## Synonyms of "Interdependent" as an adjective (10 Words)

<b>compatible</b>	Capable of forming a homogeneous mixture that neither separates nor is altered by chemical interaction. <i>The printer is fully <b>compatible</b> with all leading software.</i>
<b>corresponding</b>	Conforming in every respect. <i>All rights carry with them <b>corresponding</b> responsibilities.</i>
<b>harmonious</b>	Existing together in harmony. <i>The tailored clothes were <b>harmonious</b> with her military bearing.</i>
<b><u>interrelated</u></b>	Reciprocally connected.
<b>matching</b>	Corresponding in pattern, colour, or design; complementary. <i>The college will provide <b>matching</b> funds to complete the project.</i>
<b>mutualist</b>	Mutually dependent.

<b>reciprocal</b>	(of an agreement or obligation) bearing on or binding each of two parties equally. <i>She was hoping for some <b>reciprocal</b> comment or gesture.</i>
<b>supporting</b>	Serving to corroborate something. <i>His performance is excellent but he is more than matched by the <b>supporting</b> cast.</i>
<b>supportive</b>	Providing encouragement or emotional help. <i>A <b>supportive</b> family network.</i>
<b>twin</b>	Of a crystal twinned. <i>The <b>twin</b> problems of economic failure and social disintegration.</i>

## Associations of "Interdependent" (30 Words)

- attached** Being joined in close association.  
*A science policy agency **attached** to the Council of Ministers.*
- causal** Involving or constituting a cause; causing.  
*The **causal** factors associated with illness.*
- closeness** The quality of being only a short distance away or apart in space or time.  
*The **closeness** of the race.*
- confidant** Someone to whom private matters are confided.  
*A close **confidante** of the princess.*
- conjugal** Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband.  
***Conjugal** visits.*

<b>connected</b>	Wired together to an alarm system. <i>A <b>connected</b> series of cargo holds.</i>
<b>connection</b>	A supplier of narcotics. <i>We had to wait for our <b>connection</b> to Frankfurt.</i>
<b>connubial</b>	Relating to marriage or the relationship between a married couple; conjugal. <i>Their <b>connubial</b> bed.</i>
<b>correlative</b>	Either of two or more related or complementary variables. <i>Rights whether moral or legal can involve <b>correlative</b> duties.</i>
<b>dependent</b>	Requiring someone or something for financial or other support. <i><b>Dependent</b> children.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Befriend someone. <i>They are <b>friends</b> of the library.</i>
<b>friendship</b>	A relationship between friends. <i>Old ties of love and <b>friendship</b>.</i>
<b>interconnect</b>	Cause to be interconnected or interwoven. <i>The bones are <b>interconnected</b> via the muscle.</i>
<b>interpersonal</b>	Relating to relationships or communication between people. <i><b>Interpersonal</b> situations in which speech occurs.</i>
<b>intimacy</b>	Closeness of observation or knowledge of a subject. <i>The absence of fences created a mysterious <b>intimacy</b> in which no one knew privacy.</i>
<b>intimate</b>	Marked by close acquaintance, association, or familiarity. <i>She had been <b>intimate</b> with many men.</i>
<b>intimately</b>	With great or especially intimate knowledge. <i>Everyone knew <b>intimately</b> what was going on.</i>
<b>involvement</b>	A sense of concern with and curiosity about someone or something. <i>He escaped <b>involvement</b> in the accident.</i>
<b>link</b>	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>A high speed rail <b>link</b> to the Channel Tunnel.</i>
<b>mutual</b>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>We were introduced by a <b>mutual</b> friend.</i>
<b>mutuality</b>	The sharing of a feeling, action, or relationship between two or more parties. <i>The <b>mutuality</b> of their affection was obvious.</i>
<b>mutually</b>	With mutual action; in a mutual relationship. <i>The agreement was <b>mutually</b> satisfactory.</i>

<b>platonic</b>	(of love or friendship) intimate and affectionate but not sexual. <i><b>Platonic</b> love.</i>
<b>related</b>	Being connected either logically or causally or by shared characteristics. <i><b>Related</b> to micelle formation is the ability of detergent actives to congregate at oil water interfaces.</i>
<b>relation</b>	An abstraction belonging to or characteristic of two entities or parts together. <i>The meetings helped cement Anglo American <b>relations</b>.</i>
<b>relationship</b>	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>They can trace their <b>relationship</b> to a common ancestor.</i>
<b>reliant</b>	Relying on another for support. <i>The company is heavily <b>reliant</b> on the baby market.</i>
<b>rely</b>	Have confidence or faith in. <i>I know I can <b>rely</b> on your discretion.</i>
<b>symbiotic</b>	Denoting a mutually beneficial relationship between different people or groups. <i>The fungi form <b>symbiotic</b> associations with the roots of plant species.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>He betrayed their <b>trust</b>.</i>
