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

calculated

Carefully thought out in advance.
A ***calculated*** insult.

conscious	(followed by `of') showing realization or recognition of something. <i>Became conscious that he was being followed.</i>
considered	Having been thought about carefully. <i>A considered opinion.</i>
<u>deliberate</u>	Unhurried and with care and dignity. <i>A conscientious and deliberate worker.</i>
designed	Done or made or performed with purpose and intent- Havelock Ellis. <i>Well designed houses.</i>
done on purpose	Having finished or arrived at completion.
intended	Resulting from one's intentions. <i>An intended insult.</i>
knowing	Evidencing the possession of inside information. <i>A knowing collector of rare books.</i>
<u>meant</u>	Characterized by malice.
<u>planned</u>	Planned in advance. <i>The planned outlays for new equipment.</i>
prearranged	Arranged or agreed upon in advance. <i>Did she have a prearranged meeting.</i>
preconceived	(of an idea or opinion) formed before having the evidence for its truth or usefulness. <i>The same set of facts can be tailored to fit any preconceived belief.</i>
<u>predetermined</u>	Established or decided in advance. <i>A predetermined level of spending.</i>
premeditated	(of an action, especially a crime) thought out or planned beforehand. <i>Premeditated murder.</i>
purposeful	Serving as or indicating the existence of a purpose or goal. <i>If his sudden death was not accidental it must have been purposeful.</i>
purposive	Having a purpose. <i>Teaching is a purposive activity.</i>
<u>studied</u>	Produced or marked by conscious design or premeditation- V.L.Parrington. <i>A studied smile.</i>
<u>unintentional</u>	Not done on purpose. <i>The translation added a layer of unintentional comedy.</i>

wanton

Sexually unrestrained or having many casual sexual relationships (typically used of a woman).

*Her cheeks burned as she recalled how forward she had been how **wanton**.*

wilful


Having or showing a stubborn and determined intention to do as one wants, regardless of the consequences.

Wilful acts of damage.

calculated	Carefully thought out in advance. <i>Victims of vicious and calculated assaults.</i>
counterfeit	A copy that is represented as the original. <i>A counterfeit image of reality.</i>
deliberate	Carefully thought out in advance. <i>He made a deliberate decision not to respond negatively.</i>
deliberately	In a careful and unhurried way. <i>She was working deliberately.</i>
designed	Done or made or performed with purpose and intent. <i>Well designed houses.</i>
despoil	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>The church was despoiled of its marble wall covering.</i>

falsehood	A false statement. <i>The truth or falsehood of the many legends which surround her.</i>
forgery	Criminal falsification by making or altering an instrument with intent to defraud. <i>He was found guilty of forgery.</i>
fraud	A person or thing intended to deceive others, typically by unjustifiably claiming or being credited with accomplishments or qualities. <i>Mediums exposed as tricksters and frauds.</i>
illusion	Something many people believe that is false. <i>The illusion of family togetherness.</i>
imposture	An instance of pretending to be someone else in order to deceive others. <i>I discovered the imposture as soon as her doppelganger arrived.</i>
intended	Resulting from one's intentions. <i>An intended insult.</i>
intentionality	The fact of being deliberate or purposive.
knowingly	With full knowledge and deliberation. <i>Amy looked at me knowingly.</i>
<u>manipulation</u>	The action of touching with the hands (or the skillful use of the hands) or by the use of mechanical means. <i>He saw through her manipulations.</i>
measured	Having a slow, regular rhythm. <i>She set off with measured tread.</i>
<u>plunder</u>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>We shall plunder related sciences to assist our research.</i>
premeditated	Characterized by deliberate purpose and some degree of planning. <i>A premeditated crime.</i>
purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>He is a man of purpose.</i>
purposeful	Intentional. <i>The purposeful stride of a great barrister.</i>
purposefully	With a useful purpose. <i>How is it possible to share information effectively and purposefully with project partners.</i>
purposely	With intention; in an intentional manner. <i>She had purposely made it difficult.</i>

rob	Deprive (an opposing player) of the ball. <i>Poor health has robbed her of a normal social life.</i>
spoliation	The action of taking goods or property from somewhere by violent means. <i>The spoliation of the Church.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Her work is thoughtful and provocative.</i>
untruth	A lie or false statement (often used euphemistically). <i>The story was full of misleading innuendo and untruth.</i>
violate	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>This sentence violates the rules of syntax.</i>
willfully	In a willful manner. <i>She had willfully deceived me.</i>
wittingly	With full knowledge and deliberation. <i>Everyone wittingly or otherwise will become involved.</i>
