## Interloper as a Noun

### Definitions of "Interloper" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “interloper” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission.*
- *A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong.*

### Synonyms of "Interloper" as a noun (6 Words)

<b>encroacher</b>	Someone who enters by force in order to conquer. <i>The district administration is yet to take any action against the <b>encroachers</b>.</i>
<b>infiltrator</b>	An intruder (as troops) with hostile intent.
<a href="#">intruder</a>	A person who intrudes, especially into a building with criminal intent. <i>The <b>intruder</b> had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
<b>invader</b>	A person or group that invades a country, region, or other place. <i>It is a country that has repelled all <b>invaders</b>.</i>

**trespasser** Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission.

A **trespasser** on his land.

**uninvited guest** A visitor to whom hospitality is extended.

## Usage Examples of "Interloper" as a noun

- *Japanese consumers have in the past been unreceptive to foreign interlopers in the cell phone market.*
- *To her I was always an outsider, an interloper.*

## Associations of "Interloper" (30 Words)

**confiscate** Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority.  
*The guards **confiscated** his camera.*

**crime** An action or omission which constitutes an offence and is punishable by law.  
*Shoplifting was a serious **crime**.*

**encroach** Advance beyond the usual limit.  
*Rather than **encroach** on his privacy she might have kept to her room.*

**impose** Impose something unpleasant.  
*A fine may be **imposed**.*

**infringe** Advance beyond the usual limit.  
*Such widespread surveillance could **infringe** personal liberties.*

**infringement** A crime less serious than a felony.  
*Copyright **infringement**.*

**interfere** Cause interference to a broadcast radio signal.  
*Your talking **interferes** with my work.*

**interject** To insert between other elements.  
*She **interjected** clever remarks.*

**intervene** Be placed or located between other things or extend between spaces and events.  
*Eight days **intervened**.*

**intrude** Enter uninvited.  
*The noise began to **intrude** into her thoughts.*

**intruder** Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission.  
*The **intruder** had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.*

<b><u>intrusion</u></b>	A thing that intrudes. <i>Villagers say the noise is an <b>intrusion</b> on their lives.</i>
<b><u>invade</u></b>	To intrude upon, infringe, encroach on, violate. <i>Sometimes the worms <b>invade</b> the central nervous system.</i>
<b><u>loot</u></b>	Private property taken from an enemy in war. <i>Tonnes of food aid awaiting distribution had been <b>looted</b>.</i>
<b><u>oppressor</u></b>	A person or group that oppresses people. <i>They overthrew their colonial <b>oppressors</b>.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Steal (something) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>The abbey was plundered and <b>pillaged</b>.</i>
<b>piracy</b>	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air <b>piracy</b>.</i>
<b><u>plunder</u></b>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>The contents of the abandoned houses were <b>plundered</b> by members of the new regime.</i>
<b><u>raid</u></b>	Conduct a raid on. <i>Officers <b>raided</b> thirty homes yesterday.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>The fruits of violence and <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Deprive (an opposing player) of the ball. <i>The burglars <b>robbed</b> him of all his money.</i>
<b><u>robber</u></b>	A person who commits robbery.
<b>steal</b>	Move stealthily. <i>A delicious languor was <b>stealing</b> over her.</i>
<b><u>transgress</u></b>	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>Each continent has been <b>transgressed</b> by continental seas.</i>
<b>trespass</b>	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>A mass <b>trespass</b> on the moor.</i>
<b>trespasser</b>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A <b>trespasser</b> on his land.</i>
<b>usurpation</b>	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
<b>violate</b>	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>Don't <b>violate</b> my garden.</i>

**violation**

An act that disregards an agreement or a right.

*The aircraft were in **violation** of UN resolutions.*

**visitor**

A person with the right or duty of occasionally inspecting and reporting on a college or other academic institution.

*The **visitors** came back into the game with two penalty goals.*
