
Intolerant as an Adjective

Definitions of "Intolerant" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "intolerant" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Unable to be given (a medicine or other treatment) or to eat (a food) without adverse effects.
- Not tolerant of views, beliefs, or behaviour that differ from one's own.
- (of a plant or animal) unable to survive exposure to (a particular physical influence).
- Narrow-minded about cherished opinions.
- Unwilling to tolerate difference of opinion.





Synonyms of "Intolerant" as an adjective (18 Words)

allergic

Having a strong dislike for. One and a half per cent of the population is **allergic** to bee venom.



bigoted	Obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, in particular prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>An outrageously bigoted point of view.</i>
blinkered	(of a horse) wearing blinkers. A blinkered attitude.
<u>dogmatic</u>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of a doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. She was not tempted to be dogmatic about what she believed.
hypersensitive	Easily hurt, worried, or offended. Proximity to death makes people hypersensitive and aware.
illiberal	Opposed to liberal principles; restricting freedom of thought or behaviour. <i>Illiberal</i> and anti democratic policies.
inflexible	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. Once she had made up her mind she was inflexible .
insular	Relating to or characteristic of or situated on an island. <i>Insular</i> attitudes toward foreigners.
narrow-minded	Lacking tolerance or flexibility or breadth of view.
oversensitive	Unduly sensitive or thin-skinned. Bentley was oversensitive to criticism.
parochial	Having a limited or narrow outlook or scope. <i>Parochial</i> attitudes.
<u>provincial</u>	Of or concerning the regions outside the capital city of a country, especially when regarded as unsophisticated or narrow-minded. <i>Narrow provincial attitudes.</i>
rigid	Not able to be changed or adapted. A seat of rigid orange plastic.
<u>sensitive</u>	Of or pertaining to classified information or matters affecting national security. A mimosa s leaves are sensitive to touch.
small-minded	Contemptibly narrow in outlook.
<u>uncompromising</u>	Not making concessions. His uncompromising stance on the issue.
<u>unforgiving</u>	Not willing to forgive or excuse people's faults or wrongdoings. The moor can be a wild and unforgiving place in bad weather.



unsympathetic Not feeling, showing, or expressing sympathy. *They were initially unsympathetic towards the cause of Irish freedom.*



Usage Examples of "Intolerant" as an adjective

- As a society we are more intolerant of certain types of violence than we were in the past.
- Some people are intolerant of aspirin.
- *He's recently been diagnosed as gluten-intolerant.*

ageism	Discrimination on the basis of a person's age. Ageism in recruitment is an increasing problem.
agitated	Feeling or appearing troubled or nervous. The agitated mixture foamed and bubbled.
<u>apartheid</u>	A social policy or racial segregation involving political and economic and legal discrimination against people who are not Whites; the former official policy in South Africa. <i>Gender apartheid</i> .
bias	Give a bias to. A bias fold.
biased	Favoring one person or side over another. We will not tolerate this biased media coverage.



<u>bigot</u>	A person who is obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, especially one who is prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. Don t let a few small minded bigot s destroy the good image of the city.
bigoted	Obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, in particular prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. A bigoted person.
bigotry	Obstinate or unreasonable attachment to a belief, opinion, or faction; in particular, prejudice against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. The difficulties of combating prejudice and bigotry .
<u>discriminate</u>	Make an unjust or prejudicial distinction in the treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability. Discriminate people.
discrimination	The ability to judge what is of high quality; good judgement or taste. <i>Victims of racial discrimination.</i>
discriminatory	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. Discriminatory employment practices.
equality	A symbolic expression of the fact that two quantities are equal; an equation. An organization aiming to promote racial equality .
illiberal	Opposed to liberal principles; restricting freedom of thought or behaviour. <i>Illiberal</i> and anti democratic policies.
impatient	(usually followed by `to') full of eagerness. <i>Impatient</i> with the slower students.
<u>inequality</u>	A symbolic expression of the fact that two quantities are not equal. <i>Social inequality</i> .
<u>injustice</u>	The practice of being unjust or unfair. She was taken aback by the injustice of Nora s remark.
<u>intolerance</u>	An inability to eat a food or take a drug without adverse effects. An intolerance of dissent.
invidious	(of an action or situation) likely to arouse or incur resentment or anger in others. It seems invidious to make special mention of one aspect of his work.



jaundiced	Affected by jaundice, in particular unnaturally yellow in complexion. Looked with a jaundiced eye on the growth of regimentation.
misogynist	Relating to or characteristic of a misogynist. A misogynist attitude.
<u>partial</u>	Having a strong preference or liking for. <i>Strings would like to oscillate as closely as possible to harmonic partials.</i>
partiality	A predisposition to like something. An attack on the partiality of judges.
prejudice	Give rise to prejudice in someone make biased. Delay is likely to prejudice the child s welfare.
prejudiced	Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand. Prejudiced views.
racial	Of or related to genetically distinguished groups of people. Racial abuse.
racism	The belief that different races possess distinct characteristics, abilities, or qualities, especially so as to distinguish them as inferior or superior to one another. <i>Theories of racism</i> .
racist	A person with a prejudiced belief that one racial group is superior to others. <i>The systems work to uphold and enforce racist policies.</i>
<u>sexist</u>	A person with sexist views. Sexist s have no place in our modern political campaigns.
<u>subjective</u>	The subjective case. A subjective judgment.
xenophobia	Dislike of or prejudice against people from other countries. <i>The resurgence of racism and xenophobia.</i>
