<b>excitement</b>	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>He could hardly conceal his <b>excitement</b> when she agreed.</i>
<b>fervency</b>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity.
<b>fervour</b>	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up. <i>He talked with all the <b>fervour</b> of a new convert.</i>
<b>fever</b>	The excitement felt by a group of people about a particular public event. <i>She had a slight <b>fever</b>.</i>
<b>fire</b>	A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning. <i>The <b>fire</b> of their religious conviction.</i>
<b>force</b>	The army navy and air force of a country. <i>A <b>force</b> nine gale.</i>
<b>forcefulness</b>	Physical energy or intensity. <i>A government has not the vitality and <b>forcefulness</b> of a living man.</i>
<b>heat</b>	The presence of heat. <i>The fierce <b>heat</b> of the sun.</i>
<b>intensity level</b>	The amount of energy transmitted (as by acoustic or electromagnetic radiation).
<b>intensiveness</b>	High level or degree; the property of being intense.
<b>keenness</b>	A positive feeling of wanting to push ahead with something. <i>I admired the <b>keenness</b> of his mind.</i>
<b>loudness</b>	Tasteless showiness.
<b>passion</b>	A state or outburst of strong emotion. <i>A man of impetuous <b>passion</b>.</i>
<b>potency</b>	A capacity in embryonic tissue for developing into a particular specialized tissue or organ. <i>The myth of declining sexual <b>potency</b> with increasing age.</i>
<b>power</b>	Denoting a sports player team or style of play that makes use of power rather than finesse. <i>His <b>powerfulness</b> was concealed by a gentle facade.</i>
<b>powerfulness</b>	Possession of controlling influence. <i>His <b>powerfulness</b> was concealed by a gentle facade.</i>
<b>saturation</b>	The process of totally saturating something with a substance. <i>The springs on the left slope of the hill lie below the level of permanent <b>saturation</b>.</i>

<b>spirit</b>	The vital principle or animating force within living things. <i>We seek a harmony between body and <b>spirit</b>.</i>
<b>strength</b>	The power to induce the taking of a course of action or the embracing of a point of view by means of argument or entreaty. <i>Many people find <b>strength</b> in religion.</i>
