- *Design or destine something for a particular purpose.*

aim

Direct (a missile or blow) at someone or something.
*We should **aim** for free and fair competition.*

aspire

Have an ambitious plan or a lofty goal.
*Other people will **aspire** to be like you.*

be determined

To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.

be going

Be priced at.

be looking

Spend or use time.

be plotting

Occupy a certain position or area.

be resolved

Be identical to; be someone or something.

designate

Decree or designate beforehand.
*He was **designated** as prime minister.*

destine	Design or destine. <i>She was destined to become a great pianist.</i>
<u>expect</u>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>We expect great things of you.</i>
have every intention	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
have in mind	Suffer from; be ill with.
have in view	Have sex with; archaic use.
have plans	Have ownership or possession of.
have resolved	Undergo.
have set out	Go through (mental or physical states or experiences).
have the intention	Have left.
hope	Be optimistic be full of hope have hopes. <i>I hope to have finished this work by tomorrow evening.</i>
mean	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>The jacket was meant for a much larger person.</i>
plan	Make a design of plan out in systematic often graphic form. <i>We plan on getting married in the near future.</i>
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>Roy Thomson was proposed as chairman.</i>
purpose	Propose or intend. <i>God has allowed suffering even purposed it.</i>
<u>signify</u>	Denote or connote. <i>The locked door doesn't necessarily signify.</i>
<u>specify</u>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>Specify the parameters.</i>
stand for	Be in effect; be or remain in force.
think	Have sufficient foresight or awareness to do something. <i>Think thin.</i>

- *A jigsaw puzzle intended for three-year-olds.*
- *No offence was intended, I assure you.*
- *Pigs intended for human consumption.*

- *A series of questions intended as a checklist.*
- *This one-roomed cottage was intended to accommodate a family.*
- *This benefit is intended for people incapable of work.*
- *The company intends to cut 400 jobs.*

<u>artifice</u>	A deceptive maneuver (especially to avoid capture). <i>An industry dominated by artifice.</i>
<u>calculated</u>	(of an action) done with full awareness of the likely consequences. <i>A calculated insult.</i>
<u>concoct</u>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>Concoct a strange mixture.</i>
consider	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes. <i>I consider her to be shallow.</i>
<u>deliberate</u>	Consider (a question) carefully. <i>A conscientious and deliberate worker.</i>
deliberately	In a careful and unhurried way. <i>She was working deliberately.</i>

designed	Planned or conceived in detail or for a specific purpose. <i>Games designed for all ages.</i>
headed	(of certain green vegetables) having the edible leafy part at the top of the stem. <i>She was always cool headed.</i>
intended	The person one intends to marry; one's fiancé or fiancée. <i>An intended insult.</i>
intentionality	The fact of being deliberate or purposive.
intentionally	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>I didn't do it intentionally.</i>
knowingly	In full awareness or consciousness; deliberately. <i>Amy looked at me knowingly.</i>
mean	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>Its name means painted rock in Cherokee.</i>
minded	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward. <i>I am not minded to answer any questions.</i>
muse	(in Greek and Roman mythology) each of nine goddesses, the daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne, who preside over the arts and sciences. <i>Euterpe was his muse.</i>
originally	With reference to the origin or beginning. <i>Potatoes originally came from South America.</i>
plan	Design or make a plan of something to be made or built. <i>They discussed plans for a new bond issue.</i>
ponder	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>I pondered the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.</i>
purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something; firmness of purpose. <i>State pensions are considered as earned income for tax purposes.</i>
purposeful	Having or showing determination or resolve. <i>Led a happy purposeful life.</i>
purposefully	In a purposeful manner. <i>Purposefully vague answers.</i>
purposely	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>She had purposely made it difficult.</i>
ruse	A deceptive maneuver (especially to avoid capture). <i>Emma tried to think of a ruse to get Paul out of the house.</i>

signify	Make known with a word or signal. <i>The locked door doesn't necessarily signify.</i>
skillfully	With skill. <i>Fragments of a nearly complete jug skillfully restored at the institute of archaeology.</i>
think	An instance of deliberate thinking. <i>Any writer who so rarely produces a book is not thinking deep thoughts.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A thoughtful paper.</i>
willful	Done by design. <i>Willful disobedience.</i>
willfully	In a willful manner. <i>She had willfully deceived me.</i>
wittingly	With full knowledge and deliberation. <i>Everyone wittingly or otherwise will become involved.</i>
