According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “intolerant” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Unable to be given (a medicine or other treatment) or to eat (a food) without adverse effects.*
- *Not tolerant of views, beliefs, or behaviour that differ from one's own.*
- *(of a plant or animal) unable to survive exposure to (a particular physical influence).*
- *Narrow-minded about cherished opinions.*
- *Unwilling to tolerate difference of opinion.*

allergic

Having a strong dislike for.

*One and a half per cent of the population is **allergic** to bee venom.*

bigoted	Obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, in particular prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>An outrageously bigoted point of view.</i>
blinkered	(of a horse) wearing blinkers. <i>A blinkered attitude.</i>
<u>dogmatic</u>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of a doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. <i>She was not tempted to be dogmatic about what she believed.</i>
hypersensitive	Easily hurt, worried, or offended. <i>Proximity to death makes people hypersensitive and aware.</i>
illiberal	Opposed to liberal principles; restricting freedom of thought or behaviour. <i>Illiberal and anti democratic policies.</i>
inflexible	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>Once she had made up her mind she was inflexible.</i>
insular	Relating to or characteristic of or situated on an island. <i>Insular attitudes toward foreigners.</i>
narrow-minded	Lacking tolerance or flexibility or breadth of view.
oversensitive	Unduly sensitive or thin-skinned. <i>Bentley was oversensitive to criticism.</i>
parochial	Having a limited or narrow outlook or scope. <i>Parochial attitudes.</i>
<u>provincial</u>	Of or concerning the regions outside the capital city of a country, especially when regarded as unsophisticated or narrow-minded. <i>Narrow provincial attitudes.</i>
rigid	Not able to be changed or adapted. <i>A seat of rigid orange plastic.</i>
<u>sensitive</u>	Of or pertaining to classified information or matters affecting national security. <i>A mimosa s leaves are sensitive to touch.</i>
small-minded	Contemptibly narrow in outlook.
<u>uncompromising</u>	Not making concessions. <i>His uncompromising stance on the issue.</i>
<u>unforgiving</u>	Not willing to forgive or excuse people's faults or wrongdoings. <i>The moor can be a wild and unforgiving place in bad weather.</i>

unsympathetic

Not feeling, showing, or expressing sympathy.

*They were initially **unsympathetic** towards the cause of Irish freedom.*



Usage Examples of "Intolerant" as an adjective

- *As a society we are more intolerant of certain types of violence than we were in the past.*
- *Some people are intolerant of aspirin.*
- *He's recently been diagnosed as gluten-intolerant.*

Ageism in recruitment is an increasing problem.

- apartheid** A social policy or racial segregation involving political and economic and legal discrimination against people who are not Whites; the former official policy in South Africa.
*Gender **apartheid**.*
- bias** Give a bias to.
*A **bias** fold.*
- biased** Favoring one person or side over another.
*We will not tolerate this **biased** media coverage.*

bigot	A person who is obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, especially one who is prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>Don't let a few small minded bigots destroy the good image of the city.</i>
bigoted	Obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, in particular prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>A bigoted person.</i>
bigotry	Obstinate or unreasonable attachment to a belief, opinion, or faction; in particular, prejudice against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>The difficulties of combating prejudice and bigotry.</i>
discriminate	Make an unjust or prejudicial distinction in the treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability. <i>Discriminate people.</i>
discrimination	The ability to judge what is of high quality; good judgement or taste. <i>Victims of racial discrimination.</i>
discriminatory	Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice. <i>Discriminatory employment practices.</i>
equality	A symbolic expression of the fact that two quantities are equal; an equation. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial equality.</i>
illiberal	Opposed to liberal principles; restricting freedom of thought or behaviour. <i>Illiberal and anti democratic policies.</i>
impatient	(usually followed by 'to') full of eagerness. <i>Impatient with the slower students.</i>
inequality	A symbolic expression of the fact that two quantities are not equal. <i>Social inequality.</i>
injustice	The practice of being unjust or unfair. <i>She was taken aback by the injustice of Nora's remark.</i>
intolerance	An inability to eat a food or take a drug without adverse effects. <i>An intolerance of dissent.</i>
invidious	(of an action or situation) likely to arouse or incur resentment or anger in others. <i>It seems invidious to make special mention of one aspect of his work.</i>

jaundiced	Affected by jaundice, in particular unnaturally yellow in complexion. <i>Looked with a jaundiced eye on the growth of regimentation.</i>
misogynist	Relating to or characteristic of a misogynist. <i>A misogynist attitude.</i>
<u>partial</u>	Having a strong preference or liking for. <i>Strings would like to oscillate as closely as possible to harmonic partials.</i>
partiality	A predisposition to like something. <i>An attack on the partiality of judges.</i>
prejudice	Give rise to prejudice in someone make biased. <i>Delay is likely to prejudice the child s welfare.</i>
prejudiced	Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand. <i>Prejudiced views.</i>
racial	Of or related to genetically distinguished groups of people. <i>Racial abuse.</i>
racism	The belief that different races possess distinct characteristics, abilities, or qualities, especially so as to distinguish them as inferior or superior to one another. <i>Theories of racism.</i>
racist	A person with a prejudiced belief that one racial group is superior to others. <i>The systems work to uphold and enforce racist policies.</i>
<u>sexist</u>	A person with sexist views. <i>Sexists have no place in our modern political campaigns.</i>
<u>subjective</u>	The subjective case. <i>A subjective judgment.</i>
xenophobia	Dislike of or prejudice against people from other countries. <i>The resurgence of racism and xenophobia.</i>
