### Definitions of "Intervention" as a noun

- *Action taken to improve a medical disorder.*
- *A policy of intervening in the affairs of other countries.*
- *Care provided to improve a situation (especially medical procedures or applications that are intended to relieve illness or injury.*
- *An occasion on which a person with an addiction or other behavioural problem is confronted by a group of friends or family members in an attempt to persuade them to address the issue.*
- *The action or process of intervening.*
- *Interference by a state in another's affairs.*

- The act of intervening (as to mediate a dispute, etc).



### Synonyms of "Intervention" as a noun (5 Words)

- intercession** The act of intervening (as to mediate a dispute, etc).  
*He only escaped ruin by the **intercession** of his peers with the king.*
- interference** (in ice hockey and other sports) the illegal hindering of an opponent not in possession of the puck or ball.  
*An unwarranted **interference** with personal liberty.*
- interposition** The act or fact of interposing one thing between or among others.  
*He owed the preservation of his throne to the miraculous **interposition** of a stranger who suddenly appeared in his realm.*
- involvement** The fact or condition of being involved with or participating in something.  
*She knew that **involvement** with Adam would only complicate her life.*

**treatment**

The manner in which someone behaves towards or deals with someone or something.

*Anti cancer **treatments**.*



**Usage Examples of "Intervention" as a noun**

- *The purpose of intervention is to prevent unnecessary duplication of lawsuits.*
- *It occurs without human intervention.*
- *Two patients were referred for surgical intervention.*
- *The government was reported to be considering military intervention.*
- *Repeated interventions by central banks.*
- *A high degree of state intervention in the economy.*
- *As her health worsened, her daughters considered staging an intervention.*



## Associations of "Intervention" (30 Words)

### arbitration

The act of deciding as an arbiter; giving authoritative judgment.  
*They submitted their disagreement to **arbitration**.*

### begrudge

Give reluctantly or resentfully.  
*She **begrudged** Martin his affluence.*

### busybody

A person who meddles in the affairs of others.  
*Others considered him an interfering **busybody**.*

### cease

Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end.  
*They were asked to **cease** all military activity.*

### disrupt

Make a break in.  
*If an explosion of volcanic steam had formed the crater the blast from below would have **disrupted** the underlying rock.*

<b>disruptive</b>	(of a company or form of technology) causing radical change in an existing industry or market through being innovative. <i>The hours of work are <b>disruptive</b> to home life.</i>
<b>disturbance</b>	A psychological disorder of thought or emotion; a more neutral term than mental illness. <i>There was too much anger and <b>disturbance</b>.</i>
<b>hinderance</b>	Something immaterial that interferes with or delays action or progress.
<b>hindrance</b>	The act of hindering or obstructing or impeding. <i>A <b>hindrance</b> to the development process.</i>
<b>impediment</b>	A hindrance or obstruction in doing something. <i>A serious <b>impediment</b> to scientific progress.</i>
<b>intercession</b>	The action of saying a prayer on behalf of another. <i>He only escaped ruin by the <b>intercession</b> of his peers with the king.</i>
<b>interfere</b>	Of light or other electromagnetic waveforms interact to produce interference. <i>Your talking <b>interferes</b> with my work.</i>
<b>interference</b>	Blocking a player's path with your body. <i>An unwarranted <b>interference</b> with personal liberty.</i>
<b>interject</b>	Say (something) abruptly, especially as an aside or interruption. <i>Christina felt bound to <b>interject</b> before there was open warfare.</i>
<b>interpose</b>	Place or insert between one thing and another. <i>The legislature <b>interposed</b> to suppress these amusements.</i>
<b>interposition</b>	The action of interjecting or interposing an action or remark that interrupts. <i>The <b>interposition</b> of members between tiers of management.</i>
<b>interrupt</b>	Destroy the peace or tranquility of. <i>Don't <b>interrupt</b> me when I'm reading.</i>
<b>intervene</b>	Be placed or located between other things or extend between spaces and events. <i>The war <b>intervened</b> between the birth of her two children.</i>
<b>intrude</b>	Enter uninvited. <i>He had no right to <b>intrude</b> into their lives.</i>
<b>meddle</b>	Interfere in something that is not one's concern. <i>Don't <b>meddle</b> in my affairs.</i>
<b>meddlesome</b>	Fond of meddling; interfering. <i>Heaven rid him of <b>meddlesome</b> politicians.</i>



<b>mediate</b>	Connected indirectly through another person or thing involving an intermediate agency. <i>Set up a tribunal to arbitrate and <b>mediate</b> disputes.</i>
<b>militate</b>	Have force or influence; bring about an effect or change. <i>These fundamental differences will <b>militate</b> against the two communities coming together.</i>
<b>moderator</b>	Any substance used to slow down neutrons in nuclear reactors. <i>The debates will each feature one <b>moderator</b> and a panel of three questioners.</i>
<u><b>nosy</b></u>	Showing too much curiosity about other people's affairs. <i>He flipped through my letters in his <b>nosy</b> way.</i>
<b>obstacle</b>	An obstruction that stands in the way (and must be removed or surmounted or circumvented). <i>The poverty of a district is an <b>obstacle</b> to good education.</i>
<u><b>obstruction</b></u>	The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction. <i>He was charged with <b>obstruction</b> of a police officer in the execution of his duty.</i>
<b>obstructionist</b>	Someone who systematically obstructs some action that others want to take.
<b>obtrude</b>	Impose or force (something) on someone in an unwelcome or intrusive way. <i>I felt unable to <b>obtrude</b> my private sorrow upon anyone.</i>
<u><b>resent</b></u>	Feel bitterness or indignation at (a circumstance, action, or person). <i>She <b>resented</b> the fact that I had children.</i>
