Synonyms of "Interdependent" as an adjective (10 Words)

compatible	Capable of forming a homogeneous mixture that neither separates nor is altered by chemical interaction. <i>The printer is fully compatible with all leading software.</i>
corresponding	Conforming in every respect. <i>All rights carry with them corresponding responsibilities.</i>
harmonious	Existing together in harmony. <i>The tailored clothes were harmonious with her military bearing.</i>
<u>interrelated</u>	Reciprocally connected.
matching	Corresponding in pattern, colour, or design; complementary. <i>The college will provide matching funds to complete the project.</i>
mutualist	Mutually dependent.

reciprocal

(of an agreement or obligation) bearing on or binding each of two parties equally.

*She was hoping for some **reciprocal** comment or gesture.*

supporting

Serving to corroborate something.

*His performance is excellent but he is more than matched by the **supporting** cast.*

supportive

Providing encouragement or emotional help.

*A **supportive** family network.*

twin

Of a crystal twinned.

*The **twin** problems of economic failure and social disintegration.*



Usage Examples of "Interdependent" as an adjective

Associations of "Interdependent" (30 Words)

attached	Being joined in close association. <i>A science policy agency attached to the Council of Ministers.</i>
causal	Involving or constituting a cause; causing. <i>The causal factors associated with illness.</i>
closeness	The quality of being only a short distance away or apart in space or time. <i>The closeness of the race.</i>
confidant	Someone to whom private matters are confided. <i>A close confidante of the princess.</i>
conjugal	Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband. <i>Conjugal visits.</i>

connected	Wired together to an alarm system. <i>A connected series of cargo holds.</i>
connection	A supplier of narcotics. <i>We had to wait for our connection to Frankfurt.</i>
connubial	Relating to marriage or the relationship between a married couple; conjugal. <i>Their connubial bed.</i>
correlative	Either of two or more related or complementary variables. <i>Rights whether moral or legal can involve correlative duties.</i>
dependent	Requiring someone or something for financial or other support. <i>Dependent children.</i>
friend	Befriend someone. <i>They are friends of the library.</i>
friendship	A relationship between friends. <i>Old ties of love and friendship.</i>
interconnect	Cause to be interconnected or interwoven. <i>The bones are interconnected via the muscle.</i>
interpersonal	Relating to relationships or communication between people. <i>Interpersonal situations in which speech occurs.</i>
intimacy	Closeness of observation or knowledge of a subject. <i>The absence of fences created a mysterious intimacy in which no one knew privacy.</i>
intimate	Marked by close acquaintance, association, or familiarity. <i>She had been intimate with many men.</i>
intimately	With great or especially intimate knowledge. <i>Everyone knew intimately what was going on.</i>
involvement	A sense of concern with and curiosity about someone or something. <i>He escaped involvement in the accident.</i>
link	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>A high speed rail link to the Channel Tunnel.</i>
mutual	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>We were introduced by a mutual friend.</i>
mutuality	The sharing of a feeling, action, or relationship between two or more parties. <i>The mutuality of their affection was obvious.</i>
mutually	With mutual action; in a mutual relationship. <i>The agreement was mutually satisfactory.</i>

platonic	(of love or friendship) intimate and affectionate but not sexual. <i>Platonic love.</i>
related	Being connected either logically or causally or by shared characteristics. <i>Related to micelle formation is the ability of detergent actives to congregate at oil water interfaces.</i>
relation	An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. <i>The meetings helped cement Anglo American relations.</i>
relationship	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>They can trace their relationship to a common ancestor.</i>
reliant	Relying on another for support. <i>The company is heavily reliant on the baby market.</i>
<u>rely</u>	Have confidence or faith in. <i>I know I can rely on your discretion.</i>
symbiotic	Denoting a mutually beneficial relationship between different people or groups. <i>The fungi form symbiotic associations with the roots of plant species.</i>
trust	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>He betrayed their trust.</i>
