Definitions of "Interchangeable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “interchangeable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Capable of replacing or changing places with something else.*
- *(mathematics, logic) such that the arguments or roles can be interchanged.*
- *(of two things) able to be interchanged.*
- *Capable of replacing or changing places with something else; permitting mutual substitution without loss of function or suitability.*
- *Such that the arguments or roles can be interchanged.*
- *Apparently identical; very similar.*

alike	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>All politicians are alike.</i>
cut from the same cloth	Cut down with a hand implement or machine.
exchangeable	Capable of replacing or changing places with something else.
<u>homogeneous</u>	Consisting of parts all of the same kind. <i>If all jobs and workers were homogeneous.</i>
<u>identical</u>	(of twins) derived from a single egg or ovum. <i>She stole a suitcase from the identical station at which she had been arrested before.</i>
indistinguishable	Not capable of being distinguished or differentiated. <i>The twins were indistinguishable.</i>
replaceable	Able to be replaced. <i>A knife with a replaceable blade.</i>
similar	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>Northern India and similar areas.</i>
standardised	Capable of replacing or changing places with something else; permitting mutual substitution without loss of function or suitability.
<u>standardized</u>	Capable of replacing or changing places with something else; permitting mutual substitution without loss of function or suitability. <i>Standardized education.</i>
the same	Closely similar or comparable in kind or quality or quantity or degree.
transposable	Capable of changing sequence.
<u>twin</u>	Of a crystal twinned. <i>Twin seed leaves.</i>
undifferentiated	Not differentiated. <i>By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet undifferentiated between male and female.</i>
<u>uniform</u>	Denoting a garment forming part of a person's uniform. <i>At regular or uniform intervals.</i>

caliber

A degree or grade of excellence or worth.

*An executive of low **caliber**.*

cartridge

An electro-acoustic transducer that is the part of the arm of a record player that holds the needle and that is removable.

change	Undergo a change become different in essence losing one s or its original nature. <i>He changed his name.</i>
<u>commensurate</u>	Corresponding in size or degree or extent. <i>Pay should be commensurate with the time worked.</i>
<u>comparable</u>	Conforming in every respect. <i>The situation in Holland is comparable to that in England.</i>
compatibility	A state in which two things are able to exist or occur together without problems or conflict. <i>They felt the bond of true compatibility.</i>
compatible	(of two things) able to exist or occur together without problems or conflict. <i>Packages available for IBM PCs and compatibles.</i>
<u>congruent</u>	In agreement or harmony. <i>The rules may not be congruent with the requirements of the law.</i>
congruous	Suitable or appropriate together. <i>This explanation is congruous with earlier observations.</i>
consistently	In a fair and impartial way. <i>Students have to be treated consistently by all staff members.</i>
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Convert centimeters into inches.</i>
<u>counterpart</u>	A person or thing having the same function or characteristics as another. <i>The minister held talks with his French counterpart.</i>
equal	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group. <i>We all treat each other as equals.</i>
equivalent	The atomic weight of an element that has the same combining capacity as a given weight of another element; the standard is 8 for oxygen. <i>Send two dollars or the equivalent in stamps.</i>
<u>evenly</u>	In equal numbers, amounts, or values. <i>He was breathing evenly fast asleep.</i>
fair	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>She won a blue ribbon for her baking at the county fair.</i>
invariant	Unaffected by a designated operation or transformation. <i>The pattern of cell divisions was found to be invariant.</i>
likeness	A portrait or representation. <i>The only known likeness of Dorothy as a young woman.</i>

<u>parallel</u>	Be side by side with something extending in a line always keeping the same distance run or lie parallel to. <i>A challenge which has no parallel in peacetime this century.</i>
proportionate	Being in due proportion. <i>Proportionate representation of a minority group.</i>
same	Same in identity. <i>People will always notice if you wear the same shirt two days running.</i>
similar	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>Problems similar to mine.</i>
similitude	A person or thing resembling someone or something else. <i>There is a striking similitude between the brother and sister.</i>
symmetrical	Made up of exactly similar parts facing each other or around an axis; showing symmetry. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and symmetrical.</i>
synonymous	Meaning the same or nearly the same. <i>His deeds had made his name synonymous with victory.</i>
<u>throwback</u>	A reversion to an earlier ancestral characteristic. <i>The eyes could be an ancestral throwback.</i>
<u>variant</u>	Differing from a norm or standard. <i>A variant spelling.</i>
