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## Associations of "Intelligently" (30 Words)

<b>absorbed</b>	Retained without reflection. <i>The stones warm slowly throughout the day then radiate <b>absorbed</b> heat at night.</i>
<a href="#"><u>attentive</u></a>	(often followed by `to') giving care or attention. <i>Ministers should be more <b>attentive</b> to the interests of taxpayers.</i>
<b>aware</b>	Having or showing knowledge or understanding or realization or perception. <i>Everyone needs to become more environmentally <b>aware</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>careful</u></a>	Exercising caution or showing care or attention. <i><b>Careful</b> of her feelings.</i>
<b>carefully</b>	In a way that deliberately avoids harm or errors; cautiously. <i>He listened <b>carefully</b> to the way people spoke.</i>
<a href="#"><u>cautious</u></a>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>The plan received a <b>cautious</b> welcome.</i>
<a href="#"><u>considerate</u></a>	Showing concern for the rights and feelings of others. <i>She was unfailingly kind and <b>considerate</b>.</i>
<b>contemplate</b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i><b>Contemplate</b> one's navel.</i>
<a href="#"><u>contemplative</u></a>	A person devoted to the contemplative life. <i><b>Contemplative</b> knowledge of God.</i>
<b>decline</b>	Go down in value. <i>The sun began to creep round to the west and to <b>decline</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>deliberate</u></a>	Characterized by conscious design or purpose. <i>A <b>deliberate</b> attempt to provoke conflict.</i>
<b>deposition</b>	The act of deposing someone; removing a powerful person from a position or office. <i>Pebbles formed by the <b>deposition</b> of calcium in solution.</i>

<b>erode</b>	Gradually destroy or be gradually destroyed. <i>The cliffs on this coast have been <b>eroded</b> by the sea.</i>
<b><u>gradually</u></b>	In a gradual way; slowly; by degrees. <i>The situation <b>gradually</b> improved.</i>
<b>information</b>	In information theory a mathematical quantity expressing the probability of occurrence of a particular sequence of symbols impulses etc as against that of alternative sequences. <i>Genetically transmitted <b>information</b>.</i>
<b><u>leisurely</u></b>	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>At a <b>leisurely</b> or easygoing pace.</i>
<b>meditative</b>	Deeply or seriously thoughtful. <i><b>Meditative</b> techniques.</i>
<b>motion</b>	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object. <i>Councillor Byrne <b>motioned</b> that the committee call on the area manager to install street lighting.</i>
<b>observant</b>	A member of a branch of the Franciscan order that followed a strict rule. <i>Her <b>observant</b> eye took in every detail.</i>
<b>pensive</b>	Showing pensive sadness. <i>A <b>pensive</b> mood.</i>
<b>plod</b>	The act of walking with a slow heavy gait. <i>He settled down to a steady <b>plod</b>.</i>
<b><u>precision</u></b>	Marked by or adapted for accuracy and exactness. <i>The deal was planned and executed with military <b>precision</b>.</i>
<b><u>preoccupied</u></b>	Having or showing excessive or compulsive concern with something. <i>A <b>preoccupied</b> frown.</i>
<b><u>reflective</u></b>	Providing a reflection; capable of reflecting light or other radiation. <i><b>Reflective</b> clothing.</i>
<b>scrupulous</b>	Very concerned to avoid doing wrong. <i>The research has been carried out with <b>scrupulous</b> attention to detail.</i>
<b>slowly</b>	Without speed slow is sometimes used informally for slowly. <i>He spoke <b>slowly</b>.</i>
<b>subjectively</b>	In a way that is dependent on the mind for existence. <i>The natural tendency we have to impute <b>subjectively</b> perceived qualities to objects.</i>
<b><u>thoughtfully</u></b>	With careful consideration or attention. <i>The government <b>thoughtfully</b> offered to foot part of the bill.</i>

**trudge**

A difficult or laborious walk.  
*She **trudged** through blinding snow.*

**weaken**

Make or become weaker in power, resolve, or physical strength.  
*The prisoner s resistance **weakened** after seven days.*
