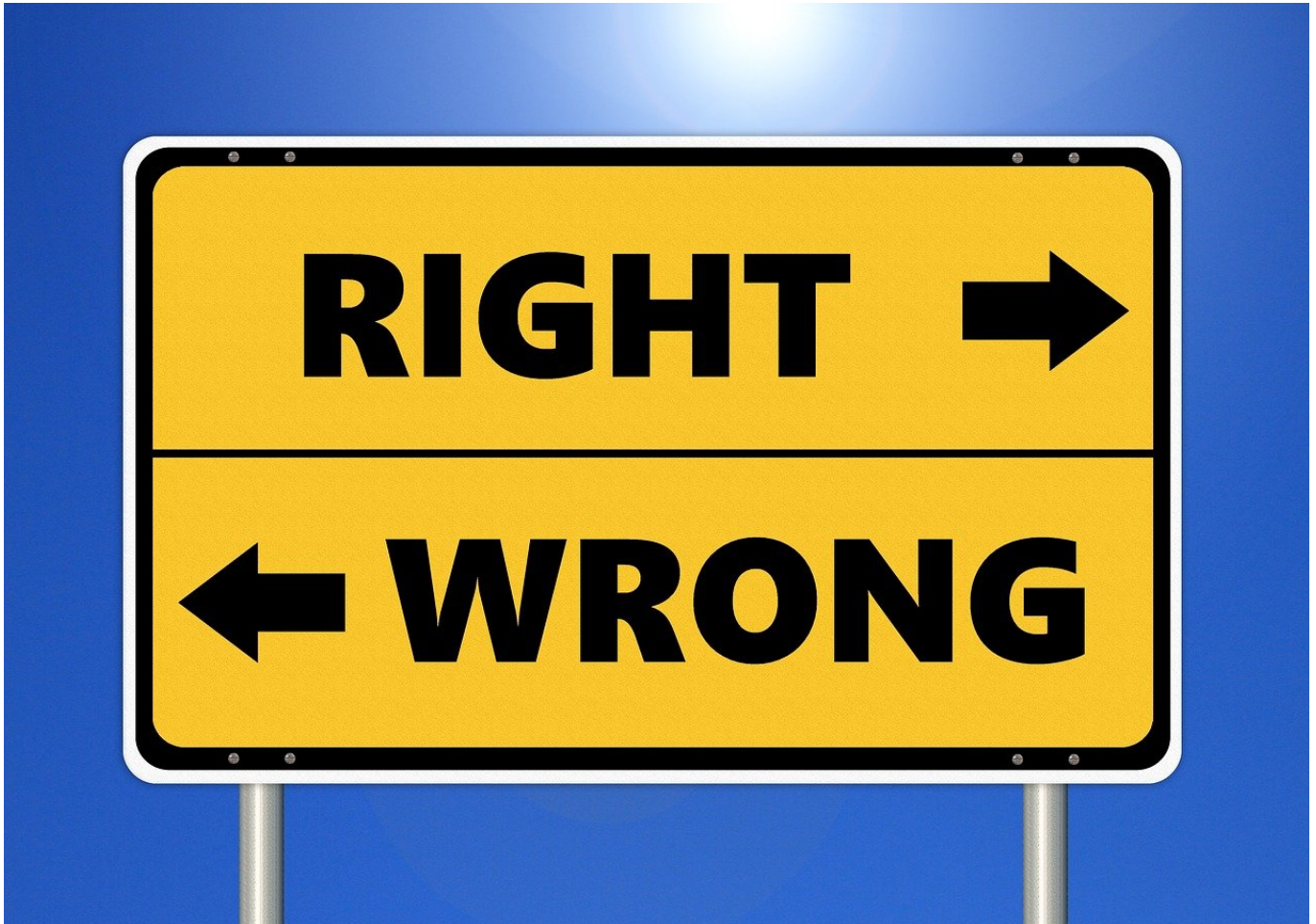
comprehensive	Broad in scope. A comprehensive collection of photographs.
constituent	Being a part of a whole. The constituent body has a right of veto.
constitutional	Constitutional in the structure of something especially your physical makeup. A constitutional monarchy.
constitutive	Having the power to establish or give organized existence to something. Poverty is a constitutive element of a particular form of economic growth.
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. An entire town devastated by an earthquake.
essential	(of an amino acid or fatty acid) required for normal growth but not synthesized in the body and therefore necessary in the diet. Essential hypertension.
fitted	Of a room equipped with matching units of fitted furniture. A fitted wardrobe.
full	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. A full stomach.
fundamental	Being or involving basic facts or principles. A fundamental incompatibility between them.
gross	General or large-scale; not detailed. The gross details of the structure appear reasonable.
inbuilt	Existing as an original or essential part of something or someone. The body's inbuilt ability to heal itself.
incorporated	Introduced into as a part of the whole. The ideas incorporated in his revised manuscript.
inherent	Vested in someone as a right or privilege. The president's inherent foreign affairs power.
innate	Not established by conditioning or learning. An innate talent.
intact	Not damaged or impaired in any way; complete. Fought to keep the union intact .
integrated	With various parts or aspects linked or coordinated. An integrated public transport system.

<u>intrinsic</u>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature- John Dewey. <i>Intrinsic</i> muscles.
organic	Relating to or denoting compounds containing carbon (other than simple binary compounds and salts) and chiefly or ultimately of biological origin. <i>Organic</i> vegetables.
<u>overall</u>	Including everything. The <i>overall</i> pattern of his life.
structural	Relating to or having or characterized by structure. The blast left ten buildings with major <i>structural</i> damage.
<u>total</u>	Complete; absolute. It is a matter of <i>total</i> indifference to me.
<u>undivided</u>	Not separated into parts or shares constituting an undivided unit. An <i>undivided</i> estate can be passed on to succeeding generations.
<u>unified</u>	Formed or united into a whole. A <i>unified</i> system of national education.
<u>whole</u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. He spent the <i>whole</i> day walking.

Violent or severe weather viewed as caused by the action of the four elements.

essential	Defining rights and duties as opposed to giving the rules by which rights and duties are established. <i>Fibre is an essential ingredient of our diet.</i>
importantly	Used to emphasize a significant point. <i>A non drinking non smoking and importantly non political sportsman.</i>
indispensability	The quality possessed by something that you cannot possibly do without.
<u>indispensable</u>	Not to be dispensed with; essential. <i>Foods indispensable to good nutrition.</i>
<u>inevitable</u>	Invariably occurring or appearing. <i>War was inevitable.</i>
<u>inevitably</u>	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. <i>Inevitably some details are already out of date.</i>
key	Enter or operate on data by means of a computer keyboard or telephone keypad. <i>The information is then keyed into a computer.</i>
<u>main</u>	Capable of standing syntactically alone as a complete sentence. <i>The main problem is one of resources.</i>
meaningful	Serious, important, or worthwhile. <i>Meaningful elements in a language.</i>
<u>must</u>	Used in ironic questions expressing irritation. <i>You must be tired.</i>
<u>necessarily</u>	As a highly likely consequence. <i>Such expenses are necessarily incurred.</i>
necessary	Determined, existing, or happening by natural laws or predestination; inevitable. <i>See when they need a tactful word of advice and do the necessary.</i>
necessity	Anything indispensable. <i>The necessity of growing old.</i>
need	Have or feel a need for. <i>Lest you even more than needs embitter our parting.</i>
needs	Of necessity. <i>We must needs by objective.</i>
obligate	Bind by an obligation; cause to be indebted. <i>An obligate anaerobe can survive only in the absence of oxygen.</i>
perforce	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>

<u>prerequisite</u>	Required as a prior condition or course of study. <i>Sponsorship is not a prerequisite for any of our courses.</i>
required	Required by rule. <i>The corset the garment that ensured the required female shape.</i>
requisite	Made necessary by particular circumstances or regulations. <i>She believed privacy to be a requisite for a peaceful life.</i>
<u>staple</u>	Attach or secure with a staple or staples. Staple the papers together.
<u>substantial</u>	Of considerable importance, size, or worth. <i>The first meal of the day should be substantial.</i>
<u>substantive</u>	Defining rights and duties as opposed to giving the rules by which rights and duties are established. Substantive law.
<u>unavoidable</u>	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>An unavoidable accident.</i>
<u>underlying</u>	Located beneath or below. Underlying principles.
<u>vital</u>	Full of spirit; full of life. <i>A beautiful vital girl.</i>
