Synonyms of "Intercede" as a verb (18 Words)

act	Take action do something. <i>Blood samples are analysed to find out how the drug acts in the body.</i>
act as an intermediary	Perform on a stage or theater.
act as honest broker	Perform an action, or work out or perform (an action. (of an independent person or body) reach an authoritative judgement or settlement.
arbitrate	<i>The insurance ombudsman arbitrates insurance matters.</i>
become involved	Undergo a change or development.

conciliate	Reconcile; make compatible. <i>All complaints about charges will be conciliated if possible.</i>
get involved	Take vengeance on or get even.
intermediate	Act between parties with a view to reconciling differences. <i>Groups which intermediated between the individual and the state.</i>
interpose	Exercise or advance (a veto or objection). <i>The memo interposes no objection to issuing a discharge.</i>
<u>intervene</u>	Be situated between things. <i>The snowy peaks of the Himalayas stood glistening in the far distance high above the wooded mountains that intervened.</i>
liaise	Cooperate on a matter of mutual concern. <i>She will liaise with teachers across the country.</i>
mediate	Occupy an intermediate or middle position or form a connecting link or stage between two others. <i>He mediated a settlement.</i>
moderate	Make less fast or intense. <i>The neutrons causing fission are not moderated but react at high energies.</i>
negotiate	Succeed in passing through, around, or over. <i>They negotiated the sale of the house.</i>
step in	Walk a short distance to a specified place or in a specified manner.
take a hand	Make use of or accept for some purpose.
take action	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.
take measures	Pick out, select, or choose from a number of alternatives.

Usage Examples of "Intercede" as a verb

- *He interceded in the family dispute.*
- *I prayed that she would intercede for us.*

Associations of "Intercede" (30 Words)

accost	Approach and address (someone) boldly or aggressively. <i>He was accosted by a thief demanding his money or his life.</i>

adjudicate	Act as a judge in a competition. <i>We asked him to adjudicate at the local flower show.</i>
appeal	The quality of being attractive or interesting. <i>They have 48 hours to appeal the decision.</i>
arbitrate	(of an independent person or body) reach an authoritative judgement or settlement. <i>The board has the power to arbitrate in disputes.</i>
<u>arbitration</u>	The use of an arbitrator to settle a dispute. <i>They submitted their disagreement to arbitration.</i>
arbitrator	Someone chosen to judge and decide a disputed issue. <i>The arbitrator's authority derived from the consent of the disputants.</i>
argue	Persuade someone to do or not to do (something) by giving reasons. <i>He argued for extra resources.</i>
<u>argument</u>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and the value is y . <i>Heated arguments over public spending.</i>
bicker	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Against the glass the rain did beat and bicker.</i>
claim	Lay claim to as of an idea. <i>The court had denied their claims to asylum.</i>
conciliation	The action of stopping someone being angry; placation. <i>Many disputes are settled through conciliation by the official body.</i>
conciliator	Someone who tries to bring peace. <i>He was seen as a conciliator who would heal divisions in the party.</i>
<u>contentious</u>	Involving or likely to cause controversy. <i>A style described as abrasive and contentious.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	(of statements or accounts) be inconsistent or fail to correspond. <i>Historians often disagree.</i>
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>Two members dissented from the majority.</i>
fight	Fight against or resist strongly. <i>I will fight for a fairer society.</i>
intercession	The act of intervening (as to mediate a dispute, etc). <i>He only escaped ruin by the intercession of his peers with the king.</i>
intermediate	An intermediate thing. <i>An intermediate course.</i>

<u>intervention</u>	Care provided to improve a situation (especially medical procedures or applications that are intended to relieve illness or injury. <i>As her health worsened her daughters considered staging an intervention.</i>
litigation	The process of taking legal action. <i>The company wishes to avoid litigation.</i>
mediate	Occupy an intermediate or middle position or form a connecting link or stage between two others. <i>Mediate between the old and the new.</i>
mediation	The act of intervening for the purpose of bringing about a settlement. <i>They are offering sacrifice and mediation between God and man.</i>
<u>negotiable</u>	Open to discussion or modification. <i>Negotiable bonds.</i>
persuadable	Easily persuaded; amenable. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i>
perturbation	Activity that is a malfunction, intrusion, or interruption. <i>She sensed her friend s perturbation.</i>
refutable	Able to be refuted.
squabble	Quarrel noisily over a trivial matter. <i>Family squabbles.</i>
umpire	Act as an umpire in a game or match. <i>An umpire was appointed to settle the tax case.</i>
vociferously	In a loud and forceful manner. <i>The country vociferously opposed the war.</i>
<u>wrangle</u>	Herd and care for. <i>An insurance wrangle is holding up compensation payments.</i>
