## Intoxicated as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Intoxicated" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “intoxicated” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Drunk or under the influence of drugs.*
- *Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol).*
- *As if under the influence of alcohol.*



## Synonyms of "Intoxicated" as an adjective (9 Words)

<b>drunken</b>	Drunk or intoxicated. <i>The man s <b>drunken</b> slurred speech.</i>
<b>gone</b>	Destroyed or killed. <i>She is now four months <b>gone</b>.</i>
<b>inebriate</b>	Drunk; intoxicated. <i>He had been known to get hopelessly <b>inebriate</b>.</i>
<b>inebriated</b>	Drunk; intoxicated. <i>Helplessly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>ripped</b>	Having well-defined or well-developed muscles; muscular. <i>They re going to the gym daily to get buff pecs <b>ripped</b> abs and tight buns.</i>
<b>the worse for drink</b>	Inferior to another in quality or condition or desirability.
<b>tipsy</b>	Unstable and prone to tip as if intoxicated. <i><b>Tipsy</b> revellers.</i>

**under the influence** Lower in rank, power, or authority.



### Usage Examples of "Intoxicated" as an adjective

- *Felt intoxicated by her success.*
- *A noisy crowd of intoxicated sailors.*
- *Officials are reporting an increase in the number of intoxicated students requiring medical attention.*
- *He was so intoxicated that he could barely walk.*





## Associations of "Intoxicated" (30 Words)

<b>alcohol</b>	A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent. <i><b>Alcohol</b> or drink ruined him.</i>
<b>alcoholic</b>	A person who drinks alcohol to excess habitually. <i><b>Alcoholic</b> liquor.</i>
<b>bacchanal</b>	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking. <i>The debauched and alcoholic president was said to be organizing unceasing <b>bacchanals</b>.</i>
<b>bacchanalian</b>	Characterized by or given to drunken revelry. <i>A <b>bacchanalian</b> orgy.</i>
<u><a href="#">beer</a></u>	A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops. <i>He ordered a <b>beer</b>.</i>

<b>bibulous</b>	Excessively fond of drinking alcohol. <i>A <b>bibulous</b> fellow.</i>
<b>carousal</b>	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
<b>carouse</b>	Drink alcohol and enjoy oneself with others in a noisy, lively way. <i>Corporate <b>carouses</b>.</i>
<b>debauchery</b>	A wild gathering involving excessive drinking and promiscuity.
<b>drunken</b>	Habitually or frequently drunk. <i>Two <b>drunken</b> gentlemen holding each other up.</i>
<b>inebriate</b>	Make (someone) drunk; intoxicate. <i>Those who feel inclined are free to <b>inebriate</b> themselves.</i>
<b>inebriated</b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>I got mildly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>inebriety</b>	Drunkenness, especially habitual; intoxication. <i>The ravages of <b>inebriety</b>.</i>
<b>intoxicant</b>	Causing. <i><b>Intoxicants</b> and drugs are used by some to escape physical or psychological pain.</i>
<b>intoxicate</b>	Make drunk (with alcoholic drinks). <i>We don't allow people into sessions if they are <b>intoxicated</b> by alcohol or drugs.</i>
<b>oaf</b>	A man who is rough or clumsy and unintelligent. <i>They are just big clumsy <b>oafs</b>.</i>
<b>plastered</b>	Made smooth by applying a sticky or glossy substance. <i>I went out and got totally <b>plastered</b>.</i>
<b>revel</b>	Lively and noisy enjoyment, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>They spent the evening <b>revelling</b> with their guests.</i>
<b>reveler</b>	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract <b>revelers</b> as young as thirteen.</i>
<b>revelry</b>	Lively and noisy festivities, especially when these involve drinking a large amount of alcohol. <i>Sounds of <b>revelry</b> issued into the night.</i>
<b>sober</b>	Make or become sober after drinking alcohol. <i>As <b>sober</b> as a judge.</i>
<b>spree</b>	Take part in a spree. <i>He went on a six month crime <b>spree</b>.</i>

**stupor**

The feeling of distress and disbelief that you have when something bad happens accidentally.

*A drunken **stupor**.*

**tipple**

Drink alcohol, especially habitually.

*We **tipped** the cognac.*

**tipsy**

Slightly intoxicated.

***Tipsy** revellers.*

**unstable**

Prone to psychiatric problems or sudden changes of mood.

*An **unstable** world economy.*
