- affect** Have an emotional or cognitive impact upon.

- attack** Launch an attack or assault on begin hostilities or start warfare with.  
*The editors of the left leaning paper **attacked** the new House Speaker.*
- be sociable** Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
- condition** Apply a conditioner to the hair.  
*O'Brien **conditioned** winners of 13 European Derbies during his career.*
- consort** Keep company.  
*It did not **consort** with his idea of scientific government.*
- converse** Carry on a conversation.  
*She was withdrawn and preoccupied hardly able to **converse** with her mother.*
- exert influence on** Make a great effort at a mental or physical task.
- fraternize** Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to.  
*She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.*
- get together** Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).
- have an impact on** Receive willingly something given or offered.

<b>hit</b>	Hit against come into sudden contact with. <i>The latest board game to <b>hit</b> the market.</i>
<b>impact on</b>	Have an effect upon.
<b><u>infect</u></b>	Contaminate with a disease or microorganism. <i>Viruses have <b>infected</b> computer networks.</i>
<b>influence</b>	Have an influence on. <i>The artist s work <b>influenced</b> the young painter.</i>
<b>interact with</b>	Act together or towards others or with others.
<b>keep company</b>	Hold and prevent from leaving.
<b>meet</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condtion ro restriction. <i>Does this paper <b>meet</b> the requirements for the degree.</i>
<b><u>mingle</u></b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>A chance to <b>mingle</b> with celebs.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement. <i>It was everyone s dream to <b>mix</b> their album in their front room.</i>
<b><u>strike</u></b>	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i>He raised his hand as if to <b>strike</b> me.</i>
<b>strike at</b>	Affect or afflict suddenly, usually adversely.
<b>take hold of</b>	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
<b>touch</b>	Consume. <i>I didn t play her records or <b>touch</b> any of her stuff.</i>
<b>work on</b>	Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

## Associations of "Interact" (30 Words)

<b>acquaint</b>	Make someone aware of or familiar with. <i>I am not <b>acquainted</b> with any young lady of that name.</i>
<b>address</b>	Address or apply oneself to something direct one's efforts towards something such as a question. <i>Our officers called at the <b>address</b>.</i>
<b>bulletin</b>	Make public by bulletin.
<b>colloquial</b>	(of language) used in ordinary or familiar conversation; not formal or literary. <i><b>Colloquial</b> and everyday language.</i>
<b>colloquialism</b>	The use of colloquialisms. <i>The <b>colloquialisms</b> of the streets.</i>
<b>communicate</b>	Pass on (an infectious disease) to another person or animal. <i><b>Communicate</b> a disease.</i>

<b>communication</b>	Social contact. <i>They could not act without official <b>communication</b> from Moscow.</i>
<b>confer</b>	Have a conference in order to talk something over. <i>We <b>conferred</b> about a plan of action.</i>
<b>convey</b>	Transfer to another. <i>The real virtues and diversity of America had never been <b>conveyed</b> in the movies.</i>
<b>cooperatively</b>	(in relation to the owning or running of a business) jointly by a group of people, with profits or benefits shared among them. <i>The two publishers will work <b>cooperatively</b> on poster projects.</i>
<b>correspondence</b>	Communication by exchanging letters, emails, or other messages. <i>The results of two tests were in <b>correspondence</b>.</i>
<b>delivery</b>	(baseball) the act of throwing a baseball by a pitcher to a batter. <i>Injuries sustained during <b>delivery</b>.</i>
<b>email</b>	Send an email to someone. <i>Reading <b>email</b> has become the first task of the morning.</i>
<b>ferry</b>	Convey in a ferry or other ship or boat especially across a short stretch of water. <i>Ambulances <b>ferried</b> the injured to hospital.</i>
<b>informing</b>	A speech act that conveys information.
<b>message</b>	Send a message to someone especially by email text app or other electronic means. <i>A campaign to get the <b>message</b> about home security across.</i>
<b>persuasively</b>	In a persuasive manner. <i>He argues <b>persuasively</b> against nationalism.</i>
<b>post</b>	A goalpost. <i>This military <b>post</b> provides an important source of income for the town nearby.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	Musical declamation of the kind usual in the narrative and dialogue parts of opera and oratorio, sung in the rhythm of ordinary speech with many words on the same note. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>relay</b>	Control or operate by relay. <i>A <b>relay</b> of a performance live from the concert hall.</i>
<b>report</b>	Be responsible for reporting the details of as in journalism. <i>Police <b>reported</b> that the floods were abating.</i>
<b>respond</b>	Respond favorably or as hoped. <i>It s not part of my job Belinda <b>responded</b>.</i>

<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i>It s the spectacle and music that <b>send</b> us not the words.</i>
<b>sender</b>	Set used to broadcast radio or tv signals. <i>Return to <b>sender</b>.</i>
<b>spam</b>	Irrelevant or unsolicited messages sent over the internet, typically to a large number of users, for the purposes of advertising, phishing, spreading malware, etc. <i>An autogenerated <b>spam</b> website.</i>
<b>telegraphic</b>	(especially of speech) omitting inessential words; concise. <i><b>Telegraphic</b> speech.</i>
<b><u>transmit</u></b>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Sexually <b>transmitted</b> diseases.</i>
<b>transport</b>	A mechanism that transports magnetic tape across the read write heads of a tape playback recorder. <i>Air <b>transport</b>.</i>
<b>verbally</b>	By means of words. <i>A love he can never express <b>verbally</b>.</i>
<b>working</b>	(of a theory, definition, or title) used as the basis for work or argument and likely to be developed or improved later. <i>The ratio of <b>working</b> men to unemployed.</i>
