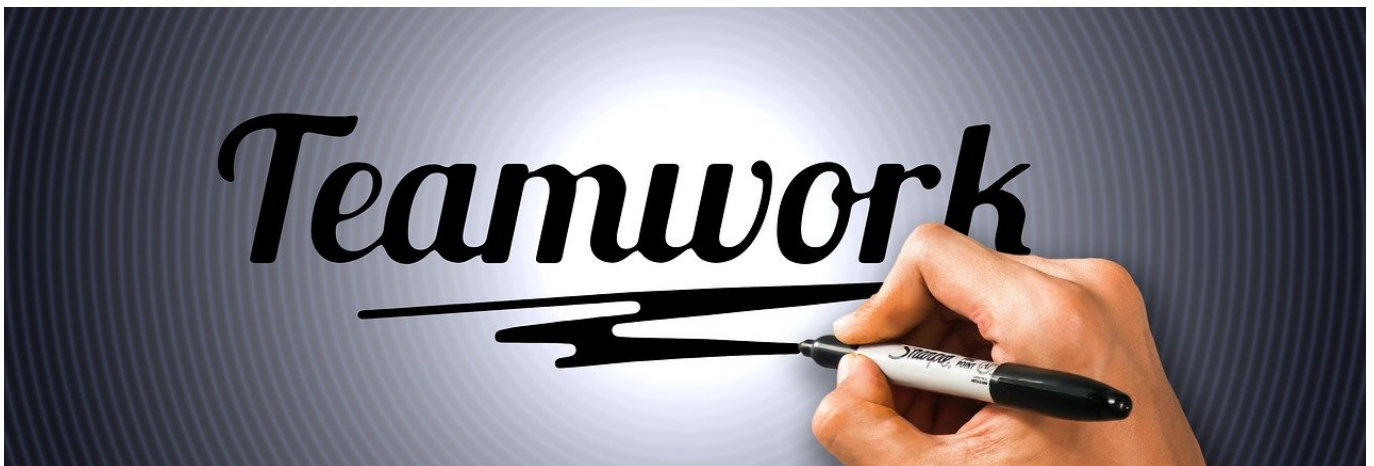

**taken** Understood in a certain way; made sense of.  
*Couldn't tell when he would be **taken** drunk.*

- *An open door interpreted as an invitation.*



## Associations of "Interpreted" (30 Words)

- bilingual** (of a country, city, or other community) using two languages, especially officially.  
*A **bilingual** secretary.*
- construe** Analyse the syntax of (a text, sentence, or word).  
*His words could hardly be **construed** as an apology.*
- decipher** Succeed in understanding, interpreting, or identifying (something).  
*Authorized government agencies can **decipher** encrypted telecommunications.*
- define** Give a definition for the meaning of a word.  
*The river **defines** the park's boundary.*
- depict** Portray in words; describe.  
*Paintings **depicting** Old Testament scenes.*

<b>depiction</b>	The action of depicting something, especially in a work of art. <i>Michelangelo s <b>depictions</b> of the male nude.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Give a detailed account in words of. <i>Discreet Italian police <b>described</b> it in a manner typically continental.</i>
<b>english</b>	Of or relating to the English language.
<b>explain</b>	Give a reason so as to justify or excuse (an action or event). <i>It s a device of great age the professor <b>explained</b>.</i>
<b>explanation</b>	A statement that makes something comprehensible by describing the relevant structure or operation or circumstances etc. <i>The <b>explanation</b> was very simple.</i>
<b>expound</b>	Present and explain (a theory or idea) in detail. <i>He declined to <b>expound</b> on his decision.</i>
<b>express</b>	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>An <b>express</b> train.</i>
<b>figuratively</b>	Used to indicate a departure from a literal use of words; metaphorically. <i>Chinese art influenced her to paint <b>figuratively</b>.</i>
<b>interpretation</b>	A mental representation of the meaning or significance of something. <i>The <b>interpretation</b> of data.</i>
<b>interpreter</b>	A program that can analyse and execute a program line by line. <i>She was famous as an <b>interpreter</b> of Shakespearean roles.</i>
<b>language</b>	Coarse or offensive language. <i>The <b>language</b> of sociology.</i>
<b>linguist</b>	A person who studies linguistics.
<b>multilingual</b>	In or using several languages. <i>A <b>multilingual</b> nation.</i>
<b>paraphrase</b>	Express the meaning of (something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity. <i>You can either quote or <b>paraphrase</b> literary texts.</i>
<b>polyglot</b>	A person who knows and is able to use several languages. <i>Slovenians being surrounded by many countries are mostly <b>polyglots</b>.</i>
<b>portray</b>	Portray in words. <i>The actor <b>portrays</b> an elderly lonely man.</i>
<b>read</b>	Audition for a stage role by reading parts of a role. <i>A little <b>read</b> English columnist whose name escapes me.</i>
<b>speaking</b>	Capable of or involving speech or speaking. <i>A <b>speaking</b> likeness.</i>

<b><u>spoken</u></b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>The <b>spoken</b> language.</i>
<b>subjectively</b>	In a way that is dependent on the mind for existence. <i>The natural tendency we have to impute <b>subjectively</b> perceived qualities to objects.</i>
<b>translate</b>	Make sense of a language. <i>Twenty years of critical success which rarely <b>translated</b> into public acclaim.</i>
<b>translation</b>	The act of uniform movement. <i>The <b>translation</b> of the relics of St Thomas of Canterbury.</i>
<b>translator</b>	A person who translates from one language into another, especially as a profession. <i>The <b>translator</b> of Hardy's poems into Icelandic.</i>
<b>transliterate</b>	Rewrite in a different script. <i>Names from one language are often <b>transliterated</b> into another.</i>
<b>understand</b>	Be understanding of. <i>I <b>understand</b> you have no previous experience.</i>
