- concessions** A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business.  
*They won all the **concessions** they asked for.*
- cooperation** The formation and operation of cooperatives.  
*Their **cooperation** with us was essential for the success of our mission.*
- give and take** The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.
- interaction** Reciprocal action or influence.  
*For a shy person social **interaction** can be a stomach churning anxiety filled experience.*
- interchange** Reciprocal transfer of equivalent sums of money (especially the currencies of different countries).  
*I listened in shock to this venomous **interchange**.*
- reciprocation** The act of making or doing something in return.
- [reciprocity](#) The practice of exchanging things with others for mutual benefit, especially privileges granted by one country or organization to another.  
*The Community intends to start discussions on **reciprocity** with third countries.*
- teamwork** The combined action of a group, especially when effective and efficient.  
*My group has a good sense of **teamwork**.*

<b>aloud</b>	Loudly. <i>He wept <b>aloud</b>.</i>
<b>aural</b>	Relating to or characterized by an aura. <i>Information held in written <b>aural</b> or visual form.</i>
<b><u>communicative</u></b>	Willing, eager, or able to talk or impart information. <i>Was a <b>communicative</b> person and quickly told all she knew.</i>
<b>dialectical</b>	Concerned with or acting through opposing forces. <i><b>Dialectical</b> ingenuity.</i>
<b>dialog</b>	A literary composition in the form of a conversation between two people.
<b>dynamic</b>	Of or relating to dynamics. <i>Evaluation is part of the basic <b>dynamic</b> of the project.</i>

<b>fluently</b>	In a fluent manner. <i>He writes <b>fluently</b> and authoritatively.</i>
<b>halitosis</b>	Offensive breath.
<b>lingua</b>	A mobile mass of muscular tissue covered with mucous membrane and located in the oral cavity.
<b>logic</b>	Logical operations collectively. <i>It made a certain kind of <b>logic</b>.</i>
<b>method</b>	A particular procedure for accomplishing or approaching something, especially a systematic or established one. <i>Labour intensive production <b>methods</b>.</i>
<b>multilingual</b>	Using or knowing more than one language. <i>A <b>multilingual</b> translator.</i>
<b>mutually</b>	With mutual action; in a mutual relationship. <i>The agreement was <b>mutually</b> satisfactory.</i>
<b>oral</b>	Relating to the mouth. <i>The <b>oral</b> surface of a starfish.</i>
<b>orator</b>	An official speaking for a university on ceremonial occasions. <i>A theatrically effective <b>orator</b>.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>palate</b>	The upper surface of the mouth that separates the oral and nasal cavities. <i>A fine range of drink for sophisticated <b>palates</b>.</i>
<b>pharynx</b>	The passage to the stomach and lungs; in the front part of the neck below the chin and above the collarbone.
<b>poliomyelitis</b>	An acute viral disease marked by inflammation of nerve cells of the brain stem and spinal cord.
<b>recitative</b>	A vocal passage of narrative text that a singer delivers with natural rhythms of speech. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>rhetorical</b>	Of or relating to rhetoric- W.A.White- Lewis Mumford. <i>The general intended his question to be purely <b>rhetorical</b>.</i>
<b>sinus</b>	A cavity within a bone or other tissue, especially one in the bones of the face or skull connecting with the nasal cavities. <i><b>Sinus</b> tachycardia.</i>
<b>spoken</b>	Speaking in a specified way. <i>A <b>spoken</b> message.</i>

- sylllogism** Deductive reasoning in which a conclusion is derived from two premises.  
*This school of epistemology is highly advanced in **sylllogism** and logical reasoning.*
- tactile** (of a person) given to touching other people, especially as an unselfconscious expression of sympathy or affection.  
*She had a distinct almost **tactile** memory of the girl fleeing.*
- tirade** A long, angry speech of criticism or accusation.  
*A **tirade** of abuse.*
- unwritten** Based on custom rather than documentation.  
*An **unwritten** constitution.*
- verbal** A verbal noun.  
*A **verbal** protest.*
- verbally** Using spoken rather than written communication; orally.  
*He is reported to have agreed **verbally** to take on the job.*
- vocal** Full of the sound of voices.  
*A four part **vocal** composition.*
